

D. S. (Sid) Dunwoody Former Dickens Co. **Clerk Dies**

D. S. (Sid) Dunwoody, 76, who died at Lubbock Thursday night January 16, was the first county clerk of Dickens county following the county's organization, and served as clerk eight years.

He came to Dickens county in 1888 and lived here until 1906. He served as cowboy on both the Matador and Spur ranches. The Dunwoody family was one of 13 families here when Dickens county was organized.

Mr. Dunwoody, who lived on the Slaton highway, died in St. Mary's hospital in Lubbock. Funeral services were held at the Central Baptist Church with Rev. Jeff D. Welch officiated, and the body was carried to Panhandle for burial.



The Service's work will be directed by Elton D. Cook, senior district technician

The district program and a district work plan, also prepared by the supervisors, landowners and agency representatives, were the bases of this supplemental memorandum. The work plan outlined in detail the practices and methods by which the objectives of the district program will be achieved.

Besides the chairman, the other Duck Creek District supervisors are O. M. McGinty of Spur, secretary; Clark Forbis, Afton; J. M. Johnston, Jayton; and A. A. Fry, Spur.





Racing Would Aid Farmers, Ranchers **Advocates** Claim

Fort Worth, Jan. 16-Many Texas ranchers and farmers hope that this State soon will have legalized horse racing for two reasons-first to improve the breed and increase the number of thoroughbred and fine stock horses, and, second, to give them additional revenues from the part-time breeding business.

Such is the belief of the Thoroughbred Horse Association of Texas, which has received reports of large benefits in California for ranchers and farmers there because of legalized racing in that State.

Officers of the Texas Association point out that, in California, racing has resulted in the investment of about \$40,000,000-in grazing lands for the production of thoroughbreds, did. building of barns, expensive fences, tracks and the purchase of fine stock. Plum Puddin, 1 cup suet

1 cup molasses

- 2 cups bread crumbs
- 3 eggs, unbeaten 1 cup raisins
- 1 cup currants
- 1 cup flour
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon cloves 1 teaspoon nutmeg

1 tablespoon flavoring (brandy) 1 cup milk

1 teaspoon soda

Red Cross To Ship Relief Supplies To Unoccupied France

Washington, D. C., January 8-The American Red Cross announced through its Chairman, Norman H. Davis, that arrangements have been made for the shipment to and distribution in unoccupied France by the Red Cross of certain relief supplies exclusively for children.

Since the cutbreak of war in Europe the Red Cross has from time to time taken up with the British Government questions involving shipments of supplies in connection with its War Relief activities. The Red Cross has believed that the

question of relief for children in unoccupied France presents a special problem which could be dealt with under appropriate conditions and safeguards without prejudice to the British Government's policy to maintain contraoand control against all supplies, except medicines, to territories under alien military domination.

Following an exchange of views on the subject the British Government expressed itself as glad under certain conditions, to collaborate in a program of relief, having this particular humanitarian end in view.

This program, drawn up by the American Red Cross with the approval of the President of the United States of America, can be outlined as follows:
