#### Historic Room of Old

Hawaii to Exist Again Honolulu. — Acting Governor Charles M. Hite of Hawaii has decided that the United States hereafter shall be in a position to compete with European monarchies by having at least one throne room.

He has taken the necessary steps for the complete restoration of the throne room of Iolani palace in this city, now used as the meeting place of the territorial house of representatives. The plans include the reproduction of the original thrones.

The latter are now in the Bishop museum of this city, to which they were deeded in 1897, by the republic of Hawaii, which followed the monarchy before the annexation of the islands to the United States in 1898.

Acting Governor Hite is having the throne room rearranged in keeping with the glamor of the former monarchy, relics of which remain in the portraits of former rulers on the walls, tall mirrors, and huge crystal chandeliers, as well as the crossed spears, symbolical of early native

The room is furnished in native woods, principally island koa.

The dais upon which the throne chairs will be placed is still overhung by the heavy canopy that once graced kings and queens.





By Dr. ALLEN G. IRELAND What Better Teaching?

One day I visited the sort of school that nutrition experts write articles about for the women's magazines. It was a two-room



rural school with eight grades, differing none in outward appearances from the run of its kind But the differences that gave it distinction were there, in the keen minds and

loving hearts of two fine teachers. It was lunch time, for that was the point of the visit. A girl member of the hospitality committee met me at the door, presented me first to the teachers and then introduced me to the two classes. I was shown to my place, an unoccupied seat and desk. Soon there was orderly purposeful activity, starting with a hand-washing period. A few girls began making sandwiches, others tended a stew kettle on an oil stove, while some boys distributed paper plates, and napkins, glasses for milk and eating utensils.

Soon came the lunch, appetizing, wholesome, attractive, and clean. I noticed this was done by a new committee working under the direction of a chairman. Another committee cleared away, washed, and stored the dishes. But the most mpressive point was the easy flow pleasant conversation which continued throughout the period. Later the classes divided into groups for quiet games and read-Altogether it was a most deightful occasion, but aside from that it was practical education on the plane of everyday human living. 

#### Start Aerial Mapping

of Mid-West Dust Bowl New York. - Long large-bore

cones of giant aerial cameras are government has trained on the midwest dust bowl as a speedy and effective means of permanent drouth relief and flying photographers have already embarked upon probably the most extensive aerial mapping project ever undertaken.

Under a contract just signed with the United States Department of Agriculture, Robert Shippee, worldfamous explorer and president of Aerial Explorations, Inc., 22 Sahara-like areas embracing 24,373,-760 acres in 72 counties of 9 states are to be photographically surveyed to provide the soil conservation service with cartographic data for its ground work, at nominal cost per square mile, which would otherwise require decades

of dollars to compile. The mapping will be done at an altitude of from 14,000 to 19,000 feet and will be hurried to completion, probably within a year.

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
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
