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


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Relay for Life Chairman attends training



But how do you know what "success" is? Most of us are pursuing it in one way or another, and I've been thinking about this quite a bit lately. For one thing, I'm getting sort of close to the age when some guys seem to start having mid-life crises. (I'm

in mid-life if I assume that I'll live to be 4 and if I'm only thinking about "earthly" life, but still . . .) Since I'd like to avoid changing wives, buying a Harley, or getting a tattoo, I prefer to be pro-active as I think about this "success" stuff.

The "business" I'm in hap-

pens to be professional Christian ministry. I go to work every day at a building called a church which houses the meetings of people called the "church" who are part of a MUCH larger group called the church, Christ's universal Body made up of Christ's people everywhere and at all times and in all places. Seems to me that anyone who is part of that group is deeply "successful."

But you know as well as I do that if I go to a ministry conference somewhere and a clergy compadre asks me over coffee, "So how's your church doing?" he's not asking about Christ's universal church. If he's a genuine friend or genuinely interested, it's a level question; if he's a clergy climber who's rarely been in any church over 18 months and who would

preach scorching sermons against members who leave marriages for prettier wives as often as he leaves smaller churches for glitsier ones, he just wants to assure himself that it's smaller than "his." Whatever the character of the questioner, he probably wants to know if the church is "growing" or "declining"-by which he almost certainly means in numerical membership. Built anything lately? Added a service or three to make sure that "traditional" and "contemporary" or just "confused" worshipers never have to worship with each other one hour in any but the "style" they prefer?

"How's your church doing?" Well, I think we're doing really well, thanks, and growing. But we pastoral types need to remember that "our" churches aren't "ours." Truly "successful" pastors remind themselves often that God's Kingdom and their kingdoms aren't the same thing and that, although "successful" folks are always ready to learn, real "growth" is not all wrapped up in going to the right seminars, following the latest church, growth guru, and punching the right buttons.

I've been blessed by many "successful" ministers. They loved God. They loved God's people. They experienced gen-uine church growth. Sometimes larger. Also deeper. They worked hard but with joy and the right kind of contentment and were able to relax at the end of a day, enjoy a sunset, and realize that the only real growth that lasts and matters is the kind empowered by the God who gives us sunsets.

I hope God calls that success. If he does, that's what I want!

What about you? What does "success" mean to you? And, while your head's hurting anyway, have a go at this question: what do you think "success" means for your church?

Harold Pollard


Harold Pollard served in the U.S. Army during WWII.

It's a family tradition

Thanksgiving is my second favoritest holiday of the year (Halloween being my first choice) mostly because it's around my birthday, two of my uncles' birthdays and several friends' birthdays and we usually have one huge birthday shin-dig. (We also include my mother in on this extravaganza, seeing as how her birthday is at the beginning of December and the more, the merrier, right?)

Anyway, for as long as I can remember (note: I don't remember things well...) we have always celebrated our birthdays on Thanksgiving. Up until here recently, we would have the traditional turkey dinner, with dressing, stuffing, pies, cranberry squishy stuff and all that jazz PLUS birthday cake for everyone! More recently, we grew tired of the same-old same-old and ventured to different menus across the world trying new foods as a part of Thanksgiving.

Who said you had to have turkey and corn and stuffing and such? There are lots of things and many foods to be thankful for.

I thought I would share some old traditions and some making of new ones with the foods we enjoy most during the holidays.

I love to cook, but I hate cleaning up my messes when



I'm done. (My mother is nodding her head in absolute agreement at this moment. She remembers when we used to make tortillas and cookies all the time when I was little and I always wanted to make and then eat them, but never to clean up my mess... or my room for that matter.) I not only hate, but loath, washing dishes, so anything I can do that requires minimal mess is good with me. So, here are some traditional, and possibly, non-trad recipes for Thanksgiving that are virtually mess-free and easy.

The recipes

My aunt Roxy says, "Okay, the pumpkin dip is a new thing, but I am willing to share it with the readers of the Muleshoe Journal." So here it is. It's yummy with ginger-



Pumpkin Dip

3 1/2 c. powdered sugar, sifted 2'-8 oz. pkg. cream cheese, softened 1 can (15 oz.) pumpkin pie filling 2 tsp. ground cinnamon

1/2 tsp. ground nutmeg


In a large mixing bowl, mix all ingredients with mixer set on medium speed until blended. Store in an airtight container in the refrigerator. Serve with gingersnap cookies.

I thought I was going to get someone to provide my

recipe which is fabulous, but my aunt informed me that one doesn't exist. (I think everyone in my family is yanking my chain on that one—they don't want to tell me until I'm, like, too old to remember it anyway.) Roxy told me in can't remember if it was last year or the year before, when an e-mail: "Now for Nanny's coleslaw recipe... there isn't one because there never was one! She told me it was shredded cabbage and coleslaw dressing you buy in the store: 1 head of green cabbage, 1/2 head of purple cabbage, 1 c. of carrots. (Add mayo and vinegar.) That is basically coleslaw. Now Nanny did have an awesome macaroni salad. I used to eat it when I would come in from a date. It is the perfect midnight snack."

So, here's that:

Macaroni salad



4 stalks of celery

1 med. tomato chopped 2 green onions chopped 1/2 tsp. cilantro

1/2 tsp. parsley

radishes (optional, I don't like radishes)

Just enough mayo to put a nice glaze on everything. Mix it all in a big bowl.

One of my faves and something the kids can even help



Sausage Balls

Yield: 48 balls.

2 c. buttermilk baking mix 1 lb. pork sausage

1-11 oz. can condensed cream of

Cheddar cheese soup

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. In a large bowl, combine the baking mix, sausage and cheddar cheese soup. Mix well and shape into 1-inch balls. Bake for 15 to 20 minutes or until a toothpick inserted in the center comes out clean and the balls are golden brown.

Mashed potatoes are also another popular item on our menu. We like to add sour cream and cheddar cheese while they cook-If you know how to make them from scratch, they taste even better!

Cranberry sauce from the can—no skin, thank you very much— and a fried turkey from "Uncle" Jim and "Aunt" Donna Black (our adopted family who brings the entertainment for every holiday with their trips to the emergency room or at least the call to the EMS...) is something we all like. We also do the brown sugar glazed ham when we're not being so nontraditional. Don't forget the pecan and pumpkin pies for dessert! We also do margaritas for the adults and sodas for the kiddos.

My memories of Thanksgiving: We've had Thanksgiving at my mom's, Thanksgiving at my grandma's, Thanksgiving at my aunt's, my uncle's, and heck, we've had Thankgiving in a barn! But those are more traditional memories I vaguely remember. The holidays out of the ordinary I tend to remember best.

Like, I do remember having pheasant one year for Thanksgiving. It was interesting to watch my mom and dad prepare the bird. Mom was trying to not gag and dad was laughing at her. I was around seven years old and

Anyway, he and his son, Matt, a Boy Scout keep in mind, and my baby brother, not a Boy Scout, but attended many of their events and very well could do anything a Scout could do, were in one group, and me, my mother, her boyfriend, Will (this was his idea, by the way), and Mike's other son, Steven, were in another group.



However, that didn't pan out and probably for a good reason... who knows what we'll do this year. Sometimes, it's a spur of the moment "Richard's family tradition" that makes family worth putting up with and all the fun in the world to be around!

> And my family is what I'm most thankful for this Thanksgiving.



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

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No more floating checks; new 'Check 21' act in effect

Muleshoe State Bank announced last week that banking is changing across the country. Last year congress passed the "Check Clearing for the 21st Century Act," now referred to as "Check 21."

This new law came into effect Oct. 28, 2004. This change allows electronic images of checks to be sent from bank to bank for payment. This law will affect the timeliness of the check process, help reduce paper documents handled in the check system, and quickly resolve fraud issues.

Your bank may already furnish an image of your account history. If so, you may not notice a lot of change in your account except that the payment of checks written may happen more quickly. Everyone needs to realize that they should not write check on the accounts available in the account.
