



It's beginning to "feel" a lot like Christmas

Dreaming of a white reach of children. Never display Christmas? Texas received fair warning that cold weather was on it's way this week, with prediction of possible snow flurries in many parts of our state. A second push of arctic air is expected Thursday afternoon, with the coldest temperatures this year expected Friday morning! The Arctic airmass will begin to lift eastward on Christmas Day, followed by south winds and a return to near normal temperatures Sunday and Monday.

Residents of Sutton County and West Central Texas should prepare for the prolonged period of cold temperatures, low wind chills and brief periods of light wintry precipitation. Given the duration and intensity of the cold weather, extra care for the elderly will be necessary, as well as extra care for outdoor pets and livestock.

The American Red Cross urges families to take precautions to keep safe. "This kind of weather usually results in heat loss and power outages; therefore, it's important to know how to prepare your family," urges Connie Harvey, health and safety expert at American Red Cross national headquarters "Keeping safe and warm in cold weather means you have to take care of home heating hazards, dressing appropriately and preparing for cold weather emergencies. Elderly people may have circulation problems and often just aren't as sensitive to the cold weather, so we need to take time to check on our elderly family members and friends," added Harvey. "Our elderly family and friends are often susceptible to hypother-

mia and frostbite." According to the National Fire Protection Association, four out of seven home fires occur during December, January and February, and about half of these fires are caused by using candles and overloading electrical circuits. As families turn to alternative heating sources out of necessity or to avoid the rising cost of oil and gas, they should take the

following precautions: * Be careful with candles -Keep candles away from combustible materials. Don't leave children unattended in a room with lit candles. Keep candles, matches and lighters out of the lighted candles in windows or near exits.

* Inspect fireplaces and wood stoves - Have your chimney connections and flues inspected by a professional and cleaned if necessary prior to the start of every heating season. Use a sturdy screen when burning fires. Burn only wood never burn paper or pine boughs. Do not hang holiday decorations from or on your fireplace if you plan to use it as a heat source.

* Check smoke detectors -Make sure detectors are working properly and that new batteries are installed.

* Be aware of overuse of electrical outlets - Don't overload your electrical outlets. Be careful of extension cords that present hazardous walkways.

As you and your family prepare to go out in sever cold weather, please remember the

* Mittens provide more warmth to your hands than

* Most of your body heat is lost through your head so wear a hat, preferably one that covers your ears.

* Dress in warm layers so you can remove items if you get too warm.

* Recognize the symptoms of hypothermia that can be a serious medical condition: confusion, dizziness, exhaustion and severe shivering. Seek medical attention immediately if you


have these symptoms. * Recognize frostbite warning signs: gray, white or yellow skin discoloration, numbness, waxy feeling skin. Seek medical attention immediately if you

have these symptoms. * Wear waterproof, insulated boots to help avoid hypothermia or frostbite by keeping your feet warm and dry and to maintain your footing in ice and

* Get out of wet clothes immediately and warm the core body temperature with a blanket or warm fluids like hot cider or soup. Avoid drinking caffeine or alcohol if you expect you, or someone you are trying to help, have hypothermia or frostbite.

Take advantage of this cold weather by staying inside with family and friends, and if you must be out in it, be careful and stay warm!

Fireworks believed to be cause of fire in Dry Devil's River



A small fire in the Dry Devil's River caused a lot of smoke on Monday.

The smell of smoke drifted through town on Monday, raising concerns to residents in the Sinoloa area. The Sonora Fire Department and City Police were soon called to respond to a small fire smoldering in the center of the The Dry Devil's River, near St. Ann St. The fire was found and put out before spreading too far, but lots of smoke filled the air. City police officer, Dick Dudley, reported that an investigation of the area shows the probable cause as fireworks. Officer Dudley said that considering the dry grass and windy conditions, they were lucky the fire did not spread and no one was injured.

this New Year's Eve the Product Safety Consumer Commission and the National Council on Fireworks Safety offer the following safety tips: Always read and follow

label directions.

Have an adult present. Buy from reliable sellers.

Use outdoors only. Always have water handy garden hose and a bucket). Never experiment or make

your own fireworks. Light only one firework at a

Never re-light a "dud" firework (wait 15 to 20 minutes and

then soak it in a bucket of Never give fireworks to

If necessary, store fireworks in a cool, dry place.

Dispose of fireworks properly by soaking them in water and then disposing of them in your trash can.

Never throw or point fireworks at other people.

Never carry fireworks in your pocket.

Never set off fireworks in metal or glass containers.

The lighter should always wear eye protection and never have any part of the body over the firework.

Stay away from illegal explosives.

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


wife, Anna, of Valley Spring, Texas; fourteen grandchildren; twenty-one great grandchildren; numerous nieces and nephews.


She was preceded in death by her parents; husband, Clarence Osbourn; and a brother, Wilma Larremo.

A. The Devil's River News shows us that George Wright, senior quarterback and Donald Fuqua, senior tackle, were named Tuesday to honorable mention on the Fort Worth Star-Telegram's All State Class A team.

There was discussion held of a cable system being brought to Sonora. It would have one 440 foot tower and would cost \$150 to tie into and \$6 a month for the fee. The cheapest TV available locally was \$150, and we have found that the tie in fee and a TV could be financed locally. Soon everyone in town could have cable service from Community TV Inc. a company being formed by Edwin Sawyer and Jack Mackey and the Jerrold Electronics Corp. of Philadelphia.

Under letters to Santa we

Out-of-School Examinee Registration Packets for February Exit Level TAAS or TAKS retests available


During each regular exit level test administration, individuals who are no longer enrolled in school and who have not previously met minimum expectations on all sections of the TAAS or TAKS retest, but have met all other graduation requirements, may retake the necessary section(s).

The TEAMS test will no longer be administered. Examinees eligible for TEAMS will take the exit level reading and/or math TAAS test(s). TEAMS students are not required to take the writing tests. TAAS scores will be matched to the TEAMS passing standard.

Business Tips: Trim Your Tax Tree

Ah, it's that magical time of year again. Sleigh bells, reindeer, holiday parties, and yearend tax planning!! Okay, so trimming your taxes is not nearly as fun as trimming a tree but it certainly has its own rewards come April 15th. So, before you take another swig of eggnog, spend a few hours figuring out what tax saving moves you should make between now and December 31st. Here are six to consider this year:

Pour over your books. Do you have any bad debt in your accounts receivable, that is, invoices that have remained unpaid for six months or more? If so, you may be able to claim a deduction, but only if you've made serious efforts to collect the money before year-end. Hiring a collection agency or sending certified late-notice letters are two of the best ways to prove to the IRS you have tried.

Next, tally up your profits and calculate your tax tab. Have you paid nearly enough in quarterly taxes to cover your 2004 bill? If not, you've got plenty of company. According to a study conducted by the American Institute of Professional Bookkeepers, the number one mistake small business owners make is to pay too little in estimates. If you find yourself in this situation, you may want to reduce your income by claiming as many legitimate deductions as possible and set aside monies for the tax bill soon to come.

To find out deductions for which you may qualify, as well as the paperwork you will need to support those deductions, be sure to visit a qualified accountant. This year, deduction limits have increased on a few items, most notably tangible assets. Under the IRS's Section 179 rule, you can deduct up to \$100,000 in furniture, computers, vehicles and other tangible equipment purchased in 2004.

But do not rush out and buy a sleek new desk just yet. First, you must consider next year's earnings. In any kind of budget or cash flow projections, you have to look at more than one year, especially when approaching year-end. For instance, if you have a big contract (and lots of revenue) coming up next year, you might want to delay

purchasing equipment now and buy it in January 2005.

Similarly, by projecting your 2005 earnings, you can determine whether it makes the most sense to speed up revenues this year or do the opposite. For instance, if this year's earnings are exceptionally high, you may want to delay billing in December. That way, your customers will pay late and you won't get the income until January 2005.

The final and best way to keep taxes at bay is to place cash into a retirement plan. Don't have the money? No problem. As long as you file for extensions, you can have until October 15th of next year to come up with the cash for this year's plans. Just don't get behind on your planning efforts for 2005. See, Uncle Sam isn't such a Grinch after all!! Ho, ho, ho Happy Holidays from the IRS to you!



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Holiday indoor plants take special care to last

COLLEGE STATION - A white Christmas may be dreamy, but those who love plants want to keep it green, at least indoors, during the winter

Decorated pots of poinsettias, Christmas cactus and amaryllis can be an attractive interior garden to be kept healthy long after the chestnuts have roasted on an open fire.

Texas Cooperative Extension horticulturists and their corps of highly trained Master Gardeners have a few pointers for keeping holiday plants healthy long after the season is over.

Poinsettias

Buy a healthy plant. Is the foliage vividly green? Are the tiny buds in the middle of the plant green and closed tightly? Those are signs of a good plant, the horticulturists say.

It does not need a lot of water. In fact, it should be allowed to dry out between waterings, according to Dr. Doug Welsh, Extension horticulturist, and don't feed it. Put the poinsettia in a room with a comfortable temperature, bright light and no drafts.

After the holidays, many horticulturists recommend tossing the plant because it is a little picky about growing and blooming for anyone but a serious nursery operator.

But those who like a challenge can try getting the poinsettia to bloom again.

'This is not easy to accomplish, but dedicated gardeners sometimes succeed," Welsh said. After most of the leaves fall off, reduce the watering and store the dormant plant in a cool, well ventilated place at 60° F or above (the garage is an excellent place for these less than attractive plants).

In March prune back the stems to about 6 inches above the ground and re-pot the plant into a container which is 1 to 2 inches larger in diameter than the original pot. A good potting mix should be used.

Water the plant thoroughly and place it in a sunny window, keeping it at 70° to 75° F. When new growth begins, the poinsettia should be fertilized every two weeks with a water soluble, complete fertilizer. Follow label instructions.

Once the danger of frost is past, the plant can be moved outdoors where it receives moderate shade in mid-afternoon. As growth develops, the top can be cut or pinched back leaving three or four leaves on each shoot. Repeat this procedure each time the plant sends out new shoots until mid-August. Then bring the plant indoors and set it near a sunny window where the temperature will remain between 65° to 70° F.

In warmer areas of the United States, poinsettias can be planted outdoors in a place protected from frost.

From the first of October until the colored leaves can be seen, the poinsettia should not receive any light at night. Cover the plant at dusk using a lightproof bag or box and uncover about 8 a.m. A closet may be ideal to put it in at night. Even a quick, short exposure to dim light can prevent flowering.

Keep damp, not wet, in bright light, out of drafts and away from heating ducts.

Poinsettias planted in the ground are more difficult to handle. Poinsettias are cold-sensitive and may freeze if left unprotected. They must be exposed to a short-day lighting period to ensure Christmas color. This means that an earthbound plant would have to be covered for 15 hours daily. Christmas Cactus

Christmas cactus (Schlumbergera bridgesii) is an old-fashioned plant characterized by glossy, flat, chain-like segments and a pendant (flower) that is usually red or reddish-

orange. Christmas cactus is an epiphyte, which means in nature it grows hanging from trees in tropical forests.

As a houseplant Christmas cactus does best in coarse, porous soils high in organic matter. Use half sand and half fine bark or course peat moss. Provide excellent drainage and allow plants to become drier between watering just prior to bloom. Fertilize every two to four months with a standard balanced houseplant fertilizer when plants are actively growing. Place it away from doorways, heating vents or other drafty locations. Christmas cactus blooms best if kept pot-

Christmas cactus can be encouraged to rebloom by keeping it in total darkness from 6 p.m. to 8 a.m. beginning Sept. 1 until buds form. If keeping them in total dark at night is difficult, there's another option. At temperatures around 55° F or slightly lower, Christmas cactus loses its short-day requirements for flower bud setting. If you leave plants outside until frost threatens, they should have a nighttime temperature of 45° to 55° F for four weeks, which should encourage buds. Bring them inside before a frost.

Start new plants after blooming season by cutting 3to 4-inch segments and inserting them in moist sand. Repot once the roots are visible.

Here's a care calendar for the cactus.

December-February: When the cactus has finished flowering, it needs about two months' rest. Give it almost no water or fertilizer at this time.

March-May: The cactus will begin to grow, with sprouts appearing at the tips of joints. Begin to water and add a small amount of diluted fertilizer. This is the time to repot if necessary.

* June-July: The plant needs a second rest period. Water sparingly and do not fertilize, but do not let the soil dry completely.

August-September: Increase watering; never let the plant dry out. Flower buds-will begin to form. Keep the plant in one place, as drafts or sudden changes in light may cause the buds to fall off. Give very large plants a little fertilizer now. Flowers will form on healthy

This cactus can live for many years and grow quite

Amaryllis

The amaryllis, another popular holiday plant, is prolific and long-lived. This bulb will produce showy trumpets year after year with minimal care.

After the blossoms wither, cut the flower stem 1 inch above the base. Water and feed regularly, and provide plenty of light. Amaryllis may be summered outdoors, initially in partial shade and then into full sunlight. "Plant" the pots in a flower bed to help retain mois-

For Christmas blooms next year, place the pots on their sides in late September. Do not water. In November, remove the old foliage, replace the top 1 or 2 inches of potting soil. The bulbs like to be crowded and should have about 1 inch between the bulb and the pot. Thoroughly water and wait until growth.

The new flower bud and stem will emerge and bloom in three to eight weeks. Water sparingly at first, increasing the amount as the stem elongates. Sunlight is essential during the growing stage. Rotate the pot to encourage straight stems. Water generously during blooming, and remove from direct sunlight to prolong the life of the bloom.

Depending on the bulb size, one to three stems will be produced. Each bulb will provide several weeks of spectacular



Transportation agency approves \$600 million package

AUSTIN - Texans are getting an early holiday present -\$600 million in highway safety improvement projects approved last Thursday by the Texas Transportation Commission.

The money won't really be coming from Santa Claus, of course. Texas voters in 2003 gave the Department of Transportation authority to sell up to \$3 billion in bonds to pay for highway improvement projects, with up to 20 percent dedicated to safety improvements. This is the first tangible result of that, the largest highway safety improvement project in Texas

history. The money will fund 644 Texas Transportation Institute's Safety Center estimates will save 90 lives and prevent 1,100 injuries a year. All the contracts will be let by August 2006, with many of the projects getting under way before then.

The projects include widening 1,600 miles of roadway, installing 740 miles of median barriers, 171 left turn lanes and 10 new overpasses.

Collectively, they will reduce run-off-the-road accidents, head-on collisions and rear-end crashes, TxDOT says.

"Nearly 37,000 Texas teachers leave the classroom each year taking their skills to better-paying jobs or simply quitting," Strayhorn said.

Also recommended in the projects across the state that the report is an automatic statefunded salary adjustment every two years, an expanded mentor program for teachers and a \$2,500 bonus to teachers at low-performing schools that raised their ranking from "academically unacceptable" to
