
# July 5th set For **Opening Canning Instruction Center**

Recognizing the continued necessity for placing emphasis on food preservation, Spur public school officials have completed arrangements for setting up a canning instruction center with sufficient facilities to process the major portion of the garden products of those citizens who do not have adequate equipment or knowledge to do the job correctly.

C. F. Cook, school superintendent, has announced that Walter Labay, vocational agriculture teacher, will have general supervision of the project, and that the school board will provide instructors with training and experience in canning to assist local Victory gardeners lay away a supply of home grown food.

Each individual using the canning facilities will furnish his own cans, jars, seasoning and produce. The equipment, heat, water, and electricity will be furnished free to patrons of the canning instruction center, Mr. Cook said. No toll or charges will be made for the use of the equipment.




# **Trip to Mountain Camp By Parents**

In order to serve the greatest number of people in the best manner, each patron is urged to make appointment ahead of time for the use of the center. Appointment must be made with Mrs. Joe Jeffers, supervisor of canning instructions, on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays at the center, from 9 to 12 o'clock, or other hours when the center is operating.

It will be possible to can from 800 to 1200 cans per day in the center with the equipment set up as it is. An electric automatic sealer that will seal a can a minute, two retorts and two pressure cookers that will process under steam pressure 150 pints at a time, and a steam bath and water bath that can be used to process 60 pints of fruit and vegetables at a time.

Patrons may can whatever they like so long as they provide all the materials, all their contain-
