Cowboys Organize For Protection In Rodeos

Hailed by cowhands throughout the ranching area of West Texas as a major step toward protection for amateur rodeo performers, especially the traditional "bronc buster," an organization has been instituted that already boasts approximately 75 charter members.

Visiting in Spur Tuesday on official business, L. E. Shawver, newly elected president of the association, stated that keen enthusiasm was in evidence among cowboys over this entire section of Texas to forward the set-up. Earlier meetings have been announced, but final organization was made in September in Midland.

Shawver was accompanied by a brother, J. W. Shawver, here Tuesday, and both expressed appreciation of the cooperation from local cowboys, as well as officials of Spur Roundup & Rodeo Association in giving the plan a big send-off.

Chief among benefits, and a point often brought out by cowboys who object to competing with professionals in the rodeos, would be elimination of pros in amateur contests. A handicap exists for cowhands who are forced to carry on routine duties, and do not have time to practice "tricks of the trade" as do the professionals; nor do the working cowboys have opportunity to attend and enter as many of the rodeos.

A nominal fee will be charged each cowboy joining the association, from which he may expect various types of protection, and where the association has charge of entry booths at rodeos it will safeguard against last-minute strikes and bring about a better understanding between cowboys and officials. Membership in the association is not compulsory for contestants to enter any West Texas rodeo, but many benefits in membership may be readily seen from the rules and regulations.

Mrs. Mary Caraway Dies Thursday In Goldthwaite

Mrs. Mary Helen Caraway, 89 years, 9 months and 19 days old, mother of E. L. Caraway of Spur, passed away in Goldthwaite, Texas, Thursday morning, October 19. Injuries sustained in a fall causing her death, physicians stated.

In an accidental fall recently Mrs. Caraway suffered a broken hip, a broken arm and numerous body bruises, and severe nerve shock also contributed to her demise.

For a number of years Mrs. Caraway, and her husband, K. S. Caraway, who preceded her in death, lived in Stonewall county, but moved back to Goldthwaite, their old home, in 1915.

Funeral services were held in Goldthwaite Friday morning, Oct. 20, at 10:00 o'clock, with interment in that city's cemetery. Mr. Caraway is also buried in Goldthwaite cemetery.

WAGES UP
Hours of estimated 550,000 workers to be increased from 25 to 30 cents an hour.

HOURS DOWN
Hours of estimated 1,200,000 workers to be cut from 42 to 40 a week.

An estimated 1,750,000 employees in interstate commerce industries who were working more than 42 hours during September, 1938 received either shorter work weeks or increased earning effective Tuesday, under regulations of the wage-hour law. An estimated 1,350,000 working more than 44 hours in September, 1938, have already received some benefits, and an estimated 550,000 workers were increased to 30 cents an hour on Tuesday. This includes approximately 300,004 receiving raises to the present 25-cent minimum.

G. B. Morris, Pioneer Druggist, Dies Thursday

George Burton Morris, 55, former Spur citizen and pioneer in the drug business of the city, passed away at the family home near Childress Thursday morning, October 19, 7:00 o'clock, death following about three months of illness. Heart ailment was pronounced the cause of death by physicians.

Morris was born on September 1, 1884, in the state of Alabama. He came to Texas with his parents at the age of 9, and was married in 1901 to Miss Jessie Ellis, the marriage taking place in Dublin, Texas.

Mr. and Mrs. Morris moved to Spur in 1916, and seven years later they purchased the City Drug Store here, operating that place for about a year, having at this time a partner in the business. Again in 1928 Mr. Morris purchased the City Drug, and operated the store for two years before disposing of it. The years 1926 and 1927 were spent by Mr. and Mrs. Morris in O'Donnell, Texas, and in 1934 they moved to Childress, Texas, where they have made their home since.

Mr. and Mrs. Morris have ever held an esteemed place in this area, have reared a fine family of six sons and four daughters, and a host of friends mourn this untimely passing.

Funeral services were held in the First Baptist Church of Spur Friday afternoon, October 20, 2:00 o'clock, with Rev. Stokes of Afton officiating. Rev. R. C. Joyner, pastor of the church, conducted the songs in the ceremony.

Masons were in charge of rites. Pallbearers were C. W. Hinson, J. W. Carlisle, John King, Sr., Eric Ousley, T. C. Ensey and H. P. Gibson.

Interment was in Spur cemetery under direction of a Childress undertaker's staff.

Survivors are the widow; six sons, H. L. Morris, Calgary; H. E. Lloyd and J. R. Morris, Monahans; M. B. and G. B. Morris, Childress; four daughters, Mrs. A. L. Hill, Hobbs, New Mexico; Mrs. Bill Middleton, Afton; Mrs. C. P. Witt, Calgary, and Miss Esta Rhea Morris, Childress; three brothers, H. F. and J. H. Morris of Houston, and N. M. Morris of Galveston; four sisters, Mrs. Walter Jordan, O'Donnell; Mrs. T. C. Moss, Houston; Mrs. O. U. Walker, Stephenville, and another sister living in Stamford.

There are also a number of nephews and nieces.

Contract Let To Dallas Firm For Paving On Highway 82

Many Curves Cut From Westward Traffic Line

With purchase of right-of-way in its final stages by a special court composed of J. L. Karr, F. L. Byars and F. F. Henry, contract was let Tuesday to the Uvalde Construction Company, a Dallas firm, to build a little over four and one-half miles of new paved highway west from Dickens.

Contract measurement was given as 4.6 miles, and the bid was \$104,682.80. Material will be flexible base with asphalt surface, side-wall grading and complete drainage structures.

Although it has been pointed out that no great amount of mileage will be saved, approximately one and one-half miles, all of that comes from curves, and the new road will be decidedly safer for lack of them.

The changed course will continue the Guthrie highway on to the west from the north side of the Court House, and out 4.6 miles will tie in again to the present highway. In other words, at the northwest corner of the Dickens Court House Square, State Highway 24, or Federal Highway 82, will cross State Highway 18 and the Federal designation 62. Instead of making the "Y" just out of Dickens toward Spur, as well as the present Lubbock course, the new highway link will give a straight line east and west through the County Seat.

Surveys have carried the line through clear lotage with the exception of two short links, and court proceedings by special commissioners are at present clearing the remainder of the right-of-way titles.

It was intimated by officials here the first of the week that construction would be begun immediately after final links in the right-of-way were legally ironed out.

Riter Takes Agency For New Cirklaire Stove Line

Riter Hardware Company completed a deal yesterday with Gene Goss, representative of the Folsom Company of Dallas, Cirklaire Division, whereby the store becomes agency for the complete line of gas stoves.

Completion Date Of Gas System Is Reset

In an opinion expressed here this week concerning work and progress on the butane gas system under construction in Spur, it was estimated that completion date could be set at least fifteen days earlier than was first announced. City Manager Truman Green asserts that work is advancing faster than anticipated. Several weeks ago completion date was set as December 15, but it is believed now that December 1 may mark the finish.

According to Green, many people have been wondering how much the expense will be for connecting onto the gas lines.

"There is no cost" the City Manager stated, "to connect to the gas lines. All that is necessary is to put up a \$5.00 deposit, which of course would be refunded if the user discontinued his gas service. This, however, is a procedure employed by all such services."

"The monthly minimum," he continued, "will be only \$1.35, but if the customer desires to cut off his service during the summer months, there will be no minimum charge of any kind during the period of discontinued service."

Many Spur people will be interested in this feature of the City service, perhaps, if they are going to use the gas for heating purposes only, but it is likely that most people who use the gas will cook with it as well.

Casing has already been distributed throughout the city, and approximately one-fourth of the pipe has already been laid.

Spur Laundry Adding Space To Help Selyf Dept.

Dave Wilson of the Spur Laundry-Cleaners says that he is getting things fixed so that when women visit their helpy-selyf department they will have plenty of room and plenty of equipment.

Additional space being added at the rear of the laundry totals about 567 square feet. The helpy-selyf room will have the 16x36-foot extension, and to the present equipment will be added five new washing machines. The department already has 10 machines bringing the total to 15.

If you will notice in passing the laundry, it is quite impressive that the managers have almost covered their part of that block with a continuous program of building.

ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE REQUIREMENTS AND ISSUANCE OF LICENSE PERMITS TO ITINERANT VENDORS IN THE CITY OF SPUR; DEFINING ITINERANT VENDOR; REGULATING THE SALE OF GOODS, WARES AND MERCHANDISE BY ITINERANT VENDORS IN THE CITY OF SPUR FOR THE BENEFIT OF THE PUBLIC; PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF; REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES AND PARTS OF ORDINANCES INCONSISTENT THEREWITH.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF SPUR, TEXAS.

Section 1.
The term "Itinerant Vendor" means and includes and shall be construed to mean and include all persons, firms and corporations, as well as their agents and employees, who engage in the temporary or transient business in the City of Spur, Texas, of selling, or offering for sale, any goods, wares or merchandise, or exhibiting the same for the purpose of taking orders for the sale thereof; and who for the purpose of carrying on such business of conducting such exhibits either hire, rent, lease or occupy any room or place in any building, structure, other enclosure, vacant lot or any other property whatever, in said City of Spur, in, through, or from which any goods, wares or merchandise may be sold, offered for sale, exhibited for sale or exhibited for the purpose of taking orders for the sale thereof. The word "Temporary" as used above means and shall be construed to mean any such business transacted or conducted in the City of Spur for which definite arrangements have not been made for the hire, rental or lease of premises for at least 90 days in or upon which such business is to be operated or conducted. The word "Transient" as used above means, any such business of any such itinerant vendor as may be operated or conducted by persons, firms or corporations or by their agents or employees who reside away from the City of Spur, or who have fixed places of business in places other than the City of Spur, or who have their headquarters in places other than the City of Spur, or who move stocks of goods, wares or merchandise or samples thereof into Spur with the purpose or intention of removing them or the unsold portion thereof away from said City of Spur before the expiration of ninety days, provided however, that the term "Itinerant Vendor" as defined herein, shall not include or be construed to include anyone engaged in interstate commerce nor anyone upon whom the provisions of this ordinance would impose a direct and unlawful burden on interstate commerce.

Section 2.
Itinerant vendor must have license. Provisions: It shall hereafter be unlawful for any itinerant vendor to sell, offer for sale, exhibit for sale

or exhibit for the purpose of taking orders for sale thereof, any goods or merchandise in the City of Spur, without first obtaining a license permit as herein provided for. The assessor and collector of taxes for the City of Spur shall issue to Itinerant Vendor a license permit authorizing such itinerant vendor to sell, exhibit for sale, offer for sale, or exhibit for the purpose of taking orders for the sale thereof, in the City of Spur, his goods, wares or merchandise only after such Itinerant Vendor shall have fully complied with all provisions of this ordinance and made payment of the sum of Twenty-five (25.00) Dollars for said permit or license, and which sum shall be compensation to the City of Spur for the services herein required of it and to enable the City of Spur to partially defray the expenses of enforcing the provisions of this ordinance; provided

(a) The Itinerant Vendor shall make application to the assessor and collector of taxes at least ten days prior to the date of his contemplated sale or exhibit to be held in the City of Spur, which application shall be in the form of an affidavit stating the full name and address of the Itinerant Vendor, the location of his or its principal office and place of business, the names and addresses of its officers, if it be a corporation, and the partnership names and addresses of all partners if such Itinerant Vendor be a firm;

(b) Before said license permit shall issue, the application therefor must be accompanied by:

(1) Statement showing the kind and character of the goods, wares or merchandise to be sold, offered for sale, or exhibited.

(2) A certified copy of the charter of the Itinerant Vendor if a corporation incorporated under the laws of the State of Texas.

(3) A certified copy of its permit to do business in Texas if the Itinerant Vendor be a corporation incorporated under the laws of some state other than Texas.

(4) A bond in the sum of not less than \$1000.00 and it shall be executed by the Itinerant Vendor as principal with two or more good and sufficient sureties satisfactory to the assessor and collector of taxes, which bond shall be payable to the Mayor of the City of Spur and his successors for the use and benefit of any person or persons entitled thereto and conditioned that the principal and surety will pay all damages to persons or person caused by or arising from or growing out of it, the wrongful, fraudulent, or illegal conduct of the Itinerant Vendor while conducting the sale or exhibit in the City of Spur. The bond shall remain in full force and effect for the entire duration of the license permit as provided herein and two years thereafter.

Section 3.
The license permit provided for herein shall not be transferable nor give authority to more than one person to conduct a business as an "Itinerant Vendor" but any person having obtained such license may have the assistance of one or more persons in conducting such business.

Section 4.
The license as provided herein shall continue so long as such sale or exhibit is continuously held in the City of Spur, but in no event shall it continue for more than ninety days from the date of its issuance. Such license permit shall be prominently displayed in a conspicuous place on the premises where such sale or exhibit is being conducted and shall remain so displayed so long as any goods, wares or merchandise are being so sold, or exhibited.

Section 5.
This ordinance is not, and shall not be held to be applicable to the:

(a) Ordinary commercial traveler who sells or exhibits for sale goods, wares, or merchandise to parties engaged in the business of buying and selling and dealing in goods, wares or merchandise;

(b) Vendors of farm produce, poultry, stock, or agricultural products in their natural state, provided that such Vendors are the actual producers of the same, and provided that before entering upon such offer to sale, sale or exhibit for sale such Vendors shall file with the tax assessor and collector his or its affidavit that he or it is the actual producer of such farm produce, poultry, stock or agricultural products;

(c) Sales of goods, wares or merchandise donated by the owners thereof, the proceeds whereof to be applied to any charitable or philanthropic purpose.

Section 6.
The duly constituted authorities of the City of Spur, including the police department, assessor and collector of taxes and others having the duty of enforcing the ordinances of the City of Spur, shall enforce the provisions hereof and allow no "Itinerant Vendor" as herein defined to conduct his business without full compliance herewith.

Section 7.
Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall upon conviction be fined not less than Twenty-five (\$25.00) Dollars, nor more than Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars, and each sale, offer for sale, exhibition for purpose of sale or exhibition for the purpose of

taking orders for the sale thereof shall be a separate offense.

Section 8.
In the event any section, sub-section, sentence, clause, or phrase of this ordinance shall be declared or adjudged invalid or unconstitutional, such adjudication shall in no manner affect any other sections, sub-sections, sentences, clauses or phrases of this ordinance, but all the rest hereof shall be in full force and effect just as though the section, sub-section, clause or phrase so declared or adjudged invalid or unconstitutional was not originally a part thereof.

Section 9.
All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance shall be and the same are hereby repealed.

Section 10.
There being now no sufficient or adequate regulations governing the sale, offer for sale, exhibition for sale and/or exhibition for the purpose of taking orders for the sale of goods, wares or merchandise by Itinerant Vendors in the City of Spur; and it appearing that the conduct and operation of such business enables unscrupulous persons to fraud and deceive the citizens of Spur under circumstances where our citizens are left without adequate legal remedy; and it further appearing that other evils and abuses exist in connection with such business, said business of such Itinerant Vendor is hereby declared to be one affected with public interest, and the public policy of regulating said business is hereby declared and established.

Passed by an affirmative vote of all members of the City Commission, City of Spur, Texas, this 25 day of October, A. D. 1939.

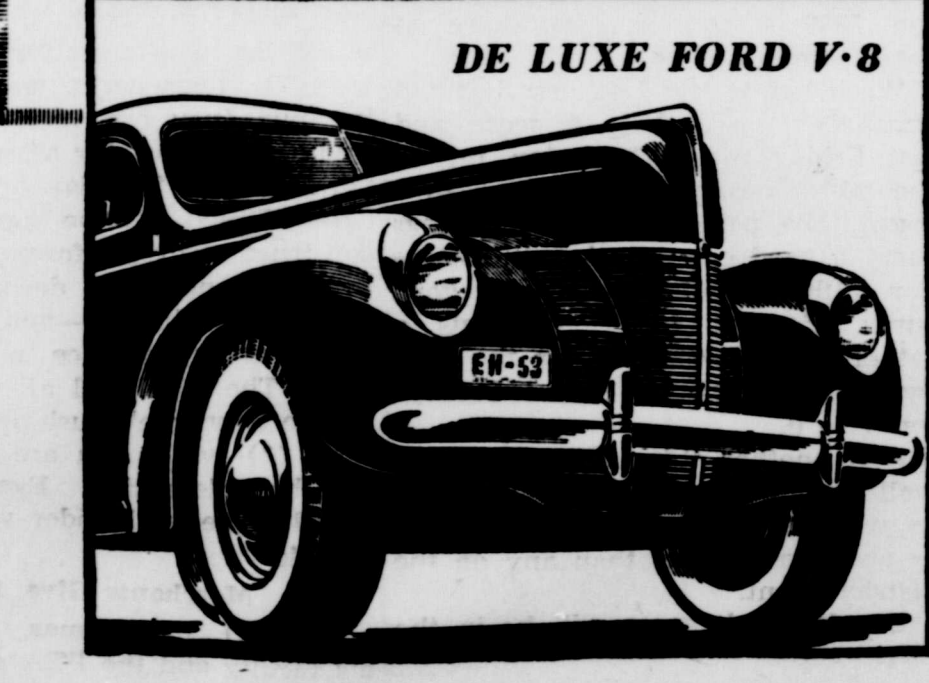
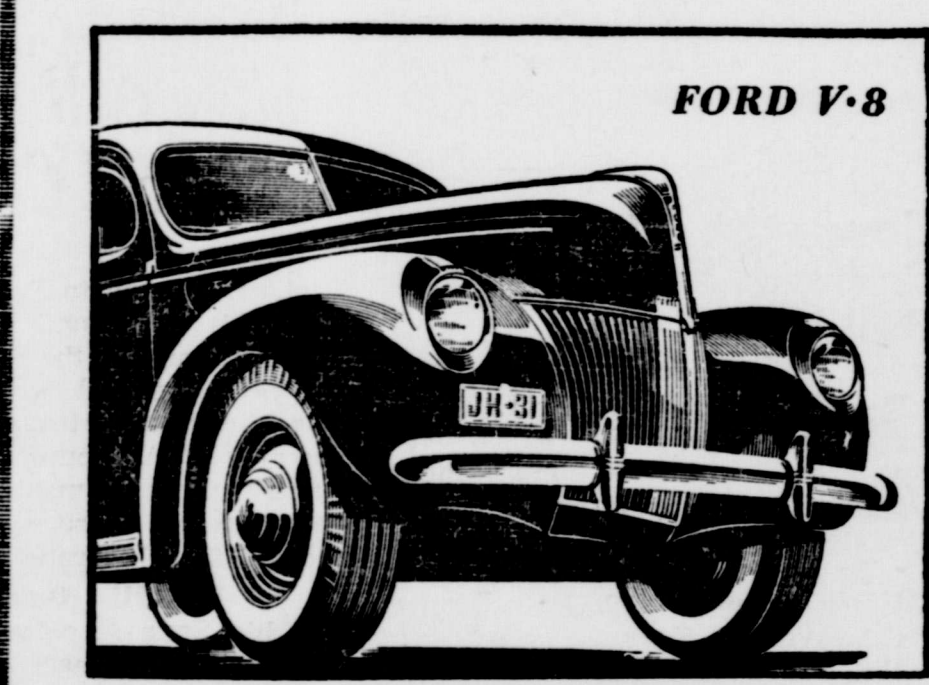

Behind The Scenes In American Business

By JOHN CRADDOCK

BUSINESS—A chance for the unemployed or partly employed to pick up a few dollars is indicated by the sharp rise in scrap iron prices since the war. From \$15 a ton in August to \$25 or \$26 a ton today means a squeeze on profits of steel companies, which mix equal quantities of scrap iron ore in making steel, but anyone with the time and energy can scour cellars, vacant lots or junk heaps for discarded pieces of iron or steel should be able to sell such findings to the local junk dealer at a good price.

Another effect of the war has been on carpet prices, and anyone contemplating a new rug for the home would be well advised to buy now. Although the U. S. is second only to Australia in wool production, the mild climate here makes it impossible to produce the coarse, heavy wool needed for carpets. China, involved in her own war with Japan, can ship none here. Argentina and other suppliers have had their clip embargoed because of the European conflict. Result is a looming shortage in America, already reflected in a 10 per cent increase in carpet prices since September 1.

WASHINGTON — Once again the

government is becoming concerned as business activity increases. Word has gone out that the Department of Commerce soon will issue a warning against over-expansion. Unless the brakes are applied to rapidly mounting inventories in hands of retailers, wholesalers, and manufacturers, some officials in the department feel, business next spring may have to coast along with several lean weeks or months while waiting for goods now being produced to be consumed. The theory is, of course, that sustained recovery can be built only by expanding the nation's production and production facilities at a rate that keeps just a shade ahead of demand from the public which is the ultimate consumer.

STIFF PACE — Several times in the last ten years industry has stepped up production only to be thwarted by inability of consumers to match the pace. It happened toward the end of the ill-fated NRA experiment and again in the summer of 1937. When on some future day it is possible to untangle all the strands of presentday economic activity, the plight of the consumer very possibly may be traced to a tremendously increased tax burden, especially taxes of the hidden variety which are buried in the cost of merchandise the consumer is asked to buy, the extent of this tax load is indicated by a study on states taxes just completed by the National Consumers Tax Commission, whose headquarters are in Chicago. The commission found that three indirectly assessed levies — those on motor fuels, payrolls and general sales produced more than half of the \$3,904,525,000 total tax collections of the 48 state governments in 1938.

WINTER'S COMING—Perhaps inspired by new Department of Commerce estimates that America spends \$750,000,000 annually for maintenance of residences, a large share of it in preparing for winter, FHA issues timely warnings that houses which have not had their regular periodic paint job may not be fortified against the ravages of the Frost King. FHA, offering funds under the Modernization Credit Plan, warns that paint which wears by "chalking" (powdering off gradually, leaving a film thinner but still protective) is to be preferred to that which peels. A greater swing to aluminum paint for first house coats and for complete barn paint jobs as weather insurance has been noted in paint sales which in late summer months soared to levels even exceeding those of boom 1937. Can a

new home-improvement upswing be under way?

THINGS TO WATCH FOR — Another wrinkle for women's hats—plastic sheeting for a pastel, translucent rim in a summer bonnet . . . New type of high-vitamin bread, which retains the heart of the valuable wheat kernel usually disposed of by millers because it has an oil-making it impossible to store flour . . . Speedometers in club cars of the trains so that passengers can tell how fast they are going . . . New stenographer's "bible"—booklet called "50 Common Typing Faults and How to Correct Them," written by world's typing champ and being circulated by a leading typewriter manufacturer . . . Super-scoop steam shovels—one costing \$450,000 and having a "bite capacity" of 35 Adcock, Rawleigh . . . Use of the airplane in wild life preservation—the Maine Game Commission has purchased a Stinson "Reliant" plane to drop young fish from the air to stock inland streams in summer, and to transport hay and other feeds to snowbound deer in winter . . .

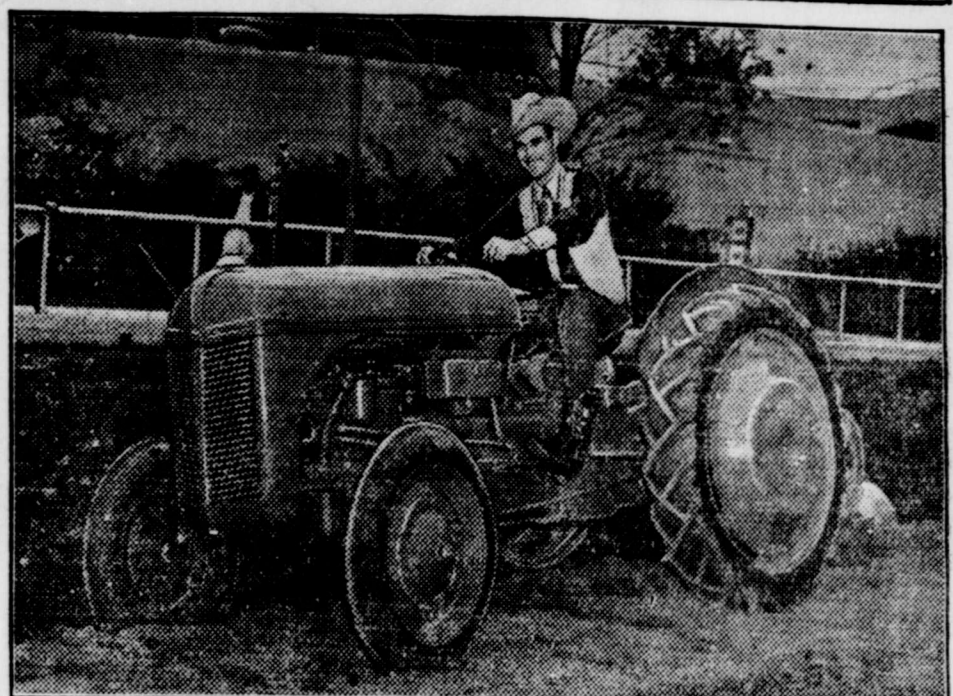

Canned unsweetened Hawaiian pineapple juice subtly flavored with spice served piping hot with plain and sugar encrusted doughnuts will please the youngsters on Hallowe'en night.

The goblins and witches in your neighborhood won't have the heart to move your gate posts down to the corner this Hallowe'en, if you invite them in for a steaming cup of hot mulled pineapple juice and fat, fluffy doughnuts encrusted with sugar.

First step in preparing the beverage is to get a generous supply of canned unsweetened Hawaiian pineapple juice at your grocery store. The other ingredients will come from your spice closet—stick cinnamon, whole cloves, ground allspice and grated nutmeg. Combine pineapple juice and spices in the

following proportions, heat, add a dash of salt and serve.

Hot Mulled Pineapple Juice
1 inch stick cinnamon
2 whole cloves
1/2 teaspoon ground allspice
1/4 teaspoon grated nutmeg
1 quart canned unsweetened Hawaiian pineapple juice
Pinch of salt

Tie the spices in a small piece of cheesecloth, add them to the pineapple juice and bring to the boiling point, but do not boil. Add the salt, stir. Serve hot with doughnuts, pretzels or crackers and cheese. Yield: 4 to 6 servings.

Spur Schools Have New Type Report Cards

The Spur School System has made a study of a practical report to parents of their children's progress in school. Every effort has been made to make the report conform to practical usage. The report is diagnostic in that the parent may examine the card and see wherein the pupil is doing unsatisfactory work. Comparison of one child's work with another is being discouraged, and an effort to concentrate on individual improvement has been installed. Effort has been made to get away from things that make for inferior feeling and action.

In the East Ward School the pupil's work is rated satisfactory or unsatisfactory by use of the symbols "S" or "U". Pupils who are doing work of a type to merit a "C" grade may receive an unsatisfactory mark because that pupil is not working up to his capacity and left alone may develop habits of indolence. Marks of this type do not necessarily mean the child will be retained or promoted, but are used to indicate to the parent that the child is doing satisfactory or unsatisfactory work.

In the Grammar School definite grades in letters are shown on the report card. Here too, the card is diagnostic and the parent is able to locate points of difficulty or unsatisfactory work so that improvement can be made.

In the High School a grade point system has been installed this year. These grade points are used to encourage better student work, and to provide more time in high school for the pupil who barely makes passing grades. A grade of "A" in a given subject has a value of 4 grade points per semester; a "B" has 3 point value; a "C" has 1; and grades of "D" or below have no grade point value.

Pupils entering the high school this year will be required to make 64 grade points to graduate; Sophomores will be required to make 48 points during the next three years; Juniors will be required to make 32 grade points; and Seniors will be required to make 16 this year to graduate.

Pupils taking four courses in high school and making a yearly average of "C" in each subject would make only 8 grade points per year and would not be enough to graduate from high school in 4 years. A premium is offered for grades above "C" in that a "B" average in four subjects would produce 24 grade points per year.

We are urging each parent to examine the report card carefully and bestow a word of praise when it is satisfactory. Please sign the card and see that it is returned to the school promptly. Your signature means that the card has been examined and not necessarily approved.

Parents are cordially invited to visit the school at any time and discuss their children's work with the teacher and principal. We believe this common understanding will be especially helpful in the pupil's progress.

LEGAL

ORDINANCE

PRESCRIBING THE RATES TO BE CHARGED FOR GAS SERVICE; PRESCRIBING THE TIME AND PLACE FOR PAYMENT OF ACCOUNTS; PROVIDING PENALTY FOR FAILURE TO PAY ACCOUNT WITHIN THIRTY DAYS AND PROVIDING FOR CONDITIONS UPON WHICH SERVICE WILL BE RESUMED; REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HEREWITH; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, the City Commission has heretofore determined that it is to the best interests of the City and of its citizens that a municipal gas system be constructed in and for said City; and

WHEREAS, the City Commission is at this time in the process of issuing bonds and contracting for the construction of said gas system; and

WHEREAS, it is proper and necessary in connection with said gas system for the payment of operating expense and for the payment of the principal and interest on said bonds to, at this time, set the rates to be charged for service in connection with said gas system;

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF SPUR, TEXAS:

1. RATES: There shall be charged for gas service in said City for each month the following rates:

	Net	Gross
7.5 Th	18c per Th	- 20c per Th
10 Th	10.8c per Th	- 12c per Th
Rest	6.3c per Th	- 7c per Th

A Therm (Th) being defined as the amount of gas necessary to release 100,000 B.T.U. when burned. The price under "Net" is the actual price if paid by the 15th of the month immediately following the date of the bill. If not paid by the 15th the "Gross" price will be charged.

The above rates are minimum monthly rates.

2. TIME AND PLACE OF PAYMENTS: All accounts shall be payable on the first day of each month, at City Hall in Spur, Texas. The City Clerk shall prepare statements for the gas service on the last day of each month. He shall discontinue service to any connections on which the statement shall not have been paid on or before the 25th day of the month following the date of the statement. After service has been discontinued by the instructions of the City Clerk, it shall be unlawful for any person or property owner to reconnect said service or to attempt to reconnect said service without a permit from the City Clerk. The City Clerk shall charge a fee of \$1.00
