2. Car owner's registration, or JOHN A. BURKS. driver's license-Always examine closely. See that no change have been made in descriptions. Be sure that the authentic stamp of the issuing office or bureau appears on the card, and that no signs of tampering or mulitation are indicated. Write the license and State of issue on the check itself. This makes a follow up much easier.

3. Insist that all checks be endorsed in your presence. The bogus check passes is always impatient, has to make a train, or acts in an important manner. He presents the check ater banking hours and just before your closing hour, and is most always active before holidays.

4. Always take time to make careful comparison of signatures -handwriting. Compare the new signature on the check with the signature on the identification. Be careful to compare with payee's name on face of check to see if check has been endorsed exactly as drawn-if it is not, your suspicion should be aroused.

5. Beware of printed company checks-watch any and all rubber stamped items. The bad check passer is skilled in cashing bogus company checks printed in advance. If a local company, check the telephone book, and make an attempt to verify the issuing of the check. If it is an out-of-town check, be doubly careful to verify that such company actually exists.

6. Do not accept social security cards as identification under any circumstances. The Social Security Board has cautioned merchants against counterfeit social Security cards being used for cashing checks. Remember that upwards of 50,000 worn out or lost cards are being replaced per month. Also remember that no check can be made of Sosial Security records, not even by

police authorities. 7. Bank Pass book or check book-No proof of authentic account or funds. The possession of the above should not be accepted as definite identifications of the presenter, nor as authority to draw checks on the bank. There may be many fake deposits entered in the pass book; they might have gotten the check by some subterfuge.

8. Beware of unidentified Service men-Authentic service men have credentials. Ask to see the man's identification tag, it gives his name, address, Army serial number. Write these on the check. Also ask him to write under the endorsement any other identifying information as to address that can be given.

9. Be absolutely sure of identification before cashing allotment checks. Army and Navy dependency checks and others are being stolen. Know your endorser absolutely before cashing checks for strangers, require proper and adequate identification. Make notation on back of check as to identification presented. This may help you later.

10. Report all bad checks to Spur Retail Merchants Association. By doing so you may save the next inquiring member from a similar loss. We cooperate fully and completely with police authorities.

11. Write all important identifying data on back of checks. We again restate this suggestion as it is to very important in trying to trace check passers. When you look at a license card be careful to note that number and State on the back of check Should that check bounce back, you then have something very definite to use in tracing and in remembering the case. This is most important-instruct all persons cashing checks to follow

this procedure. 12. Don't be suckers for professional check passers and crooks. Take your time. Get real bonafide identification before cashing checks for strangers. Review all of the above points and if properly followed you will not be the victim of many check passers. Money saved in this manner is just the same as profits earned. Don't be too sales hungry to be careul.


