If I am authorized to announce that they do not, from one to eight stamps may be torn from their books at the time they register, and they will not be able to buy more sugar until their excess supply has been used up. No amount has been determined yet for a "normal supply," but it is expected to be a figure near two pounds per person.

#### 426,434 Registered In State Of Texas February 16th

General J. Watt Page, State Selective Service Director, today sent under the Act of Congress of March the following wire to the National Director in Washington:

"Total registration State of Texas February sixteenth 426,434."

Based on the 1940 and 1941 Selective Service registrations, which in Texas totalled more than 860,000, it had been anticipated that Monday's enrollment would reach the 500,000 mark. The difference can well be accounted for, General Page explained, by the fact that since the President's proclamation soon after Pearl Harbor, designating February 16 as Third Registration Day, many thousands of young Texans have not waited for the Selective Service Policy, Service To process but have volunteered in one of the branches of the Nation's armed forces.

#### March 1-7 Food For Victory Week

This week, March 1-7, is Food for Victory Week when Dickens County families should be getting garden plots plowed and prepared for planting, and should be getting poultry houses and equipment ready for baby chicks. Even though the weather is still quite cold, it is not too early to thoroughly clean and disinfect the brooded house that was left dirty last year, or to close up those cracks in the wall that causes a draft on the chicks. Then two days before the chicks are put in the house, the brooded should be started and regulated so that an even temperature of 95 to 98 degrees is held.

"And what would be more practical right now than a frame garden with green vegetables growing right on despite the cold," asks Fae Bass, County Home Demonstration Agent. One may be easily made from scrap lumber, with a cover made from muslin or cloth sacks, in as little space as 4 or 5 feet by 15 or 20 feet. A well constructed frame garden which is sufficiently fertilized and watered will produce abundantly all year. Vegetables especially adapted are those which mature quickly, such as lettuce, radishes, parsley, tendergreens, and others.

This year it is especially important that all the food which is produced be saved. One way of being sure to have equipment for canning is to get that equipment repaired at once if it needs it, while parts are still available. Miss Bass also urges that orders be given to dealers for canning supplies-jars, jar tops and rubbers, and cans in order that the dealers will know in advance how many they will need to order. Home canning is being encouraged this year especially, because the more food that is canned at home, the more commercial canners will be released for other duties.
