## U. S. Is Evidently Getting 600,000 Mark If Other Towns Are Abreast Of Spur

With the announcement from President Roosevelt that he seeks to have 600,000 men in the army within a short time, it simultaneously appears that there will be no shortage if America's other cities keep abreast of Spur.

That figure, of course, includes three units—the regular army, the national guard and reserve officers, and at present lacks but a few thousand men being at that mark.

A message comes back "from over the waves" to Mr. and Mrs. "Shorty" Hogan from their son, Mark, that he is enjoying life as a sailor on the broad Pacific. He has expressed a desire to get into Annapolis, "the Water West Point," but has not received assurance of entry to date.

Others who have joined the ranks from here are Thurman Shirley, coast artillery; Curtis Holly, air corps; Milton Cox, air corps; T. M. Rape, coast artillery, and Orville Bailey, signed with the regulars.

## M. E. Manning, 63, Dies Tuesday In Spur

Morris Edward Manning, 63, for almost 30 years identified with Spur's business world, active civic leader and a friend of the church and its advancement, died at 4:00 o'clock Tuesday morning following several days of illness. Death occurred in the Nichols Sanitarium.

Manning was born November 13, 1875, in Bellville, Texas. He would have been 64 years old next month.

On June 11, 1901, Manning was married to Miss Lula Wofford in Calerie, Indian Territory, Oklahoma. He and Mrs. Manning later made their home in Stamford, Texas, moving from that place to Spur when the town was only one year old, or in early December of 1910. To this union were born five children, four of whom survive.

A man of active, progressive nature, Manning had a varied business career. At an early date he founded the Spur Bottling Company, cold drink manufacturing concern, and entered later the manufacture of ice cream products. He has been automobile dealer, interested in other business concerns, and was for long cashier of the Spur National Bank. He had of late been holding a place here by appointment from the government.

Mrs. Manning preceded her husband in death, having passed away in Spur on January 27, 1936, but both have built a reserve of friendship and respect for the family that is a great heritage to the children and will long be remembered. Both Mr. and Mrs. Manning affiliated themselves with Spur Methodist Church in 1911, and both held membership in that religious institution at the time of their deaths.

Surviving are three sons, William, Santa Monica, California; Hilton, Los Angeles; Jack, also of Santa Monica; and Miss Frances Manning, Spur. There are also one brother and six sisters, George Maning, Detroit, Michigan; Mrs. Forrest Eikleberry, of Albany, Texas; Mrs. Walter Goodson, Oklahoma City; Mrs. Walter Spencer, Dallas; Mrs. Bill Berry, Amarillo; Mrs. Mildred O'Conner, New Ark, New Jersey, and Miss Eula Manning, Des Moines, Iowa.

Funeral services were conducted in the First Methodist Church of Spur Wednesday afternoon, 3:00 o'clock, with Rev. James E. Harrell, pastor, officiating. Campbell Funeral Home had charge of the body and interment in Spur cemetery.

## Work Expected To Begin This Week On Gas System

If present plans can be carried out without a hitch, City Manager Truman Green asserted yesterday, work is likely to start on the construction of the municipal gas system this week. Actual work, it was given out, will start just as soon as the pipe arrives, and it is slated to be shipped in some time this week.

Small gas drums for the butane gas have already been received for use of those who intend to use butane before the municipal plant is ready, and it was intimated that the rate would be almost identical with those charged by such cities as Fort Worth and Abilene.

In giving out specifications for tying-in to the city plant when it is ready, Green said the city does not intend to pipe houses for gas, as this must be done by some licensed plumber. The city will pipe gas to the property line, install the necessary valves and fittings, regulators and meters at no charge to the customer, however.

Those who have homes or places of business already piped for butane can go to the city office and get further particulars about securing the drums for use until the city plant is completed.

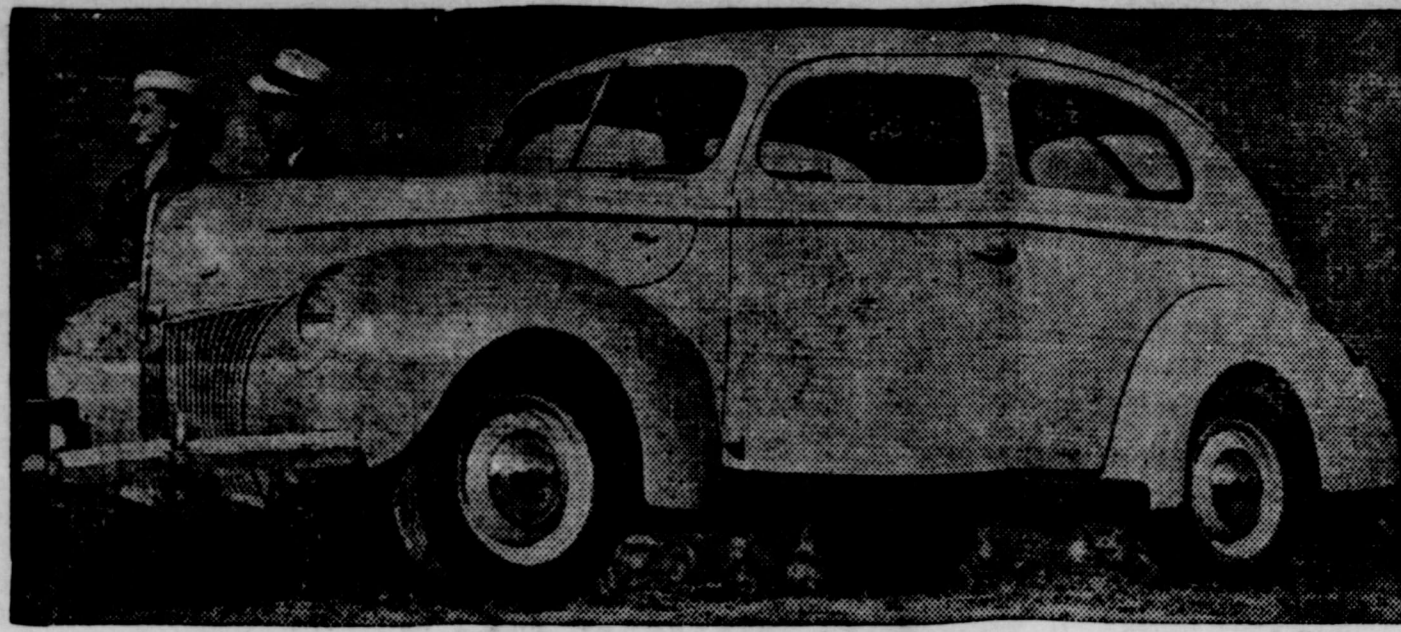

LIVESTOCK MOVEMENT DECREASES OVER PERIOD OF 1938

Ranchers of Texas sharply curtailed shipments of live stock to Ft. Worth markets and to interstate points during August, University of Texas statisticians have disclosed. Only a minute portion of the live stock movement to Fort Worth now goes by rail, Dr. F. A. Buechel, assistant director of the University Bureau of Business Research, explained. Trucks have been displacing rails until the latter traffic has almost ceased within the state, he said. Movement of all classes of live stock totaled 5,096 cars during August, down 22.5 per cent from the August, 1938, shipments.

SIX COUNTIES FLAGGED FOR PINK BOLLWORMS

Six Texas counties have been added to the quarantined area in Texas because of recent discovery of pink bollworm infestations in okra by the United States Department of Agriculture. This section, most of which lies along the Mexican border, has been enlarged to include Duval, Jim Hogg, La Salle, Maverick, Zapata, and Webb counties. Okra from the quarantined area must now be certified under the regulations.

6000 "Leathernecks" Will Be Added To Ranks

According to information released by O. C. Arthur, postmaster, from material received from the Dallas branch of Marines, a few Spur boys might make the grade for Marine service now if that happens to be their wish. In a letter from Capt. J. D. O'Leary, Officer in Charge of the Dallas recruiting station, to Arthur, he says: "We wish to take this opportunity to express our appreciation for the time you have taken from your regular duties as postmaster to assist the United States Corps in obtaining desirable young men to fill its ranks. The USMC is now making a methodical canvass of inland towns, particularly rural communities, with the view of finding the very best young men possible for enlistment in the Marines."

"Requirements for enlistment," O'Leary states further, "remain the same; young men between the ages of 18 and 30, white, unmarried, and without dependents; not less than 64 nor more than 74 inches tall, of good moral character, and of excellent physical condition. "However," Capt. O'Leary warns, "those wanting in the Marines should not delay long in making application. Only 6,000 young men out of the approximately 108,000 increase in complements of all armed forces of national defense are authorized by President Roosevelt for the Marine Corps. Thus, only one man out of each 18 qualified applicants will be accepted for the service with the 'Leathernecks.'"

Those interested in joining up with the Marines should see O. C. Arthur at the postoffice. Preliminary physical examinations, O'Leary informed, may be made by a local physician, after which the Dallas office will advise whether or not to proceed to Dallas.

### Holmgreen Thinks Ranchers Led Farmers

Texas farmers and ranchmen who last year let \$3,447,310 slip through their fingers by not earning their maximum soil-building and range-building allowances are not going to make the same mistake twice.

With only three months to go before the deadline for earning 1939 allowances under the Agricultural Conservation Program, a maximum of \$12,694,000 is available as payment for soil-building and range-building work in the state. E. N. Holmgreen, state AAA administrator, has announced.

Farmers in the state last year let the ranchmen run rings around them when it came to taking advantage of the assistance offered by the government in soil building work.

In 1938 the maximum soil-building allowance for all farms in the state was \$6,617,106, but the farmers earned only \$3,675,271, or 55 percent. The maximum for 1939 is \$6,205,000 and a much larger percentage is expected to be earned.

For range-building in 1938 the maximum which could be earned in the state was \$6,155,748, of which \$5,650,873 was earned, the ranchmen thus collecting more than 91 percent of the maximum allowance.

During the current year a maximum of \$6,489,000 is available with earnings expected to pass 95 percent of that amount.

Soil-building allowances for farms are figured on the difference between the total cultivated acreage and the acreage devoted to cotton, wheat and general crops with each acre worth 50 cents in the allowance. In addition, 2 cents per acre of non-crop open pasture land is allowed and \$1 is added for every animal unit the pasture is normally capable of grazing.

Ranch - building allowances are figured at 2 cents for each acre of range land plus \$1 for each animal unit of grazing capacity.

These allowances can be earned, by the operators by doing approved soil building and range-building, such as terracing contour ridging, construction of tanks and reservoirs and other practices with specified amounts of work counting as one unit and earning \$1.50. Unless the work is done, no payments are made.

### 5000 Cars Of Food Distributed In Texas

A locomotive would have to hump its back and do the impossible stunt of pulling 5,000 cars, to move the amount of food that has been distributed to underprivileged families of Texas by the Federal Surplus Commodities Corporation since 1933. A train of that length could leave two cars full at every town in the state with a post office.

Furthermore, the FSCC has used more than 26 million dollars to buy surplus commodities in Texas since 1933. These products went to undernourished people in this and other states and helped relieve Texas agricultural markets from an overstrain.

That is the summary of a report to the State Agricultural Conservation Committee at College Station by the Division of Information of the AAA, on steps taken in Texas to end the riddle of hunger despite plenty.

With funds authorized by the Agricultural Adjustment Act, the FSCC bought in Texas the first six months of this year, 21,300 barrels of corn meal; 1,600 bales of raw cotton and 1,188,861 yards of cottonfabrics; 738,000 boxes of grapefruit and 663,435 cases of grapefruit juice, processed from 28,845 tons of fresh fruit.

Also more than 8,746,000 pounds of onions; 3,908,000 pounds of rice; 17,850 barrels of wheat cereal; 31,800 barrels of wheat flour and 33,570 barrels of graham flour.
