April 4th To 11th Is Designated As 4-H Club Week

The week of April 5 to 11 has been designated as 4-H Club week throughout the United States. This observance replaces the National 4-H Club Encampment held in normal years in June at Washington.

In keeping with this emphasis week, Dickens County 4-H Club girls are getting into full swing to do their part in the Victory Program to help win the war. There have been three 4-H Clubs recently organized, according to Fae Bass, County Home Demonstration Agent, and a club is being organized this week at McAdoo. The officers of the clubs already organized are:

Wichita 4-H Club — President, Minnie Pearl Stubblefield; Vice-President, Dorothy Lee Lester; Secretary-Treasurer, Joyce Adams; Reporter, Winona Adams; Game Leader, Marlene Adams; and Song Leader, Wanda Fay Lester.

During 4-H Club Week effort will be made to remind adults and youth that the work to be done concerns every individual, and that boys and girls must do their part in a full-sized job, the agent said. "Effort also will be made to stimulate family and community work to the end that every individual may make his best contribution toward Victory."

Farm boys and girls, 80,000 of them in Texas through their 4-H Club work have carried on a seven-point national defense program for the last year and a half. Sugar Rationing Registration Set For May 4 to 7

May the 4, 5, 6, and 7 are the days set for registration of domestic consumers of sugar to receive their rationing books. Registration will take place in elementary schools over the country.

Every individual must use their own rationing books, but that does not mean that a mother cannot take all the books to the store and collect for the whole family. It does mean that Jones can't transfer his book to Smith.

The coupon books will be issued at the time of the registration but it will not be necessary for every member of the family to register in person. Either parent may register for the whole family.

Along with the announcement of the registration dates, the Rationing Administrator and Boards are making an urgent appeal to all persons having more sugar than the allotted amount to please resell it to your merchant. This is being urged in order to avoid complications and misunderstanding when the rationing books are issued. Anyone having over 2 pounds of sugar at the time of registration it is considered hoarded sugar.

Following is a statement sent to the local Board by Rationing Administrator Mark McGee:

"Mr. Mark McGee, Texas Rationing Administrator has announced that he had secured the full cooperation of Texas Food Store Organizations in the 'Re-Purchase Sugar Program.' Mr. Albert L. Walters, Counsellor for the Texas Chain Store Association, which includes chain drugs, variety and department stores, as well as A. & P. and Safeway; and Mr. Hanna, Texas Wholesale Grocers Association; Mr. A. L. Becker of the Texas Merchants Association and Mr. Roger Q. Flournoy of the Texas Retail Grocers Association have all by wire or telephone pledged their full cooperation in the 'Re-Purchase Sugar Program.' The State Administrator also is issuing by medium of the press a plea to all food stores that are not members of the organizations listed above to cooperate to the fullest extent in getting those who have bought sugar in excess of the legal rationing amount, to encourage the customers to 'bring the sugar in.' Mr. McGee stated that when customers applying for the rationing booklet they will be required to certify the amount of sugar their families have in their possession. More than two pounds per person will be considered as hoarded sugar. Penalties for false statements are up to \$10,000 fine or ten years imprisonment.

The Dickens County Rationing Board has moved its office to the City Hall in Spur. Anyone desiring information or wish to apply for a rationed product may do so by contacting the Board or any of its members at the City Hall.

Thus far no other names have been presented for the ballot.

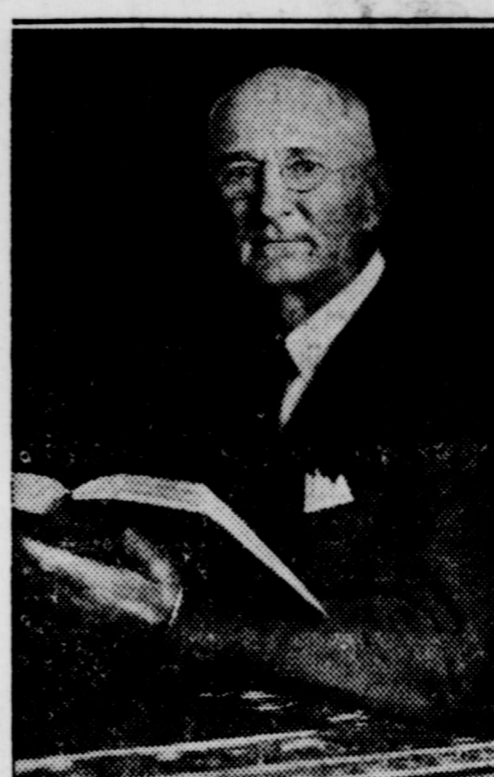
SENNINGS ATTEND FUNERAL OF E. F. ACKERLEY, A BROTHER-IN-LAW, AT GAINESVILLE

Students May Be Called To Help With Agriculture

High school and college students may be provided with an opportunity this summer to "do their bit" in the war by helping in the Government's "Food for Victory" program, according to J. H. Bond, Director of the United States Employment Service for Texas.

Cooperating in the Government's program, Texas farmers during this year expect to produce the greatest food crops in history. Because many farm workers have gone into the armed services and war production factories, shortages of workers are expected in some localities during the growing and harvest season. Students may be called upon to make up for these shortages.

Students always have done a fine job in bringing in crops when their help was needed. In States suffering farm labor shortages, students last year joined the Employment Service in the drive to find workers to save the crops. In fact, in many a rural area without student help there would have been a considerable loss of food.

Not since 1917 has there been such a demand for farm workers. The battle for food on the home front must be won. It is a battle that we must win if we are to win the war. The production of food is as important as the production of planes, tanks, guns, and ships.

So, in the months to come, United States Employment Service offices may call for young men and women to fill jobs in agriculture. Those wishing to do their part to aid their country should apply at the employment office nearest to their home.

Hunter, of Spur, junior student in cotton marketing at Texas A&M College has been named winner of the medal presented annually by the Texas Cotton Association to outstanding students in that field, according to announcement by J. B. Bagley, professor of cotton marketing at the college. Hunter will be presented the medal at the thirty-first annual convention of the Texas Cotton Association to be held in Houston March 27.

Selection of the medal winner is based on grades, which must be at least a B. Average for the two year period of cotton marketing study, and on attitude, personality and similar qualities. 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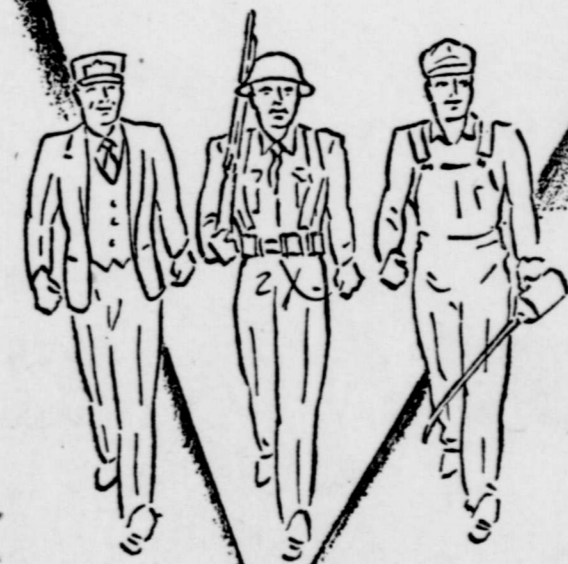
