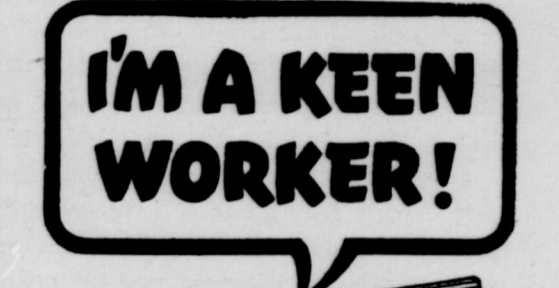

## Patton Springs School News Notes

### BOY AND GIRL SCOUTS VERY ACTIVE

The girl scouts of Patton Springs have been busy since the first of the year.
