
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

GIRAFFES ARE MUTE

Game Warden Says Young Bawl, Low Like Calf

Washington, D. C.-Some naturalists long have held that giraffes are voiceless animals, unable to make a sound even when in agony. A recent challenge of this occurs in the annual report of the Kenya (Africa) game warden, which avers that a young giraffe, separated fom its mother, will bawl, and low like a hungry calf.

"Whether mute or not, the giraffe is one of the world's most peculiar animals," says the National Geographic society. "It has at least two other claims to distinction. It is the world's tallest mammal and one of the most expensive animals found in menageries

"'A giraffe's neck, long as it is, contains no more vertebrae than does the neck of a man. It is merely elongation of the vertebrae that elevates the giraffe's head among the treetops.

Thorns No Bother.

"Possessing few means of defense, giraffes are protected by their coloration. Their irregularly marked coats blend so perfectly with the dappled sunlight and shadows of the trees on which they feed that at a distance they are difficult to detect. Thorny acacias do not prove a trial to them, for the animals' tough hides protect them from long thorns, and their elastic tongues taper to pluck leaves without including the trees' piercing

"When feeding among the tree tops, 16 or 18 feet above the ground, the giraffe's long-lashed eyes can enemies. When grazing, however, or drinking from a water hole, the animal cannot see lions prowling in the surrounding grasses. Since a springing lion could break a giraffe's neck, it is fortunate that the tween drinks. Dew on leaves helps to quench its thirst.

"Lions usually stalk a giraffe in pairs. Attacked by a single lion, a giraffe might be able to fend it off by kicking viciously, or, if able to shake the lion off its back, it could escape by running.

"Giraffes usually seek safety in flight. Hunters pursuing them on horseback do not have an easy time catching up. Given a few minutes' lead, especially over uneven ground, they, traveling more than 30 miles usually keep up with the herd.

Giraffes find unusual ways to hurt themselves. In the Calcutta zoo one hanged himself by catching his neck in a forked branch.'

KANSAS PUBLISHER AGAIN GETS NOMINATION



> Occupational accidents, those suffered while engaged in gainful emmore than in 1934, the Council's statistics showed, and inflicted permanent disability upon 63,000. Less serious injuries were suffered by 1,340,000.

Of the total number killed in accidents during 1935, 47,800 were between twenty-five and sixty-four years of age. Other age groups and the number of accidental deaths which occurred in them, were: less than five years, 6,600; five to fourteen years of age, 7,600; fifteen to twenty-four years, 13,400; sixty-five years or more, 24,600.

Motor vehicle accidents were the greatest cause of accidental death in each age group except the "less years or more" classifications. Automobile accidents as a cause of death were second to "burns" in the former group and second to "falls" in the latter group.

Fire, which the Council said annually takes an average of 8,000 lives, caused \$250,000,000 property damage during 1935. Matches and the fire hazard connected with smoking cigars, pipes and cigarettes; defective chimneys and flues, petroleum fires, and defective stoves, furnaces and boilers, were given as the principal causes of the year's conflagrations.

Hazards on the Farm.

Of the total of occupational deaths the Council said agricultural pursuits, work on the farm, caused more accidental deaths, 4,400, than any other classification of gainful employment. Trade and service industries were next with 4,000 fatalities. Construction operations with 2,500 deaths was third on the list, while about 1,600 deaths were suffered by workers in mining, quarrying and other extractive industries. In the transportation and public utilities industries there were 2,100 accidental deaths and manufacturing accounted for 1,900 fatal acci-

In relation to compensation insurance the Council said the largest slice of the total paid for industrial accidents, 28 per cent, went to accident victims injured in falls. However, falls caused but 22 per cent of all industrial accident cases.

The handling of objects-tools and material-caused 29 per cent of all industrial cases, the victims of which received, 17 per cent of the compensation.

However, the Council said proof of the progress in industrial safety in the United States is offered in statistics for 1935 that show the accident frequency rate (disabling injuries per million man-hours of exposure) 61 per cent below the rate for 1926. These figures, it was explained, were taken from reports of only those companies which have been carrying on continuous programs of accident prevention. This select group, said the Council, also has a 1935 accident severity rate (days lost per 1,000 man-hours worked) that is 43 per cent below

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

Mr. Skipwith spoke interestingly of the state department with which he is associated.

The department, recognized as operating far more efficiently than those of many other states, has the state divided into twentyfive separate divisions in order to carry on more effectively the highway work in a state having a land trea of 262,398 square miles.

In Mr. Skipwith's division at Austin materials are received from highway work being done in all secions of the state. Concrete is received in cylinders which are wrapped in wet papers and bur'ap. After the concrete has remained in a damp room for a specified time
