Soil moisture determinations
which have been made on thirteen
field areas of the Texas Agricultur- field areas of the Texas Agricultur-
al Experiment Station, Spur, Texas show that the moisture in the soil to
a depth of 3 feet is slightly below a depth of 3 feet is slightly below
normal. On April 20 of this year there was an average of 2.47 inches
of available water (that which plants may recover from the soil)
stored in the soil as stored in the soil as compared to
an average of 2.85 inches for the 11 years from 1930 to 1940. A rather

year is stored in the upper 12 inches of soil where it is easily drawn out
