Spur, Dickens County, Texas



It was part of my work after a while to keep the ranch supplied with fresh beef. To do so it was necessary to kill a calf every third day or so. As antelope were plentiful, I took to killing them for their hind quarters. After a while the boys rebelled and said they would make me eat it all myself, if I killed any more. They wanted beef. Personally I never could tell much difference, both were good. Once, intending to bring in some fresh antelope meat, I saw some on a point running out from Soldier Mound. I was in some mesquite brush through which the road then went, about 300 yards from the antelope. I picked, as I thought, a young buck and shot him through the shoulder. When I went to dress him, there lay two. I had broken the neck of one standing along side which I had never seen. That second antelope was the only one I ever wantonly killed, and that being an accident, I claim it was excusable.

The antelope like the buffalo are nearly gone.

WOLVES AND PANTHERS CHAPTER XLV

I am sure no intelligent person will question the many hundreds of thousands of buffalo that used to be on the plains and in Texas. Yet today they are gone, except for a few in parks and in preserves. Of the men now living in Dickens County, there are only three that I know of, W. R. Stafford, W. L. Hyatt, and J. D. Raines, who ever saw "The Thundering Herd." The mustangs too are gone; extinct; and they used to be in The Spur Country in numbers. So are the wild turkeys, in this part of Texas.

There used to be hundreds of Loafer (Lobo) wolves here as well as a good many panthers. The loafer wolves are different wolves from the timber wolves, altho greatly resembling them. They are much larger. They are entirely different from the Coyte, being nearly three times as large. They usually kill their own food; and unless very old rarely ever eat tainted meat. While the covote is a scavenger, and eats anything from grass hoppers up. The damage done by the loafer wolves to owners of cattle, in the Spur Country, amounted to many thousands of dollars annually. . The first of those loafer wolves I ever saw was in the spring of 1888 when we were bringing back the Spur cattle that were wintered in the R O S Range. We were in the Pitchfork Pasture and had left the herd to graze up to

where we were to eat dinner. We had topped the shinnery ridge, and were looking down on a mesquite flat where there was a windmill. On the flat about a mile from us, we saw a small herd of cattle rounded up. Suddenly one of the boys said, "look younder fellows." There were seven or eight lobo wolves circling the cattle. We all had guns (pistols) in those days so we raced to help those cattle. The wolves were so intent on their quarry that they never noticed us, but before we could ride that mile, they had cut out from the bunch a three-year-ald steer and had him down. We got within shooting distance but none of them were hit. When we got back to the steer and examined him, the leg just above the hock, (the ham string) was cut as clean as if with a knife, and the muzzle was ripped to pieces. Those wolves (the Lobo) never, that I ever heard of, attack a human being. They must be very similar to the Russian wolves which do so. Most of us will remember the stories in our readers, and so did Mr. Lomax. Mr. Lomax, as you will remember, was manager of The Spurs in 1888. He owned a black retreiver dag named Rook, who in the fall of that year heard "the call of the wild" and answered it. For two or three nights we had heard a loafer wolf howl near the ranch headquarters, and Rook would bark in reply. Finally Rook disappeared but no one thought much about it.

In the following spring (1889) Mr. Lomax was returning from Fort Worth to the ranch. As he was driving along the road, on a part of it then known as Dockum Flat, he saw a bunch of wolves some distance east of him. They kept coming closer to the buggy, finally dropping behind. He drove on, not paying a great deal of attention to them, until the team (Lick and Gravy) started up as if they wanted to get away from there. On looking round to see what had startled them he saw the wolves much closer and right behind him. One of the bunch took in after the buggy and was soon along side, and tried to jump

any attempt was made to try to exterminate them. He got the Matadors, the Pitchforks, and other surrounding ranches, to agree to pay a bounty of \$5.00 for each scalp of a loafer wolf killed on the respective ranches. That made it profitable for those who "went after the wolves" as a business, and he was largely instrumental in getting The State of Texas to offer a like bounty on them, so that each wolf (Lobo) killed was worth (\$10.00) Ten Dollars.

There were two boys working in The Spur branding outfit, named Charlie Humphrey and Will Monroe. They were kind of buddies. Both are alive today. I think it was late in the month of June 1894, anyhow we were working the East Pasture. On the round-up Charlie saw a Loafer wolf disappear in a little draw, and as it had rained the night before, he tracked it to the den. which was on Little Red Mud. As he had no time to fool with it then he marked the place so that he could return to it. After dinner he and Will borrowed the cook's spade, and pulled out to investigate the den.

When they got to it they found they would have no digging to do as the entrance was large enough to let a man crawl through. It got much larger inside after a short distance. As Will was the smaller of the two he crawled in while Charlie stood with a gun at the entrance, in case any old one should come up. They could hear the pups snarling inside. After Will had gone in a short distance, the den opened up to quite a good sized cave.

Suddenly the den darkened, and Will told Charlie to get out of the light. Charlie was having the ride of his life, and troubles of his own. He had been standing at the entrance with legs apart, and what darkened the den was an old one getting out as fast as she could, giving Charlie a ride and landing him on his back. There were several off-sets to the den, and she had been in one of them with her pups when Will passed her. When Will got his bearings he commenced handing out the pups to Charlie, and he killed them as they were handed out to him. In all those boys got fifty-three or fifty-four pups out of that one den. They were of course of all sizes and ages, from those almost ready to leave the den to those not over a week old.

The larger pups they scalped, but they brought the smaller and very little ones "in their altogether," so as to show they were entitled to the scalp, All these pups they cashed in at \$10.00 each; \$5.00 from the company and \$5.00 from The State of Texas. This is a matter of record, anyone can verify this if they care to do so by looking up the records of the Commissioners Court of Dickens County for July or August 1894. After this haul the bounty on pups, while in he den, was cut to \$2.50 by the different cattle companies while the bounty on old ones remained at \$5.00 per. The bounty on coyotes was \$1.00.

During the slaughter of the buffalo they must have increased enormously. It was not until Mr. Horsbrug became manager of The Spurs that



NEW WOMAN WORKER NAMED FOR FSA IN NORTHWEST TEXAS


