the estimation of C. H. Elliott. rietor of the Elliott Appliance tore here, and sales agency for butane gas systems and equipment, butane underground gas systems are becoming the most popular heating units beyond the natural gas mains for rural homes, and likewise are attracting more city homes.

Pointing to the increasing use of the butane systems, Elliott gives a series of reasons drawn from his experience with the use of the individual plants. And making a check of the high percentage in use now, he states that there are approximately 25,000 butane systems in Texas at present, with regular installations pushing that figure higher weekly. Taking in to consideration the fact that this area has no natural gas service, there are probably as many systems per capita in this territory as any other in the state.

In Mr. Elliott's opinion, use of the gas systems for economical fuel, water-heating, cooking, refrigeration, and even lighting purposes, is one the greatest selling leads. Less moyance and more sanitary for home use is also stressed as a big

Dear Bill:

Mr. Lewis tells me he brought 650 head of the John Hutson cows here (that is the R. O. Ranch) from the Spurs, in the Spring of 1915. Among them were three cows, that the King of England, King Edward the Seventh, sent to Mr. Hutson as a present, picked from the best in England. They were some of the best ever in this State. He is still keeping those cows or the decendants of them, and that herd, to raise his range bulls from. There are probably three or four hundred of them now, and he brands them with The Spur on the left thigh. Our partnership brand is The Spur on the Hip (the Under-Bit cattle). I hope this will be of some use to you.

R. E. Rorie These T Anchor, Hutson cows, were the first Registered cows and the only ones ever brought to the Spur Ranch up to 1915. From the above letter it will be seen that The Old Spur Brand is very much alive and is not dead or disused. It has been actively used by the owners of this brand, from the time it was first started in this country, in 1878, for Jim Hall, until now, 1937. and is likely to be in use for many years to come.
