Bailey County Cotton Farmers Have Chance at \$500 Award Offered For **High Grade Plains Grown Cotton**

High Grade Plains Grown Cotton

The Plainview Chamber of Comerce has posted an award of \$500 to be given for highest production of 10 bales of cotton by any five producers, as a boost toward the growing of better and longer staple on the Plains area. Farmers of Bail and the policy and adjoining counties may compete for the honors, making their application for such competition through their respective ginners where their cotton is ginned.

The contest in being backed by a group of civic minded men who have already posted the prize money. Commercial and seed breeders are barred from the contest, which is designed primarily for the average cotton farmer.

The contest will in no way interfere with selling or storing of cotton, as awards will be based upon the quality of sample taken from each bate submitted in the competition, and a board of expert cottom men have already been appointed as judges for highest honors.

Prizes are offered in two classes of staple length—fifteen – sixteenths and under an ineh fulls in one class, and one inch and above falls in another. Within these staple classes grade, character and preparation will also be a determining factor. In each class a top prize of \$150 in cash will be paid, second place will receive \$75 and third \$25.

There is no hard and fast territorial confined to the contest, interest shown by ginners and producers, rather than geography, defining the territory.


