

## J. R. Karr of Espuela Died Friday At San Angelo

J. R. Karr, 87, a citizen of the Espuela community since 1914, passed away last Friday evening at the home of a son, Daniel I. Karr of San Angelo, where he had gone for a visit.

The body was returned here and funeral services held at the Espuela Baptist Church Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock with interment following in Espuela Cemetery. Rev. A. P. Stokes of Afton, assisted by Rev. H. L. Burnham and Rev. J. V. Bilberry conducted the services with six grandsons of Mr. Karr acting as pallbearers. The Ward Funeral Home directed. The floral offering was large and beautiful, offerings coming from each of the towns where children had lived.

Mr. Karr was a native of Georgia, was born in Gwinnett County in that state June 30, 1852. He grew to manhood in Georgia and in 1877 was married to Miss Antoinette Hendrix. In 1879 he moved with his family to Texas and in 1914 moved to Dickens County and settled in the Espuela community.

There were nine children in the family, six sons and three daughters. One son, Willie, passed away while a baby only two years of age. The other children are: J. L. Karr of Espuela, R. E. Karr of Crosbyton, J. H. Karr of Wichita Falls, Daniel I. Karr of San Angelo, Ralph Karr of Crane, Mrs. Annie Mabe of Levelland, Mrs. Lillian Clements of Shamrock, and Mrs. Beal McBride of Kermit. There are 32 grandchildren and 14 great-grandchildren.

He is survived by the above named children and one brother, D. F. Karr of Buford, Georgia. Mrs. Karr passed away March 11, 1928, at about the age of 70 years. Since then Mr. Karr has spent most of his time with his children and in visiting friends. He went to San Angelo just a week before his demise to visit with his son there. He became ill Tuesday night of last week and passed away Friday evening.

He had lived a Christian life 62 years, making a profession of religion in 1878. He was a member of the Baptist Church and was loyal until his death. He held the confidence and esteem of all who knew him, and those who knew him best praised him most.

Honorary pallbearers were: W. F. Foreman, G. L. Delisle, R. C. McMahan, W. A. Harris, J. M. Dawson, John Sharp, Willie Williams, W. C. Ball, E. J. Bilberry and S. L. Benefield. These were close friends who had visited Mr. Karr regularly during his illness. Rev. R. C. Brown and his quartette rendered special music.

Zachary Taylor McKnight, 90, a native of Texas and a pioneer Baptist minister of Dickens County, died at his home in Dickens Sunday, Jan. 21, following a brief illness. He was born April 16, 1849 and was a veteran of the Civil War, having been engaged in making shoes for fellow soldiers during that period.

Later he became a minister of the Baptist faith and in the early days moved to Dickens county and preached here for many years.

Services were conducted at the home by Rev. H. L. Burnham Monday afternoon at 3 o'clock. Interment followed in Dickens cemetery, conducted by Ward Funeral Home.

Surviving are three sons, Charles A. McKnight of Fresno, Cal., and Tom and Howard McKnight of Dickens; a daughter, Mrs. O. S. Harvey of McAdoo; and two sisters, Mrs. D. P. Barnes of Weatherford and Mrs. Amanda Long of Willis Point, Texas.

All were present for the services except Charles McKnight, who was unable to attend.

## Texas Political Calendar For 1940 Touches Every Month In Events Of Voter Interest

The 51 events that will take place in the field of politics in 1940 as far as Texas voters are concerned are shown in this political calendar:

- Jan. 31—Last day to pay poll tax.
- Feb. 1—Residents of cities of over 10,000 entitled by law to exemption from poll tax must obtain certificate of exemption before this date.
- March 10—Last day for tax assessor-collector to prepare poll lists.
- April 1—Deadline for delivery of certified poll list to election boards. In counties of cities over 10,000, supplemental lists shall be furnished until four days prior to election.
- May 4—Precinct conventions for presidential nominations.
- May 7—County conventions for presidential nominations.
- May 28—State convention to name delegates to presidential nominating convention; held where designated by state executive committee.
- June 3—Last day candidates for state office, and certain candidates for district and state offices in districts containing more than one county, may file candidacy with executive committee for place on ballot.
- June 15—Last day for county and precinct candidates, and district candidates in districts composed of one county, to file.
- June 17—County executive committee determines by lot order of names on the ballot and prepares estimates of election expense.
- June 22—Last day for candidates to pay ballot assessments.
- June 24—Primary committee makes up official ballot.
- June 27—July 1—Period for first campaign expense reports.
- July 7—Absentee voting begins.
- July 15—19—Second campaign expense reports. State and district reports filed with Secretary of State; county candidates with county clerk.
- July 22—Last day for voters in cities of over 10,000, who have moved to new voting boxes, to appear before tax assessor-collector for corrected certificate; or for voter who moved to new county or new precinct, to present his certificate in order to have his name added to list in precinct of his new residence.
- July 24—Last day for absentee voting.
- July 24—Last day for presiding judges of elections to obtain list of voters for use in first primary.
- July 25—County clerk sends absentee votes to presiding judges of precincts.
- July 27—First Primary.
- July 27—Precinct conventions to name delegates to county conventions. Chairmen of county and precinct committees chosen.
- Aug. 3—County executive committee canvasses returns.
- Aug. 4—Absentee voting begins for second primary.
- Aug. 6—Final day for third expense reports in first primary.
- Aug. 10—State executive committee meets in Austin to canvass primary returns and certify to county chairmen names for ballot in runoff primary.
- Aug. 12-16—Period for second primary first expense reports.
- Aug. 21—Last day for absentee balloting in second primary.
- Aug. 24—Second primary.
- Aug. 26—Last day that an independent and non-partisan candidate may file with Secretary of State application for place on general election ballot.
- Sept. 3—Final date for last campaign expense report.
- Sept. 9—State executive committee opens and canvasses returns of the second primary and prepares delegate list for state convention.
- Sept. 10—State Democratic convention declares nominees, determines platform, elects new chairman of state committee, and canvasses returns for state officers. New state committee chosen by district caucuses. (Sept. 3—conflict in law apparently fixing state convention six

# 23 YEARS AGO

## Low Municipality Rates Increase Consumption

Consumers of electricity from city-owned plants having the lowest rates use the largest amounts of electricity. John Bauer, director of the American Public Utilities Bureau discovered in a nation-wide survey on which he reported today to the National Municipal League.

Dr. Bauer also found on the basis of a study of Federal Power Commission data that municipally-owned power plants contribute nearly twice as much to the public treasury, in revenue and free service, as do privately owned companies.

In an examination of records for cities over 50,000 in population, Dr. Bauer discovered an "almost direct correlation between rates and consumption. The higher the rates, the lower the consumption," he reveals.

Of the cities studied, Tacoma, Washington had "by far the greatest average consumption, 134 kilowatt hours per month per customer and had also "by far the lowest average rate, 1.7 cents per kilowatt hour." Dr. Bauer cites at the other extreme a plant with an average of 4.4 cents per kilowatt hour and an average consumption of only 39 kilowatt hours. He reports finding a similar relationship between rates and consumption in studies of municipal plants in North Carolina and New Jersey.

Municipally-owned power plants contribute an average of 17.3 per cent of their gross revenues to city treasuries, while private companies pay an average of 13.2 per cent of their revenues in taxes, Dr. Bauer concludes. The value of free services rendered equivalent to an additional 8.5 per cent of their gross revenues, he found. "The public plants thus contribute outright in case a considerably higher percentage than the private, and through free service they increase their contribution to nearly twice the percentage of private companies," he asserts.—Texas Municipalities.

days ahead of committee session to canvass returns was ignored by the Democratic party in 1938, since the convention could not declare nominees).

Oct. 1—Poll tax paying begins.

Oct. 16—Last day for party state committees certify names of candidates for President and Vice-President to the Secretary of State.

Nov. 2—Absentee balloting for general election closes.

Nov. 5—General election; selection of presidential electors certify to county judges.

Nov. 8—Final date "with 72 hours" (from close of polls) for presiding judges to report returns to county judge. Then, within 48 hours, county judge shall deliver returns to commissioner's court.

Nov. 11—County judges forward returns to Secretary of State.

Nov. 11—(On Monday next after general election, and not before) commissioners' court shall examine returns and estimate result.

Nov. 13—County judge shall within 48 hours after commissioners' court examines returns, forward the same Secretary of State. (If court does not meet on Monday following election for this purpose, it shall meet "at earliest practicable time" thereafter.)

Nov. 15—Candidates file sworn expense statement with county judge.

Dec. 2—Governor, Secretary of State and Attorney General open election returns, canvass and declare results and issue certificates of election.

Dec. 16—Presidential electors convene in Austin and cast Texas vote for President and Vice-President.
