In the registration Monday, Feb. 16, of all males between the ages of 20 and 45, there were 488 who registered in Dickens County. The Draft Board met Tuesday and sorted the cards, sending cards with out-ofcounty addresses to their respective draft boards.

Serial numbers will be issued to registrants March 9th. The date for the national lottery has not been set, but will be some time after the serial numbers are issued.

In the October 16, 1940 registration of all males from 21 to 36, there were 1006 registered in Dickens County. This makes a total of 1494 registered in the county to date, subject to military service.

A volunteer registration will be held in Dickens County next Saturday, February 21, of all civilians, men, women and children, who are willing to act in cases of enmergency for defense.

Although the registration is wholly voluntary, it is urgently requested that all civilians willing to act as Fire Wardens, Air Wardens, First Aid, and other civilian defense positions register so that the local board can assign definite duties to those willing to act in the various capacities.

Food For Freedom

Crop production, vitally important this war year, is being financed by the Emergency Crop Loan Section of the Farm Credit Administration groups to come and be represented through loans to farmers in need of credit assistance. These loans, usually known as "seed loans," are farmers in producing crops, having been successfully administered by this pioneer agency for many years.

In addition to cash crops, this bureau has always urged its borrowers to follow a balanced program with ample acreage of feed and food crops. 


