



Clairemont Man Is Uninjured When Nazi Hit B-24 Liberator

AN EIGHTH AIR FORCE LIBERATOR STATION—Second Lt. Jehu F. Stewart of Clairewas uninjured recently when the B-24 Liberator "Midnight Choo Choo," in which he was flying as co-pilot, was blasted by Nazi anti-aircraft batteries over enemy territory.

Although hitting no one,, flak damaged the aileron control cables and severed hydraulic lines. The pilot, 1st Lt. Gayle H. Miller of Montgomery, Ala., with Lt. Stewart's assistance, nursed the bomber along while the aerial engineer, Sgt. James M. Marshall of Hermiston, Ore., effected temporary repairs.

Although blinded by hydraulic fluid, the navigator, 2nd Lt. James W. Abell. of Chicago, Ill, managed to direct the "Midnight Choo Choo" on its homeward journey. As a result of Sgt. Marshall's quick repairjob, the pilot and Lt. Stewart flew the crippled Liberator back to England, and landed it without mishap.

Lt. Stewart, who in civilian life was a rancher near Claireentered the service at Barksdale Field, La., on Jan. 4, 1941 and was on overseas assignment from March 4, 1941 to March 21, 1943. He entered foreign duty in the European theater on June 3, 1944. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert F. Stewart of Box 56



One of the instruments which plays an important part in air 43-2tc flight in relation to the air through which it is flying. Ground speed, however, is the speed of the airplane in relation to the ground, and is not indicated by this instrument, 43-2tp. but can be computed from the readings. In addition to its use as a safety instrument, the airspeed indi-cator aids in navigation. It is also possible for the pilot to tell from any indicated change in speed if the plane is not in level flight during poor flying weather.


