Rob Davis Killed In Car Accident Near Ballinger

Rob A. Davis, former citizen of Spur, died Monday 9:30 a. m., Dec. 23, from injuries received in a car accident six miles north of Ballinger, Texas about 8:00 o'clock Saturday evening. Mr. Davis was accompanying Mr. John T. Herd, president of a bank at Post, to the latters ranch, near Ballinger, for the week-end, when a calf ran onto the highway and hit the door of the car, causing it to come open. Mr. Herd escaped without serious injuries.

Funeral services were held at the First Christian Church here at 3:30 Tuesday afternoon.

Rob Davis was born August 3, 1630 in Dickens, Texas. He moved to Spur with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Sol R. Davis in 1910. He graduated from Spur High School, and attended the Christian Church College at Enid, Okla. during the fall of 1918.

Mr. Davis was married to Miss Kate Hall, September 30, 1919 and to this union were born three children, Robert Hall, Emily Marie, and Vera Nell. They made their home in Spur until 1931, when they moved to Quitaque, where Mr. Davis was associated with the O. C. Arthur Drug Store for two or three years. From Quitaque they moved to Post where they have resided since. Mr. Davis has been with the Tax Collection Department of Garza County the past four years.

Davis was a member of the First Christian Church, joining at an early age, and a member of the Masonic order, Post Chapter.

Surviving are his wife, Mrs. Kate Davis: one son, Robert Hall Davis; one daughter, Vera Nell Davis; his mother, Mrs. Nell Davis; and three brothers, Lee Davis, of Post, John A. Davis, of Philadelphia, Pa., and Lewis Green Davis, of Spur; and numerous other relatives.

Funeral sehvices were held at the First Christian Church of Spur, Masonic order in charge; rites will be read by Rev. Herrell Rea, of Ft. Worth. Interment will be made in Spur Cemetery.

Following is an editorial that appeared in the New York Sun, September 21, 1897, written by Francis P. Church in answer to a letter written by Virginia O'-Hanlon:

We take pleasure in answering at once and thus prominently the communication below, expressing at the same time our great gratification that its faithful author is numbered among the friends of The Sun:

Dear Editor:

I am eight years old. Some of my little friends say there is no Santa Claus.

Papa says "If you see it in The Sun, it's so." Please tell me the truth—Is

there a Santa Claus?

Virginia, your little friends

are wrong. They have been affeeted by the skepticism of a skeptical age. They do not believe except what they see. They think that nothing can be which is not comprehensible by their little minds. All minds, Virginia, whether they be men's or children's, are little. In this great universe of ours man is a mere insect, an ant, in his intellect, as compared with the boundless world about him, as measured by the intelligence capable of grasping the whole of truth and knowledge.

Yes, Virginia, there is a Santa Claus. He exists as certainly as love and generosity and devotion exist, and you know that they abound and give to your life its highest beauty and joy. Alas, how dreary would be the world if there were no Santa Claus! It would be as dreary as if there were no Virginias. There would

be no childlike faith then, no poetry, no romance to make tolerable this existence. We should have no enjoyment, except in sense and sight. The external light with which childhood fills the world would be extinguished.

* * * Not believe in Santa Claus! you might as well not believe in fairies! You might get your papa to hire men to watch in all the chimneys on Christmas eve to eatch Santa Claus, but even if they did not see Santa Claus coming down, what would that prove? Nobody sees Santa Claus, but that is no sign that there is no Santa Claus. The most real things in the world are those that neither children nor men can see. Did you ever see fairies dancing on the lawn? Of course not, but that's no proof that they are not there. Nobody can conceive or imagine all the wonders

there are unseen and unseeable in the world.

You tear apart the baby's rattle and see what makes the noise inside, but there is a veil covering the unseen world which not the strongest man, nor even the united strength of all the strongest men that ever lived, could tear apart. Only faith, fancy poetry, love, romance can push aside that curtain and view and picture the supernal beauty and glory beyond. Is it all real? Ah, Virginia, in all this world there is nothing else real and abiding.

No Santa Claus? Thank God he lives, and he lives forever! A thousand years from now, Virginia; nay, ten times ten thousand years from now, he will continue to make glad the heart of childhood.


