Texas Spur Subscription Campaign To Be Closed Saturday, February 21

The Texas Spur Subscription Campaign, which after the declaration of war was indefinitely extended, will be closed Saturday, February 21.

This bond in no means compares with the price of the car, but due to the fact that enough money has not been realized to pay for the car, and what has been paid on same, is along with the car frozen, we are under the existing circumstances, concluding this campaign as best we can.

Anyone subscribing for the Texas Spur, with only the expectation of becoming owner of the Ford, or other wise, and desires your money back, we will gladly refund same if you will call of our office with your receipts before February 21.

It is with regret that, under existing circumstances, we are not able to carry out the campaign as intended when started, we can only make such restitution as possible, refund the money to those who so desire, and give the \$250.00 Defense Bond.

W. H. Hindman Candidate For Re-election

To the Voters of Dickens County, Precinct 3:

I wish to make my announcement for re-election of Commissioner of Prec. 3. I wish to thank each one who had a part in electing me to this office, which I think is the most important office of the county as the entire finance of the county rests upon the shoulders of the Commissioner's Court.

I have been very fortunate serving on a court that has been very conservative and cooperative. The court has cooperated with the Highway Department and by so doing have secured several miles of hard surfaced roads for the county (which we are proud of). When I became a member of your Commissioner's Court three years ago, I was surprised to find that the Dickens County old bond indebtedness was \$467,500.00. Since then this indebtedness has been reduced approximately \$49,000.00. For instance, in the year 1941 the premium was \$18,500.00 and interest was \$22,940.00, also the county tax rate was lowered from \$1.38 to \$1.10. At present 56 cents of the \$1.10 tax is paid on the old indebtedness while the remaining 54 cents is for the county to operate on.

This year's record breaking rains has caused much damage to the roads and bridges, but under normal conditions we are going to make repairs and improvements without issuing scrip. (No scrip has been issued since I have been in office).

On account of National Defense, I realize that this office will be much harder to fill than in the past. There will be more work for the Commissioners Court, a scarcity of materials, parts and labor.

I believe with the three years of experience that I have had serving on Commissioners Court I can serve you better in the future than in the past. If you see fit to re-elect me to this office I will stand behind the county, state and national government at all times.

Teachers In Spur Schools Striving For Higher Scholastics

The teachers of the Spur Public Schools are very anxious to secure a general improvement in scholarship for all pupils, and they are striving to secure higher scholastic standing for the Spur Schools. Fundamental subjects such as reading, spelling, writing and arithmetic are being emphasized from the first through the twelfth grades. The teachers are urging each pupil to do remedial work if weaknesses in any of these subjects are apparent.

A survey of the causes of poor work in our school was made at the end of the first semester. In high school it was found that irregular or poor attendance was responsible for 36% of all marks below the grade of C. Poor study habits including laziness caused 35% or almost as many poor marks. It was noted that 2% of the high school pupils did poor work because of poor health. It is a challenge to both teacher and parents to remove these causes for poor work.

Many parents raise the question of home study for school pupils. Educators still believe there is no royal road to learning, and that education still requires work. To secure a genuine education home work is required. It is the belief of our teachers that some home work should be done by all pupils beginning with the fifth grade.

A decided improvement can be had by each parent securing the best attendance possible for their children which is compatible with good health. At the present time mumps, measles, and seasonal diseases are responsible for much in-attendance at school. Nothing can be done about illness preventing absence, but good attendance must be had if good school work is done.

Parents as well as teachers should give much thought to the development of good study habits, and it has been pointed out that 35% of our work is attributable to poor study habits. Each parent should see that the child has a regular place and time for home study. Let nothing interfere with this specified time and place for work. Do not attempt to do the work but see that the work is at least attempted. Frequently questions will stimulate

Registrants To Designate Place Of Residence

A Selective Service registrant, at the forthcoming February 16th registration of men in the military service age bracket of 20 to 45 years old, who has more than one place of residence may choose which one he wants recorded as his place of residence to designate the Local Board that always will have jurisdiction over him, General J. Watt Page, State Selective Service Director, said today.

General Page emphasized, however, that no transient address may be recorded and that Selective Service Regulations prohibit any interference or dictation by a registrar when a registrant who has more than one place of residence is making his choice as to which he desires recorded as his home address.

"It is the intent of the law and the purpose of Selective Service Regulations," General Page pointed out, "that each man be registered at his home address and be subject to call to fill quotas from that Local Board. That is a basic principle of democratic procedure and I expect every Selective Service registrar in the State of Texas to adhere strictly to it."

Registration cards to be used February 16th will contain a space for the registrant to list his place of residence. In the event that he has more than one place he is required to list his own choice as his place of residence.

In addition, the registration card will have space for recording a mail address. This may be the same as the place of residence or it may be another address where the registrant will receive his mail more rapidly.

Selective Service Regulations also require each registrant to describe the place of his residence so that its location may be determined from its description. A registrant who lives on an R.F.D. route will be required to supplement his mailing address by a description of the location of his residence. For this reason, and because some registrants may be able to receive their mail more readily at an address other than their place of residence, the registration card has space for both addresses.

A description of the place of residence of the registrant General Page stressed, will once and for all time determine the local board that will have jurisdiction over the registrant. The mailing address, however, can be changed when necessary and local boards will send their notices to the mailing addresses without regard to place of residence. While the mailing address is subject to change whenever the registrant moves, General Page pointed out, registrants are instructed to warn the registrant that once he designates his place of residence he irrevocably designates the local board which will have continuous jurisdiction over him.

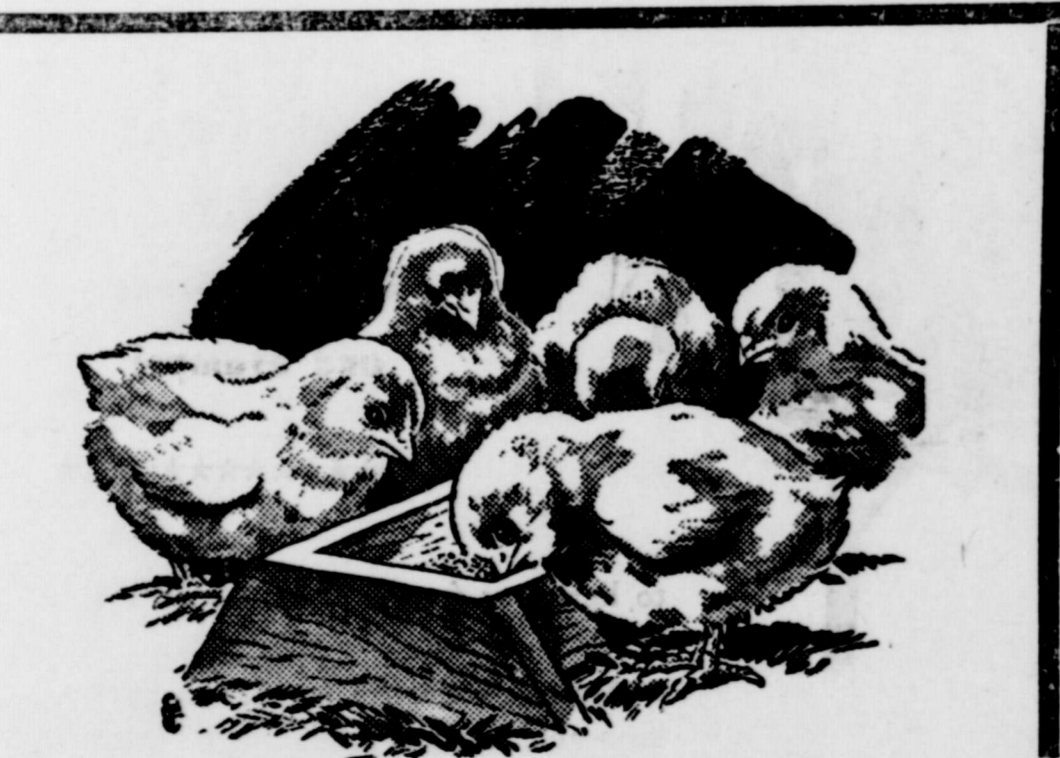
