







### Tech College Coaches Resign

Head Coach Pete W. Cawthon of Texas Technological College, his two full time assistants and the graduate manager of athletics Tuesday morning presented their resignations to President Clifford B. Jones.

Joining Cawthon in the action were his assistant varsity line coach, Russell T. "Dutchy" Smith; Varsity Basketball and Freshman Football Coach Berl Huffman, and Manager Gwyn "Mule" Dowell, former Tech backfield star and later a Chicago professional player.

Cawthon has been head coach at Tech since the spring of 1930.

President Jones announced receipt of the resignations following two days during which rumors were circulated that the college athletic council planned to recommend to the board of directors that Cawthon and Smith be not retained for another year. The council held two secret sessions with the five members pledged to secrecy until which time their recommendations could be completed.

As the resignations reached President Jones, he also was presented with recommendations of the athletic council but "since the council's recommendations are directed to the board, they likely will not be made public until after the next board meeting late this month," Doctor Jones said.

No action will be taken on the resignations until the directorate meets, President Jones said.—Lubbock Avalanche-Journal.

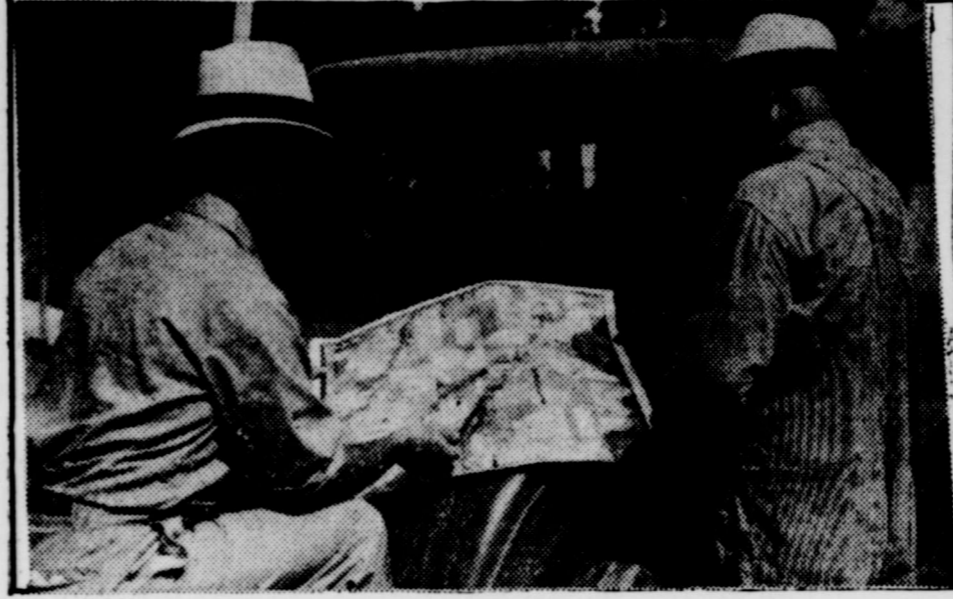
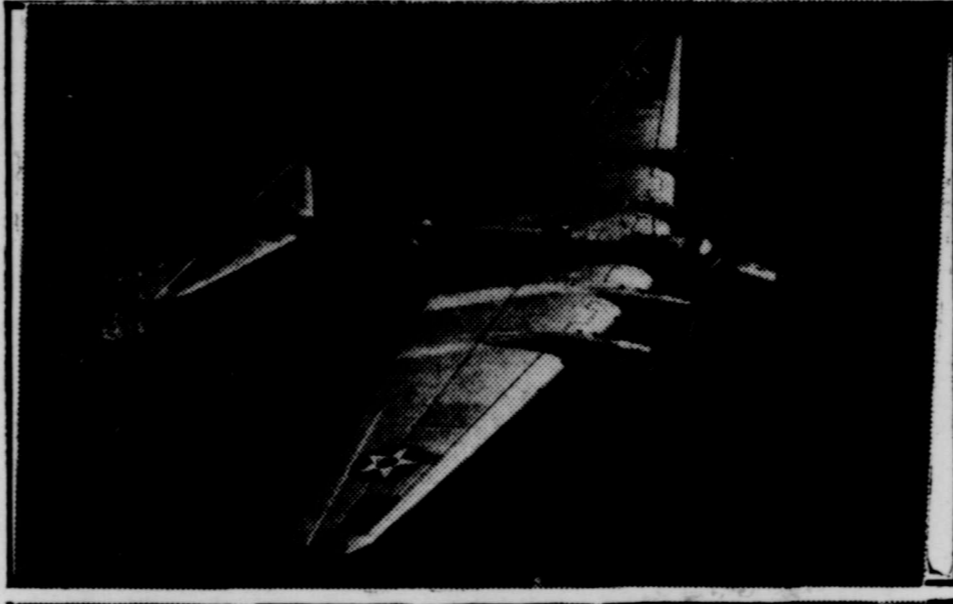
