1,000 People Attend Rally and Purchase \$108,000 War Bonds

The opening gun in the Fifth War Loan was fired here Monday night with the staging of a huge bond rally on West Harris street between the Spur Security bank and the Fair Store, when approximately \$108,000 in war bonds were sold in about one and one-half hours.

Major David Evans of Camp Barkeley, World War I veteran, was master of ceremonies.

Somber enthusiasm seemed to pervade the audience of approximately 1,000 people, as they briskly purchased bonds under the persuasive pleadings of Major Evans "not to let our boys 'over there' down." Purahases ranged from \$20,000 by some of the big buyers down to the popular \$25 denomination, many of which were eagerly bought by eight and nine-year-old boys and girls who, no doubt, dug deep into their movie money and vacation funds that they might partisipate in "helping win the war" as they eagerly proclaimed to the audience from the improvised platform at the south door of the spur Security bank from which the program was being directed. Buyers went directly into the bank where W. T. Andrews and his staff of assistants issued the



Lesson Text: IITim. 2: 1-4, 8-12; 4: 5-8.

The two epistles of Timothy and the epistle of Titus have been called "The Pastoral Epistles," because they were written by Paul from the pastoral viewpoint. Paul not only preached and founded churches, he also chose and trained pastors to continue his work in those churches. It is believed that both of his letters to Timothy were written while Paul was a prisoner at Rome, but that several years intervened between their writing.

The Second Epistle to Timothy is believed to be the last letter Paul ever penned and is referred to as "The last will and testament of Paul, and swan song." This letter is a very personal letter a young preacher whom Paul thought of almost as a son, referring to him as "my child."


