in Finances in Finances. Austin, August 16.-University of Texas students, along with oth ers enrolled in state-supported ed-
ucational institutions, will again during 1934-35 receive federal aic amounting to about one-fourth of their school expenses, on the basis of part-time jobs paid for out of
federal funds, according to the federal funds, according to the
terms of a new agreement made terms of a new agreement made
between the university authorities and the Federal Emergency Relief Administration.
These students, who will be al lowed to work 43 hours per month,
at 35 cents per hour. will receive not more than $\$ 15.05$ per month.
not All beneficiaries of this agreement must be regularly enrolled in the
university before they can be assigned to jobs.
