Cotton Germination In County Is **Exceedingly Low**

Cotton germination tests in the Panhandle and South Plains are exceedingly low this year, says Early Peltier, state seed analyist at Texas Technological College. Reason for the drop, from an average germination test of 72 per cent or better to 28 to 30 per cent this year on 80 per cent of the cotton tested, is excessvie rainfall. Most of the grain sorghums are badly stained but test well as to germination percentage, he said. Kafir, Martin milo, red top cane, and millet show little if any damage, although milt and hegari test lower than usual.

He advises farmers of West Texas to keep their cotton seed a month or two, allowing for a natural dormancy period required for cotton, then to bring it back to the laboratory for a second testing. Most of the tests made thus far were on seed from cotton just ginned, he said.

"It looks now as if the injury is permanent," he continues, "but there is no cause for alarm. If the seed produced in the Panhandle and South Plains are not satisfactory for night and attend our services in a planting next season, indications are body. that the southern and eastern parts of Texas will produce seed we can use."




