





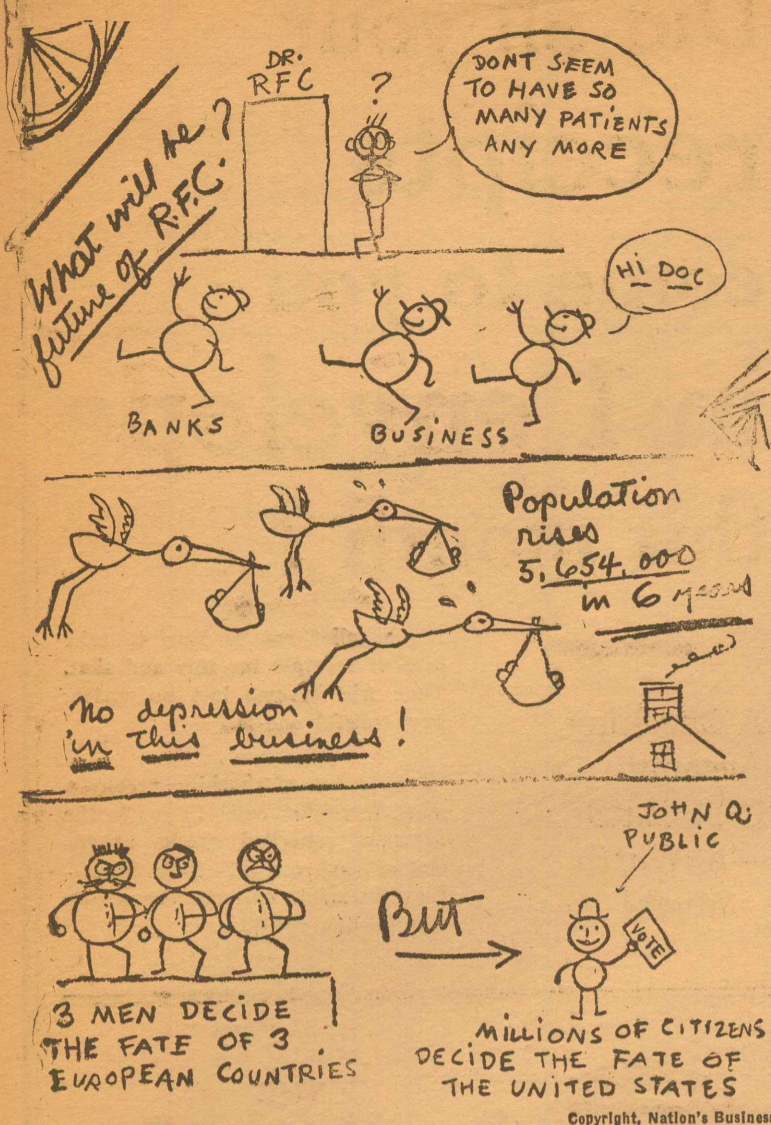

Austin, Dec. 2.—University of Texas co-eds are not weaklings, it is shown by the fact that during November one thousand participated in the tennis and golf sports tournaments sponsored by the women's physical training department as an intramural activity.

Last year there were 2,900 entries in the women's intramural sports, which provide recreation and competition in such activities as tennis, deck tennis, archery, golf, swimming, badminton, ping pong, basket ball volley ball and baseball.

In the regular physical training classes, required of all freshmen, sophomore and junior women at the university, there are 1,700 enrolled for regular instruction in various sports, in several kinds of dancing, or in exercise designed to correct some physical or postural defect.

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Basketball Coach Tells One On Self

A. and M.'s "Hub" McQuillan Came From "North"—and How!

College Station, Dec. 2.—H. R. (Hub) McQuillan, the Texas Aggies' head basketball and assistant football coach, tells this story on himself with the claim that after years in the South he is at least a "naturalized" Southerner. McQuillan graduated from North Dakota Agricultural College and coached at Rochester, Minnesota, high school before becoming mentor at Lakeland, Florida, high school. He became head coach at Stetson University, DeLand, Fla., in 1924 and held that post until he came to the Aggies in 1935.

"At Lakeland high I was to teach several physical education classes," McQuillan said, "and the day I met my first class I naturally checked the roll the first thing. I called one boy's name, and he answered with 'Yassah.'"

"It was my first real experience with Southern speech and I thought he was trying to 'kid' me. I ordered him to leave the room.

"After class the boy returned and asked: 'Coach, why did you make me leave the room?'"

"Weren't you trying to make fun of me," I answered.

"'Nosah.'"

"When I heard that," McQuillan laughed, "I realized my mistake and the next day I apologized to the boy before the entire class."

TEXAS CAR SALES GAIN OVER SAME MONTH IN '35

Austin, Dec. 2.—Reports to the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research from fifteen representative counties showed automobile sales during October totaled 4,132 cars, an increase of 10.2 per cent over October last year but a decline of 13.4 per cent from September.

Aggregate sales during the first ten months of 1936 were 60,801, an increase of 22 per cent over the corresponding period in 1935.

"The greatest relative gains in sales during the first ten months over the like period last year were in the higher groups," the report said. "For the lowest price group the increase in sales was 17.5 per cent; for the lower intermediate group, 24 per cent; the upper intermediate group 33.5 per cent, and the highest price group 90.2 per cent."

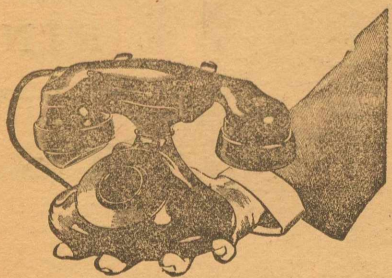

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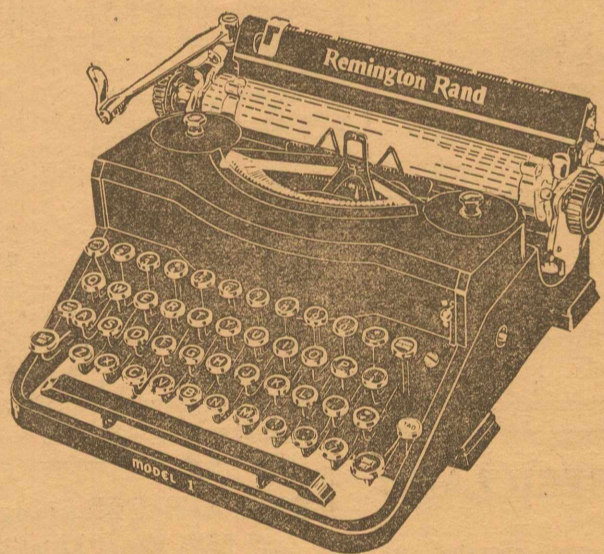
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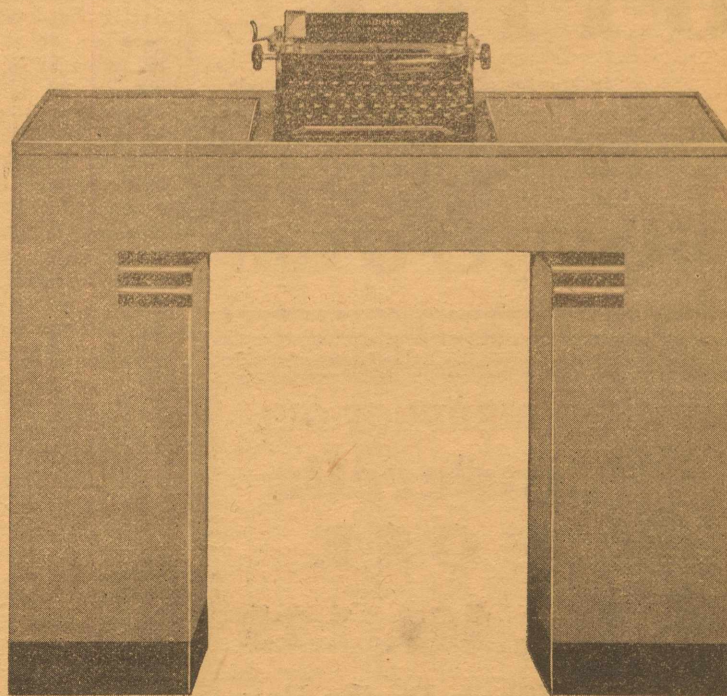
