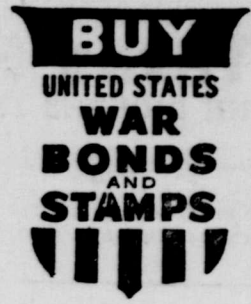

## Grasshoppers Are Menace To Parts Of Dickens County

Dickens County farmers report the grasshoppers are here in great numbers and are threatening our crops in many parts of the county.

County Agent Mack Woodrum stated that more than three hundred thousand pounds of poison has been mixed in the mixing station in Spur during the past three weeks. More than 40,000 pounds was mixed Monday. He added that an effort was being made to keep plenty of poison materials on hand so that any one can get a sufficient amount for their needs to keep the hoppers out of their row crops.

A number of wheat farmers have been poisoning them in their wheat. Dr. Hale reported at least an eighty-five per cent kill in his wheat. M. L. Rickels said he really thinned them out in his wheat.

Farmers desiring poison can obtain it at the county mixing station at the Farmers Co-op Gin in Spur. Please bring your sacks.

Better results may be expected by killing the hoppers while they are small and before they scatter over the field.

Let's feed these hoppers poison so we can raise some food and fiber for the war effort.

## Scrap Iron And Steel Are Needed For Victory

Practically every home in Texas is harboring at least one .50-caliber machine gun, and most of our farms and ranches are harboring the equivalent of anything from a 3" anti-aircraft gun to a .75 millimeter howitzer or a 2000 pound aerial bomb.

This is, of course, in the form of scrap iron and steel—50 pounds of scrap being necessary to manufacture one .50-caliber machine gun, 600 pounds of scrap for one 3" anti-aircraft gun, 1000 pounds of scrap for one .75 millimeter howitzer and 2000 pounds of scrap being necessary to make one 2000 pound aerial bomb.

Our job is to get this scrap into the junk yards so that it can be graded, cut to specifications and shipped to our factories.

Nothing could be more pathetic than the picture of our boys facing the enemy without their full quota of guns, tanks and shells—simply because we have sat complacently at home and failed to produce all of the scrap that our factories can possibly consume in the manufacture of this fighting equipment.

Dickens County has turned in several tons of scrap metal, but there are many tons still on the farms and ranches that should be brought to town. It is the responsibility of everyone to see that all of the scrap metal on his farm is brought in. Encourage your neighbors to bring in their scrap metal. Some of the factories are not running day and night due to the fact that they cannot get materials to keep them running. Bring in your scrap metal and let's keep the factories turning day and night.

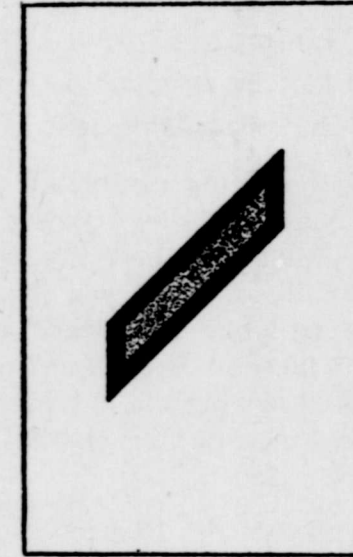

Official U. S. Treasury TEXAS WAR BOND QUOTAS FOR JUNE

WASHINGTON, D. C. June 1.—Henry Morgenthau, Jr., Secretary of the Treasury, today made known June War Bond quotas for the 3,070 counties in the nation to all State and County War Savings Staffs.

The June quota for the State of Texas is \$26,002,200. The county quotas, based upon a substantial increase over May quotas, are expected to reach ten per cent of income when the nation goes on a billion-dollar-a-month War Bond basis in July to help meet the war cost. "Everybody, every pay day, ten per cent," is the battle cry throughout the country. You can buy War Bonds at your Bank, Building & Loan Association, Post Office and at many department stores.

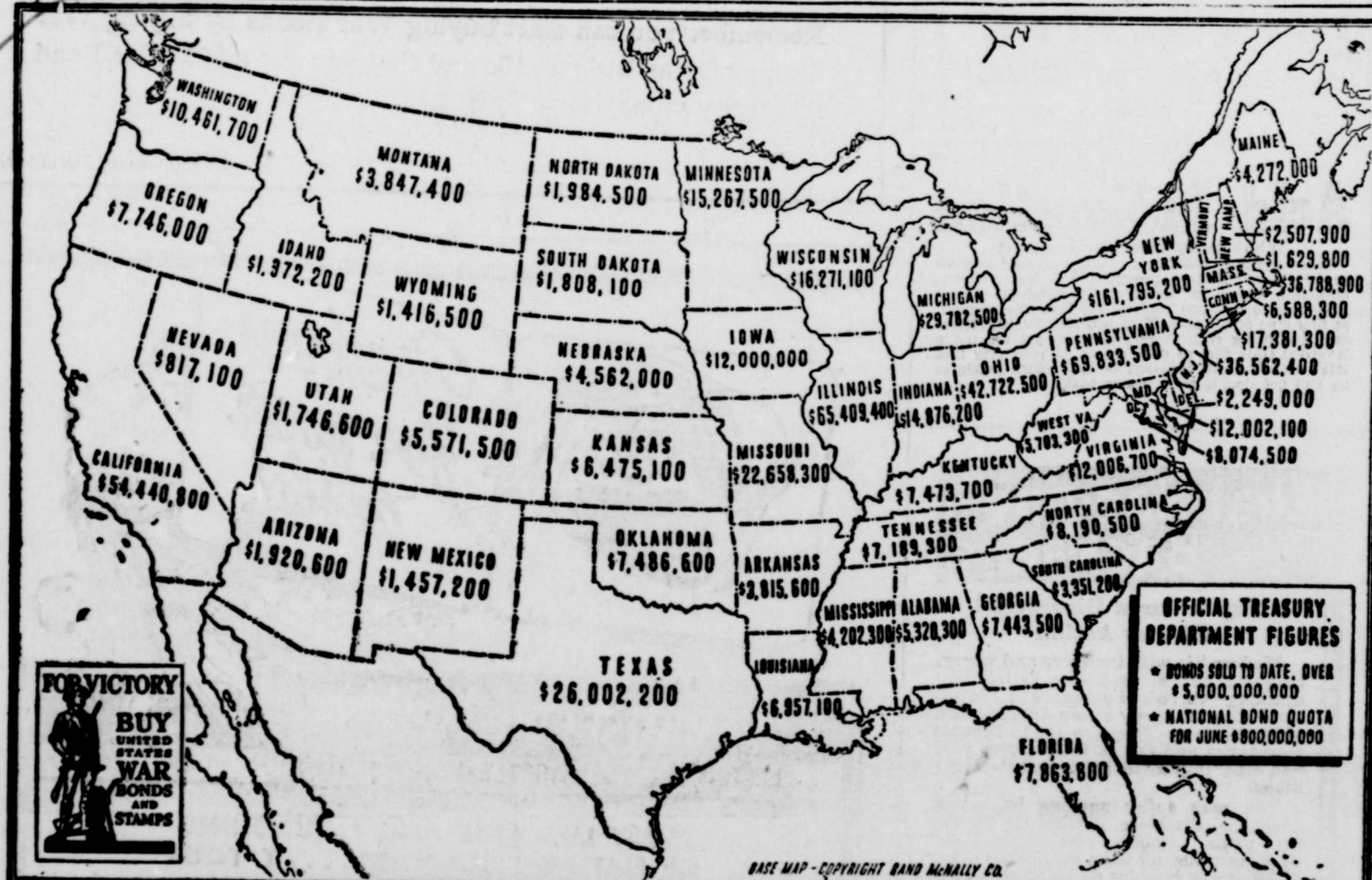
