

Lt. Julien Boothe Killed in Action in France June 29th

"He will not be coming back. when it's over over here." These are words quoted from a letter written by Sgt. Larry Boothe, somewhere in England, to his father, Homer A. Boothe, who had on Monday received a telegram from the War department, notifying him that Lt. Boothe was missing in action since June 29. The telegram read:

"The Secretary of War desires me to express his deep regret that your son, 1st Lt. Oscar J. Booth, has been reported missing in action since twenty-nine June over France. If further details or other information are received you will be promptly notified. The Adjutant General."

In the letter which Sgt. Boothe wrote his father, which was, he said, the hardest letter he hoped he would ever have to write, he said that he had talked with some of the men who saw his brother, Julian, go down and, also, with his commanding officer. Lt. Boothe was lost while leading a flight in the mission that was to have been his 100th and last before he would have been sent back to the states.

Sgt. Boothe wrote that the fellows who knew Lt. Boothe, spoke of him as being one of the bestliked officers and one of the best pilots of the group. Regarding his brother's death, Sgt. Boothe said, "We have one consolation: We both know that Julian loved to fly and that he would rather have gone out in an airplane than any otherway."

Lt. Julian Boothe enlisted in the Army Air Corps in September, 1942, and received his first

After a short furlough home, he left his base in Georgia in August, 1943, to fly his crew to England where he has since been

Lt. Boothe had a splendid flying record. On his 99th mission, he had never been wounded and only two of his men had been killed.

He had been awarded the Air Medal and the Distinguished Flying Cross for his excellent service.







PLANE TALK Rowland Burnstan

"Flying the Beam" is a common expression, but few people understand its application. The illustration shows a radio range station and four radio guide beams which are sent out to direct the pilot.



The radio range transmits the letter A (...), which has the radio ed the A quadrants, and also the letter N (-) which has the tone of "da-dit," in the N quadrants. It is these various sounds which tell the pilot his position in relation to the beam. If he flies within the 3 degree angle of the beam (shaded portion) he hears one continuous humming tone (daaa) in his earphones. This is because the A and N quadrants are blended and he hears them with equal intensity.

If the pilot flies off the beam on the N side he will hear the N signal (da-dit) stronger and the A signal (dit-da) will become weaker. By the same principle, if he is too far on the A side he will hear only the A signal (dit-da). A map will

Second Period For Canning Sugar From July 1st to Dec. 31st

A second period for the issuance of home canning sugar which will run from July 1 to December 1 of this year has been announced by the District Office of Price Administration.

'The purpose of this second period is to take care of late fruits available for canning. If you have already received sugar for home canning during the first period and can establish eligibility for additional sugar, application may be made to your War Price & Rationing Board for it,' according to George H. Wilson, District Food

The rationing official stated that if you did not apply during the first period for the first allotment, you may apply now and attach to your application spare stamp No. 37 for each member of your household for which you are applying. Failure to apply during the first period will not prohibit your receiving the max-

imum amount granted for home


