

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

Cool weather thus far and a desire to move spring stocks has retarded early sponsorship of summer lines; but it appears that plans are being worked out for launching line promotions in connection with the Memorial Day holiday. Thereafter, it is suggested, June is likely to uncover the main summer apparel drive of the season to stimulate consumer interest in comfortable attire for the Independence Day exodus and the vacation periods to follow.

## Price Quotations

After having shown their fall lines for about three weeks, the leading wool manufacturers finally announced the prices of these goods toward the end of the month. Quoted prices were about 10 per cent below last year. There is still too much price sharp-shooting in this industry and its troubles will continue until this practice is abated or eliminated.

Wool Carryover Lower

Stocks of raw wool in the United States at the beginning of the new wool season on April 1, 1932 apparently were much smaller than at that time last year. The increase of 22 million pounds in domestic production in 1931 was offset by a decline in imports of combing and clothing wool. The increase of 20 per cent in reported consumption thus served to reduce the heavy stocks of wool available at the beginning of the 1931 season.-Summary of the U.S. Dept. of Agri-


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


