BANCROFT REVEALED AS ARCH-TRAITOR

the flour is quite brown. Stir to Show Franklin's Secretary as Betrayer of U.S.

Boston.—The American embassy in Paris was little more than a branch office of the British secret service during Benjamin Franklin's mission to France, and prolongation of the American Revolution was due, more than any other single cause, to information which Franklin's confidential secretary sold to the British foreign office, according to Burton J. Hendrick in the Atlantic Monthly

The arch-traitor of the Revolution was not Benedict Arnold, but scholarly Edward Bancroft, M. D., who completely bamboozled Franklin, furnished Britain with copies of all letters to and from the Continental congress, of all transactions and correspondence with foreign powers and who betrayed his country with disastrous consequences for more than eight years, states Mr. Hendrick, twice winner of the Pulitzer prize for American biography.

Gave Routes of Ships. "Bancroft contracted to furnish details about every ship sailing from France to America-its officers, crew, its cargo, especially war munitions, its port of departure and date of sailing, its projected course, so that British warships might be most advantageously placed for interception. Ship after ship cleared French ports for America, only to be scooped in by the British cordon and taken to England. From May, 1777 to 1778, con-Purchasing Power of \$3,000,000 gress received no messages or correspondence of any kind from its Outstanding Texan ambassadors in France for all ships carrying them were captured," asserts Mr. Hendrick.

croft was able to carry on his espionage to Franklin's carelessness, lack of perspicacity and devotion to an old friend, for Franklin was repeatedly informed of Bancroft's activities by Arthur Lee, member of the American mission to France.

"Franklin even took Bancroft to the peace conference that ended the relief: Revolution, Bancroft being still on the British pay roll, and Franklin went to his grave without losing cessfully sold out his country," asserts the writer.

Better Informed Than Congress. "From 1776 to 1781 it is not too congress itself. Not a thing happened in Franklin's embassy which did not instantaneously find its way to Downing street and Windsor, for reading the reports of British spies was George III himself.



Business Failures in 1935 Least in Fourteen Years

Business Map (at Left) Barometer Highest Since December of Last Year

Washington, Dec. 31.—November saw relatively old industries make new highs in filling needs of younger ones. Moving the automobile season forward sent steel, plate glass and electric power outputs to new records for recent years or for all time. Subordinate industries were likewise pushed.

Retail trade found the first half of November too warm for best results but gained in the latter half. Wholesale trade, after holiday preparations, eased up.

Western corn in shock and unpicked southwestern cotton suffered from excessive moisture but newly seeded winter wheat thrived. The stock market advanced for the eighth successive month. Dividend resumptions or increases were numerous.

Forecasts of volume of 1935 business were cheerful. Building records indicated a doubling of expenditures, cotton exports and consumption increased, woolen mills ran full time, shoe production promised a new record and bank clearings and debits heavily exceeded 1934. Failures were the fewest in 14 years.

The map (illustration) shows a fairly steady enlargement of the white areas.

The Business Activity Barometer for November rose above the October levels and was far above November a year ago. In fact the index is now at the highest since December, 1934.

With the consolidation of rural afternoon bridge parties and in the schools, the school lunch problem vided with kitchens



and lunchrooms. Nevertheless the old country school still abounds in great numbers. As long as it does I shall be concerned about the midday lunch of its

pupils. If I could have my way every one of those children remaining at school over the noon hour would have his pint of milk, his serving of fruit, one or two tasty sandwiches and a sweet. That would be a minimum.

For cold days I would add a hot oup and during the spring and fall I should try to have a vegetable salad. It would be an attractive salad, something inviting and appetizing.

Still having my way, I would ask parents to furnish metal lunch boxes. These can be cleaned and they resist the raids of mice. I would lask that sandwiches and cakes be wrapped in waxpaper. A napkin would be my next request, and along with it I would attempt instruction in its correct use.

In short, I regard the meal as a cultural situation full of teaching opportunities. Really it is a laboratory exercise wherein food selection, eating habits and meal sanitation can be rehearsed until learned. Later on many a student would thank me for instruction of this
