The house of the farmer, of labor and of industry is on fire and they will en have made over the past 150 years unless they put that fire out cold. The time to start pouring on the water is now.

The nation-wide gasoline rationing program is to be imposed as a means of preserving rubiec. In the opinion of some experts, it would have been possible to provide an adequate supply of rubber for ivilan use by now the goverber had lem first appeared. That, of course, political vacillation that has characteriz ed the handling of the rubber situation in the past must not
tinuee in the future.

The wise course to pursue at this time is obvious. The government mus give maximum cooperation to secure the swiftest and largest possible production source. Some kinds of rubber are made from oil. Others are made from coal. Others still are made from grain aicohol of them should be developed without furher bickering and delay.
