Places Announced For February 16th Registration

The new registration as required by the Selective Service Act will be held on February 16th 1942. Young men who reached their 20th birthday on or before Dec. 31st, 1941 will be required to register. Young men who became 20 after Jan. 1, 1942 will not have to register. However those who have become 21 since the last registration will also register. Individuals not peviously registered who have not reached their 45th birthday on Feb. 16th will be required to register.






