Farmers who are using imported cotton pickers are urged to impart this information to the pick-

# Washington Snapshots

The anti-inflation bill is now aw and major excitement over the bill itself has subsided for the time being while taxes and manower move into the limelight.

Rationing of manpower, the third major program for control of America's resources, has started All critical materials are now being rationed to manufacturers by WPB. Consumer goods are being rationed by OPA. And, now, through the War Manpower compission and the armed services, labor is being rationed. The country is beginning to realize the serousness of its growing shortage of men.

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Manpower will be rationed by government through (1) freezing of workers in essential obs; (2) labor priorities for war producing operations; (3) transfer and assignment of workers to areas where war production denands required additional labor supply. The job-freezing program is already under way. Because the situation is so acute, nanpower administrators will not wait for legislation.

Five official steps toward the freezing of workers in jobs have been taken: (1) The War Manpower commission directive freezing workers in their jobs in West ern mines, lumber camps and mills; (2) the joint War department and Manpower commission instructions to manufacturers in the Third Army depot area (Philadelphia) freezing workers in war plants with only a few specific exemptions. Plans are under way the joint action of the War Manpower commission and Selective Service in freezing farm workers. They have been advised that if they migrate from the farms they face immediate army inducto be your trouble?"
