## The Hog Business Important Industry In Bailey County

The hog business in Bailey county is rapidly coming to the front as one of the important industries. The growing of grain is one of the main stimulants in the business. Some splendid reports have come to our attention, and we want to pass them out to our readers.

B. B. Dennis, one of our progressive stock farmers, reports from two red sows, the sale of \$500 worth of pigs during the year 1926.

Ed. Hupp, who lives in the Y. L. Community, was in town Saturday with seven pigs that were born December 15, and weighed 198 pounds, bringing him a neat check for \$124.65. Pretty good for one litter.

C. W. Mick of the Big Square community, was also in the city Saturday with four head of hogs that he placed on feed at the weight of 70 pounds each March 1. They tipped the scales at 235 pounds each.

Eight months ago Ray Griffiths and M. S. Stidham started buying hogs from the farmers, and they report paying \$19,966.46 for hogs. Lewis Pierce has also shipped four cars of hogs in addition to the above shipments.

This part of the Plains is rapidly gaining in the feeding of cattle and hogs, due to plentiful and cheap feed.

# Women in the West

ON SUNDAY, May 8, the heart of America will be quickened at the thought of one word—"Mother."

For this is Mother's day, an annual event which is generally observed, not by Presidential proclamation, but because sentiment decrees that the second Sunday in May of each year shall be the day upon which we honor the women who gave us birth.

Mother's day has a special significance because of at least two distinct projects which are under way to honor one of the most heroic types of motherhood the world has ever known—the pioneer mother of America.

One of them is the announced purpose of E. W. Marland, an Oklahoma millionaire, of erecting a heroic statue of "The Pioneer Woman" on the famous Cherokee strip in Oklahoma, the last government land opened to homesteaders.

"The Pioneer Mother" is to be immortalized in bronze in another western city when the monument by that name (shown in the illustration above) is unveiled in Penn Valley park in Kansas City this spring.

## The Prairie Mother

She came to rock the cradle of a new empire. Adventure calls to men, but duty summons women. And so, when the time was ripe to breed new stars for the flag, she set forth from Mainz and Ohio and Kentucky's loveliness and her Swedish village and her forest home to mother the wilderness.

Only God and she know the fullness of her giving to the young Northwest. She lived in sod houses and hay-roofed huts, with the nearest neighbor often a day's drive away.

She had no deencies. She did not knit and talk on the floor or fireplace. Her meal was ground in a hand mill and her baking range was a makeshift oven in the yard.

She helped in the fields—at the plowing and she sowing, and she plowed and she sowed the crop and blind the sheaves.

She watered stock and spun and knitted and tallied. She made a garden and preserved the fruit in her jars, and she nursed her children.

Her beauty "slipped" began at ten and ended at four. There in her "Sunday best" she wore a dress of orange and a hat of orange, a box of sweets or a gift of remembrance.

She fought drought and death and savages and savage loneliness, her "Sunday best" were called and lined woolsey. She grew old at the rate of twenty-four months a year at the grubbing, hoe and the washtub and the churn.

She bore her burdens alone for her children, her aching back, her poor, arched hands. Or for the wistful memories of a fairer youth in sweeter lands.

She saved the great Northwest and was too proud to quibble at the cost of the stalwart men of the frontier.

pioneer mother defending her children? When the frontier was pushed back to the summit of the Appalachian mountains the pioneer mother stood beside her man and looked down into the fertile Ohio valley and saw with him the vision of their future home.

She also faced the unknown terrors of the "Dark and Bloody Ground" of Kentucky and helped him hold it against the frenzied attempts of the Indians to eject the white man from his best-loved hunting ground.

In that dark period of 20 years—from the outbreak of the Revolution to the time of "Mad Anthony" Wayne's victory over the confederated tribes of the Northwest—when the fate of the white settlement in the Mississippi valley hung in the balance, it was the pioneer woman quite as much as the pioneer man who decided the issue.

But not all of the courage of the pioneer mother was shown when it came to a hand-to-hand encounter. So long as her husband repeated the story she heard at their mothers' knees, so long will they tell of the women of Bryan's Station. These were the women who, when the station was surrounded by Indians, volunteered to go to a spring nearby and bring the water which the defenders of the fort would need so badly when the battle began.

The Indians were "jing ling" preparing for a surprise attack. If the men went for water the attack would be precipitated. If the women went as usual, the savages MIGHT refrain from revealing their presence by attacking the water-bearers. Again they might not, but they took it, walked steadily down to the spring, conscious all the time of snake-like eyes glittering at them from the bushes close at hand, filled their buckets and walked steadily back to the safety of the stockaded walls.

And they didn't spill a drop of water. That was the type of courage these pioneer mothers possessed.

But hostile Indians were not the only terror which the pioneer mother faced and conquered. She faced and conquered the terrors of loneliness in isolated cabins, of starvation, of bitter winters and sultry summers, whose stagnation brought sickness and death to her and her family with no doctors within hundreds of miles. Too often was it true that "My mother she was merry and brave, And so she came to her labor With a tall green fern for a doctor bag, And a stream for a comforting neighbor."

When the American frontier crossed the Mississippi and the last westward push began, in the forefront of that long line of heroic figures which make up the splendid pageant of the West, were the women who dominated the group by Proctor—the figure of the pioneer mother, her baby in her arms and her face turned toward the West. Flooded rivers, prairie fires, snow-dilled mountain passes, Indian attacks, hunger and thirst and sickness could not hold her back. Her face was turned to the west and when she followed the "star of empire" to her goal she had helped build a nation.

## QUEER QUIRKS IN HUMAN DESTINY

The Sacrifice of Virginia. THE sacrifice of a beautiful virgin brought destruction to the decemvirate of 400 B. C., one of the most vicious and tyrannical governments that ancient Rome ever knew.

Appius Claudius was the political boss of the day. He had been chosen as one of the decemvirs, a board of ten men, to revise the legal code of Rome. In this office he made such use of his authority that the election for the year following resulted in the election of himself and nine friends as decemvirs and rulers of Rome.

Murder, corruption and rapine marked this oligarchical government. "War with the Sabines and Aequians broke out that year. Lucius Virginius, a centurion, hastened to the war, leaving at home a beautiful daughter named Virginia. This girl had the misfortune to encounter Appius Claudius one day on her way to school and the politician became infatuated with a desire to possess her.

When Virginia learned of her betrothal, Appius coached one of his clients to claim the girl as a slave. This client, Marcus Claudius, seized the opportunity and she was taken to the trial. The trial came up before Appius in accordance with his design and he decided in favor of his henchman's claim.

The people of Rome were greatly excited by the horrid injustice. The judge was compelled to grant a delay. Messengers informed Virginius of his daughter's peril, and he left the city to hasten home. His plea to Appius, backed by the entreaties of the matrons of Rome, was denied.

Virginius then begged leave to speak to his daughter and her nurse. The father took the daughter aside, seized a knife from a butcher's stand and plunged it into her breast. This was her honor saved. Before court attendants could lay hands on Virginius he had broken through the crowd, mounted his horse and fled to the army. The soldiers were so incensed by the story that they placed themselves under leadership of Virginius in the crusade and denounced the government. Appius was slain, imprisoned and either died or was slain. The tyranny of the decemvirs was wiped out by the blood of a virgin.

When the Pope Had a Rival THE existence of a rival pope, Clement II, caused Pope Urban II to call upon all Christendom to join in the crusade, a step that stirred medieval Europe to the greatest co-operative movement mankind had ever known and resulted in the capture of Jerusalem by the Christian King of Jerusalem.

From the Fourth century, when Christianity triumphed over paganism in Rome, it had been the custom of Christian devotees to make pilgrimages to the holy sepulcher at Jerusalem. The Byzantine empire had encouraged these visits, but the Seljuk Turks, who held Jerusalem in 1094, began persecuting pilgrims.

Peter the Hermit of Amiens, France, carried a message from the Greek Patriarch of Constantinople to Pope Urban II, urging that the Holy city be delivered from the hands of the infidel. It was not the first appeal of the kind, but it was the first reason for undertaking an ambitious enterprise. The Germano-Roman emperor had set up a rival pope, Clement III, in the city of Rome.

When the crusade began, it was believed that food and supplies would be miraculously provided by God and, when the mirage failed, the knights lived on the land in passing.

By the time Godfrey of Bouillon arrived in the east, more than 300,000 crusaders had perished. After several weeks with Turkish and Saracens, 40,000 knights survived to capture Jerusalem and set up the Christian Kingdom of Jerusalem, of which Godfrey of Bouillon became ruler as "Defender of the Holy Sepulcher." The kingdom lasted nearly a century.

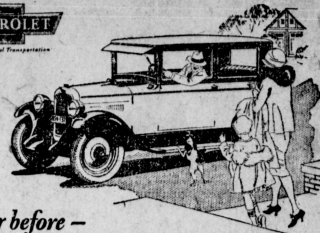

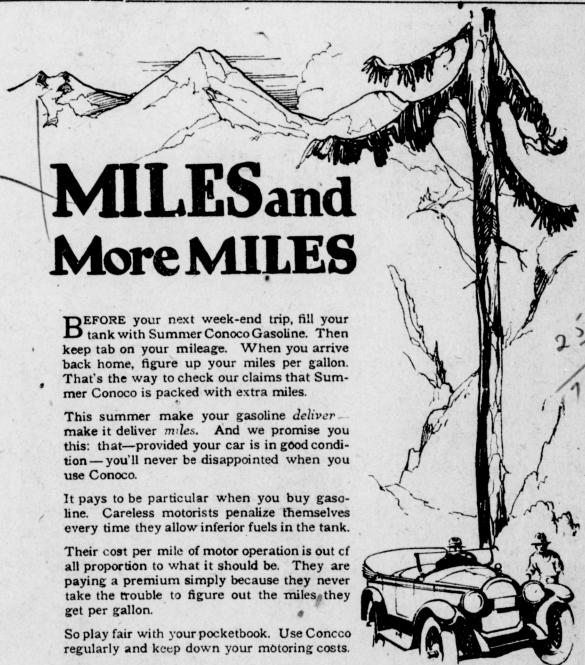
