Texas, TASB conducts an awareness campaign during January. At this time, in support of this outstanding effort, I urge all Texans to recognize the contributions that local school boards make to our education system. Through their service, they are building the future of Texas," Perry said.

"Today's public schools face enormous challenges and great opportunities, making the school board's role more critical than ever before," said James B. Crow, TASB executive director. "Local trustees work with community leaders, families, and educators to develop sound educational policies in their districts. Trustees offer vision and leadership, and work purely for the common good of our schoolchildren. They help us to set high standards in the education system, encouraging us to strive to reach those goals and

better prepare the next generation of leaders in our state and nation," Crow said.

Sutton County Livestock Show Continues To Grow

The Sutton County Junior Livestock Show was held Friday, January 10 and Saturday, January 11, 2003. Over 64 young students totaling 90 exhibitors showing 301 total projects. There were 5 exhibitors that showed 22 market lambs, 40 exhibitors that showed 148 meat goats, 24 exhibitors that showed 25 pigs, 19 exhibitors that showed 92 Angora goats and 7 exhibitors that showed 14 Futurity ewe lambs. This year's sale that followed the BBQ Appreciation Dinner was record breaking, once again raising more money than previous sales, with an average lot of about \$900.

In the Angora Goat Division, which was one of the largest of its divisions in Texas, the Earwood girls took home the top honors. Emily Earwood exhibited the Champion and Reserve Champion Registered Angora Goats and Meredith Earwood had the Champion Commercial Angora Goat. Marilyn Holman showed the Reserve Champion Commercial Angora. Prizes for this event were donated by The Bank and Trust - Sutton County.

The B.M. Halbert Award, presented by the Bloodworth Family and Lee Silver Co. went to the Grand Champion Angora Goat exhibitor, Emily Earwood.

Board Extends Superintendent Contract

Sonora I.S.D. Board President Tryon Fields opened the meeting on Monday, January 13, 2003 by establishing that a quorum was present. Other board members present were Jesse Bustamante, Tammy Favila, Scott Jacoby, Barbara Jennings and Tom Payton. School officials present were Brant Myers, Superintendent, Doug Bawcom, Alice Cox, Diane Jacoby, and Cynthia Keel.

The first order of business was the Tax Assessor/Collector report and payment of current bills. Rex Ann Friess, County Auditor, reported that 5.3 million or 61 1/2% of the tax levy had been collected. Myers commented on several bills listed, including the floor at the High School that had been completed, architect fees, general utilities, etc. The board approved the payment of \$324,723.15 in

bills for December. The minutes from the December meeting were also reviewed and approved.

Due to Dr. Alvis Johnson requesting to step down from his position on the Sutton County Appraisal District Board of Directors, the Board had to nominate a candidate to fill the vacancy. Myers stated that he had spoke with Sherrill Dannheim about the position and he had agreed to take it if the Board so voted. The motion to nominate Sherrill Dannheim to fill the vacancy on the Sutton County Appraisal District Board of Directors was made and approved.

Ms. Friess informed the board that an assessment error had been found on a piece of property that had been sold recently and a tax refund had been requested by the land

The Sutton County Commissioners met on Monday, January 13, 2003 at 9:00 a.m. After the approval of prior meeting minutes, the court approved the payment of current bills.

Adelita Alvarez, Justice of the Peace, reported that fees in the amount of \$29, 210.25 had been collected for the month of December, with \$12,360.25

going to Sutton County.

Sutton County Sheriff, Joe Fincher reported that there were 57 new inmates in the month of December, giving the county an 18.5 daily average. Dispatchers logged 1285 calls and the cost per meal for inmates was 80¢. Fincher also reported that the Sheriff's Office logged 6000 miles last month, at 8¢ per mile.

These plans were discussed at the January 9th meeting of the Chamber held at the Sutton County Steakhouse. Keith Butler reported that he had received some very good information from the San Angelo Daddy/Daughter dance committee and would be putting it to use. He also informed the group that he had talked to a DJ out of San Angelo who had worked such dances before and he was willing to come to Sonora to play. Photographers for the event are still being researched, with hopes of finding a good package deal to be offered to the guests. Butler also suggested looking into having carnations on sale at the front door. Another idea would be to talk to local restaurant chamber members and see if they would be willing to offer a "Daddy/Daughter Dance Special" of some sort. This would allow for a complete evening out, making the experience even more memorable. Another suggestion was to invite surrounding counties to attend the dance. This would help generate more funds. Further plans will be discussed in the celebration committee meeting to be held next week.

Ladonna Wardlaw, Chamber Manager reported that the new feed store, Red Horse Feeds, had joined the Chamber of Commerce and she would be getting back with Parker Lumber at a later date. Wardlaw then reported that the Merchant Association's Santa Buck Auction promotion went really well and plans were already being made for next year, with improvements being discussed. The next promotion planned for

the Merchants Association is the Easter Egg Hunt, but no plans have been discussed for that as of yet.

Main Street Program Manager, Ann Kay reported that the rock work on the planter box was almost complete. Kay also reported that the Friends of Historic Sonora/Main Street Program had held their budget planning meeting and, upon approval from the City of Sonora, would be allotting \$3,000 to go towards banners and holders for the light poles around town. These decorative banners are an acceptable expense to be paid for with Hotel/Motel Taxes because they will advertise tourist attractions and places of interest in town. Among other upcoming plans, Kay reported that Tumbleweed Smith would be coming to Sonora in February for a book signing and to interview local "characters" for his show.

Having no further "committee" reports the Chamber of Commerce general meeting was started with the approval of prior meeting minutes. The monthly financial statement of bills and the 4th quarter report were also submitted and approved.

In old business, Beth Snyder, Chamber President, called for the Board members to turn in their list of goals for the year 2003 in priority order. One of those goals include a "welcoming wagon", with one board member visiting and greeting new members or perspective members in town. The "welcoming wagon" would have a goody basket, equipped with sweets and local literature for the newcomer. Mickey Schaffer volunteered to take the first month and informed that she

"Steering" The Wrong Way Causes Accident



At about 9:15 p.m. on Thursday, January 9th a 911 call came in to the Sutton County Sheriff's office that a vehicle had hit a "cow" in front of The Video Store on Crockett Ave. Officers responding to the call requested verification that the dispatcher had said "cow" and she assured them that the driver had reported a cow. Further investigation found that Sonora resident, Jack Sharp (this editor's father-in-law) had indeed hit a four-legged bovine, only it was a steer, not a cow. The steer was running down the main strip through Sonora, having escaped from the Sutton County Arena. Ropers responsible for the steer were chasing it on horseback, trying to catch it, when it ran in front of Sharp's 1991 GMC Pickup. The hit stunned the steer, knocking it unconscious and totaling the truck. Riders loaded the steer into a trailer and the truck had to be towed home. Luckily, this round-up ended with no injuries to our vehicle vaquero!

Ask the Historical Society

We have had a request from the Sonora Independent School System, for pictures of the interior of the Rock School over the years. All I could find in our files is one of the Physics Class in 1921 and one of the Superintendent's Office in 1920. Someone somewhere has to have photographs that were taken inside the Rock School between 1920 and 1940. If you do, please call the Business Office at 387-2545 so that arrangements may be made to make copies of your photos.

Mr. Greg Harper, 4521 Brownfield Highway #108, Lubbock, TX 79407 is looking for information on historical cattle and horse ranches in our area. He wants a list of cattle and horse ranches in our area to match up to books he collects. I don't mind giving out information on where to call for a hunting lease but I really don't want to give out information on what anyone has or has had on their ranch without permission. If you want to share a story about your historical ranch in Sutton County with him please send it directly to him.

Q. How long has cedar eradication been going on in Sutton County?

A. God sent down lightning bolts and they caught the range on fire and burned all the weeds and cedar and kept them under control long before man ever came to Sutton County. When man came here he proceeded to chop, dig and burn and is still chopping and digging and burning cedar. If there is one bush left anywhere, the birds will fly the seeds in and fertilize them at the same time to make sure they grow good. They wind can blow seeds and man driving through an area can transport them on his tires or even when walking on his shoes. Eradication of cedar is an ongoing project in this area. Organized programs of cedar eradication were started in the mid 1930's.

Q. What happened to the old fire station that used to be

across the street from your new offices?

A. The old building is still there. It has had a lot of cosmetic changes over the years. Over the years fire trucks have grown a lot in size and they just didn't fit in the old fire station. Estimates to convert it to hold the trucks were so high it was decided that they would just build a new fire station.

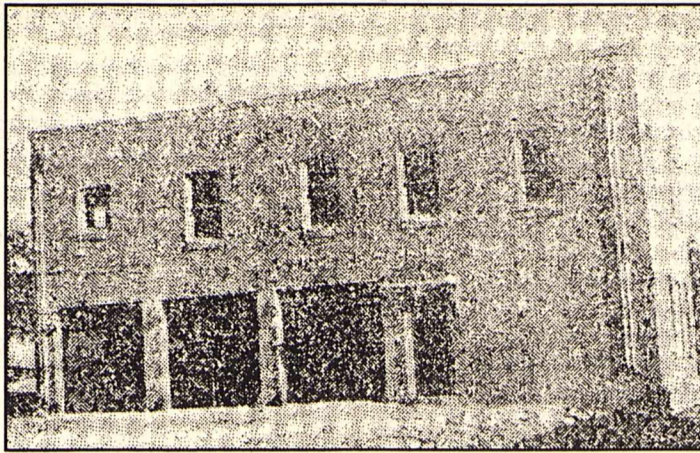
The Devil's River News of March 29, 1935 - "Actual contract for the building was let October 27 after months of effort on the part of city officials. Legal work in connection with the application for the building was done by W. P. Dumas, Dallas, George Wynn and L. W. Elliott, attorneys.

The Suggs Construction Co., Abilene, was the successful bidder with an amount of \$5149, the extras bring this to \$5199. A. E. Suggs and his superintendent of construction, Mr. Dunlap, have been in charge of the work. The same firm built the Baptist Church, High School, Sonora Wool & Mohair Co. addition and the Sutton County Jail improvement.

Architectural work was done by John G. Becker, San Angelo architect for eight years, who came there from Amarillo practice. Mr. Becker was the architect on the Sonora Wool & Mohair Co. addition, Sutton County Jail improvement, Baptist Church and the Mexican School building now under construction. He designed the Episcopal Church building in San Angelo, built from the stone of the old Tom Green county courthouse and other San Angelo buildings.

Electrical and plumbing work was done by A. P. Kasch, plumbing-heating-electric contractor of Big Spring. Mr. Kasch also has the Mexican School building work.

The two-story building, between the Sutton county jail and the clubhouse of the Sonora Woman's Club, on the lower floor has an office for the city manager, George E. Smith, storage closet and large room for three pieces of fire equipment room.

The upper floor has a room for city commission meetings, lounge or reception room, sleeping quarters for firemen, kitchen and two shower bathrooms. A gin pole makes rapid exit of firemen to the lower floor possible. It is planned that several members of the department will sleep there and that some members will be there at all times. Heretofore, such a policy was not possible.

This building has quite a bit of history, it wasn't just the fire department, it was also city offices and where the city commissioners held meetings. Before it's latest renovation by the county it was used as offices for the City Police Department.

As I sit here typing and looking out the window at the building I have to say that the latest cosmetic changes to the exterior have been a wonderful improvement to the appearance of the building and certainly is a great improvement to the Courthouse Square area. When you consider that initial building costs were only \$5,199, and all the uses it has been put to, I'd say the 67 year old building is holding up pretty well. I'm not the only one that is going to enjoy watching "Old Glory" fluttering in the breeze from that flag pole that quite a few men worked very hard to raise the other day.

Every building that is repaired and saved helps to make our downtown area more attractive to tourists. Every tourists that we bring into this area and that we can draw into

the museum, remodeled courthouse and downtown area hopefully will eat here and maybe even stay the night and tour the Caverns of Sonora or Fort McKavett the next day. Every tourist dollar that is spent here helps to make jobs in Sonora. So when someone asks you what is there to do in Sonora be sure to tell them about the historic downtown area, the Caverns of Sonora and even Fort McKavett. Remember those tourist dollars also help our local tax base.

The Sutton County Historical Society offices are located at 307 E. Main Street and are open Mondays, Tuesday mornings and Fridays. You might even catch one or two in here on an occasional Saturday. Whenever we are open we are always happy to take people on tours of the Miers Home Museum, tell them documented stories on local history and help them with research.

Our new number is 915-387-5084 and you can still reach me after hours or on days that the office is closed at 387-2855. If someone is here from out of town trying to do research on a day the office is closed, just give me a call at home and we can make arrangements for you to access files while you are here. Alex's Stuffed Dinner Rolls

2 loaves frozen white bread dough
1 pound ground beef
2 cups shredded cabbage
3/4 cup chopped onion
1/4 cup chopped fresh parsley
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon black pepper
1 teaspoon chopped fresh garlic
1 cup shredded cheddar cheese
1/2 cup ketchup
1 egg slightly beaten
1 tablespoon milk
crushed red pepper, if desired

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. In skillet, cook ground beef until brown. Drain fat. Stir in cabbage, onion, parsley, salt, black pepper, and garlic. Cook until cabbage is tender. Stir in cheese and ketchup.
Divide each bread loaf into four pieces. On floured surface, roll each piece into 6 inch circles. Place about 1/2 cup beef mixture in center of each circle. Carefully pinch together edges and form a bun. Place seam side down on greased cookie sheet. In small bowl, stir egg and milk. Brush each bun with mixture. Sprinkle each bun with red pepper. Bake 25 to 30 minutes or until browned. Enjoy!

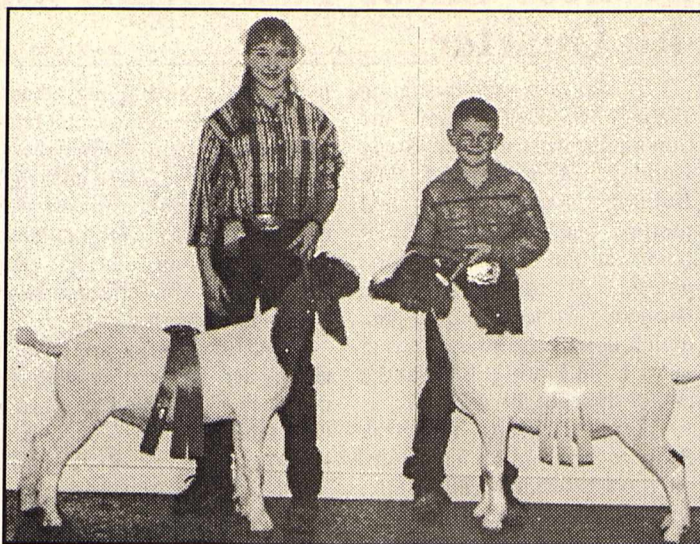

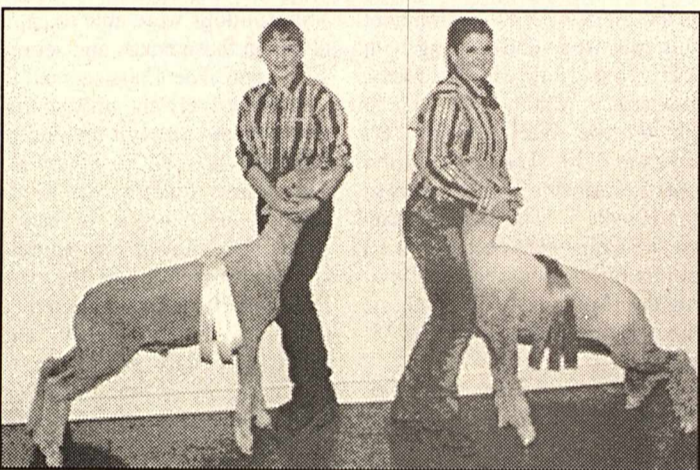


Champion Steely Ingham and Reserve Champion Bailey Joe Pennington

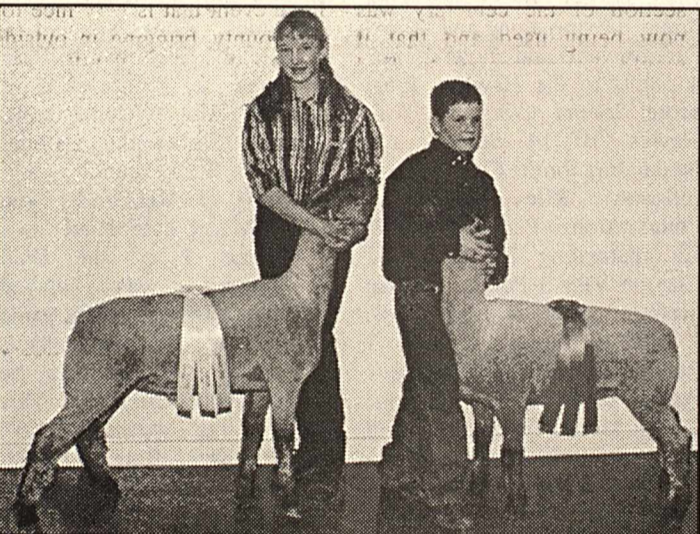


Meat Goat Senior Showmanship winner Hanna Allison, Janalyn Jones and Junior Showmanship winner Bailey Joe Pennington

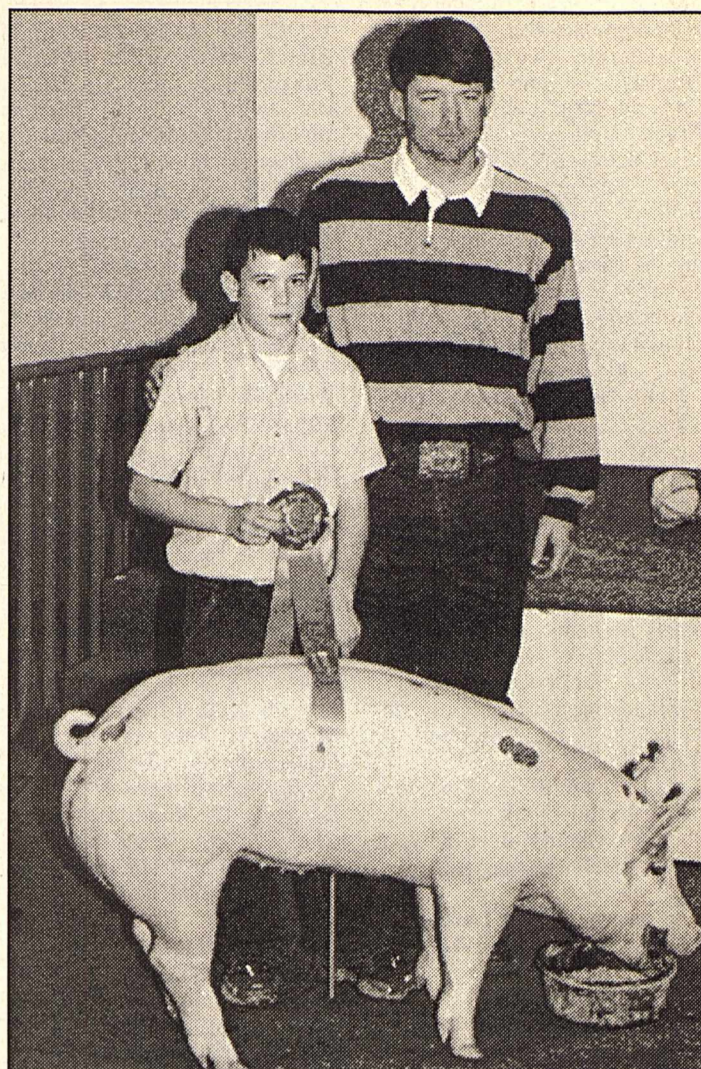


Reserve Champion Crossbred, Steely Ingham and Champion Crossbred, Dustin Neff

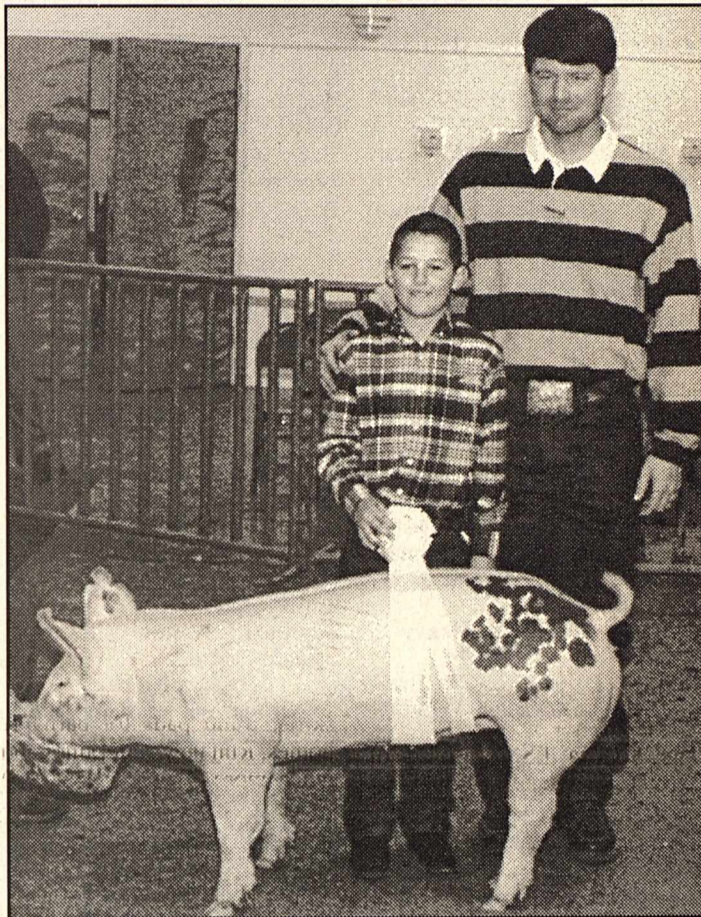

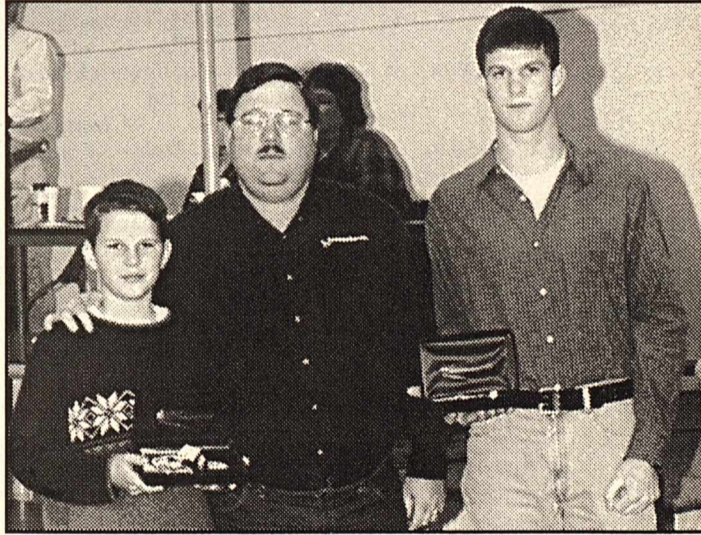

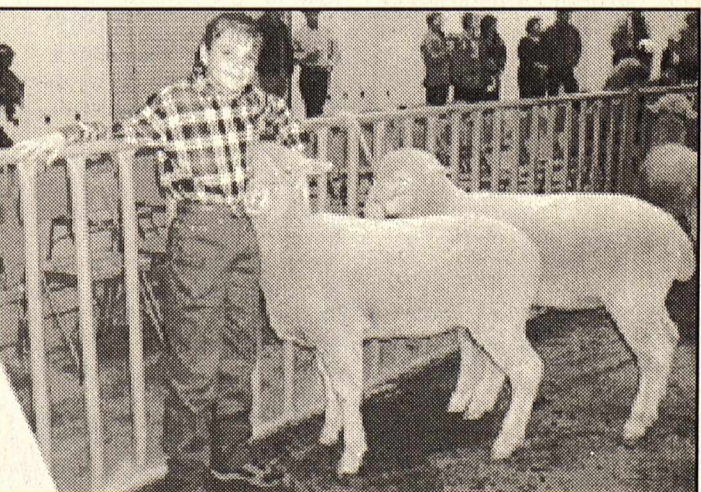
