#### **County Quota Set** \$5,500; Spur Must Raise Half of This

Friday, Dickens county will join the nation in an attempt to raise 200 million dollars, needed to carry on vital work of the American Red Cross during 1945.

The quota for Dickens county is set at \$5,500. The county, however, is divided into different areas with a quota levied on each area, Jack Christian, chairman of the county Red Cross drive, said.

Spur is supposed to raise \$2750. of the total quota for the county. in order to facilitate contact with residents of Spur, the town is divided into five groups. They are the employer committee, composed of George S. Link, George Gabriel and Joe Long: the employee committee, subdivided ino three teams, headed by Lawis Lee, residential section, chairman, Mrs. O. B. Ratliff, who is also chairman of the city federation of study clubs: Negro committee including George Kerr, Mrs. Goldstein, Lovey Mae Henderson and Mrs.

#### **SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON**

#### JESUS TEACHES FORGIVE-NESS

International Sunday School Lesson for March 4, 1945

GOLDEN TEXT: "If ye forgive men their trespasses, your heavenly Father will also forgive you; but if ye forgive not men their trespasses, neither will your Father forgive your trespasses." Matthew 6: 14-15.

Lesson Text: Matthew 18: 21-35.

In our lesson on Forgiveness, we base our thoughts on a passage from Matthew which shows us how Jesus advised his followers to make every possible effort to help one of their fellowhumans. This life of helpfulness is one of the basic principles of Christianity, if we would follow the example of Christ.

The rabbis required that an offender should go to the man he wronged and seek forgiveness, which their rule said should be granted three times. Jesus lays down the general thought that love recognizes no limit in its effort to redeem, that forgiveness is not a matter of arithmetic but 1,030.21 an attitude of the heart.

> As so often happened, it was the impetuous Peter who voiced 99.59 the question in the minds of the disciples by asking how often should he forgive a brother. Peter suggested seven times, more than required by the Jewish rule, but Jesus multiplies the number indefinitely, saying "until seventy times seven." Knowing the boundless expanse of perfect love, Jesus knew that no confinement could be placed upon its exercise.

Then, Jesus illustrated his teachings by the story which forms the basis of our lesson. A servant, who had been forgiven by his king for his own deficiency, forgot the kindness bestowed upon himself and, when one of his own subordinates was found in a like state in relation to himself, adopted an attitude of severity aganst him.

The fact that his own master ad been moved by pity for hunan misery on his behalf was orgotten as he sought to apply orture and pressure in the other

Jesus pointed out that every uman being was the recipient of o great heavenly forgiveness that an attitude of oppression of severity would be entirely nconsistent.

It is easy to give way to hatred nd carry animosity, but it is obler to forget and forgive injustice and wrong in the interest of a more peaceable and complete

The world suffers greatly beause of its varous antipathies nd enmities. Discord between ndividuals stirs up strife in various localities, hostility between arious classes, sectional animosiies, national prejudices and acial repugnances, all contribute to prevent the reign of fellowship and mutual helpfulness which love would implant in every human soul.

Surely, in these days of strife, we need this teaching of Jesus on Forgiveness. We find it easier to hate those we feel have not only wronged us, but have thrown the entire world into haos because of their evil doing. We should endeavor to follow the examples of Jesus, however, who hated the sin, but loved the sinner.

As a man practices the spirit of forgiveness his spirit grows, s Tennyson, in the following eautiful line, declares: Oh, man! forgive thy mortal foe,

For ever strike him blow for For all the souls on earth that

To be forgiven must forgive. "Forgive him seventy times and

For all the blessed souls in

Much of the success of seeding native grasses 12-tfc a stand has been obtained is also very important. 2. Have a firm seed bed. 3. Drill with special grass drill in the early spring when other grasses start coming. 4. Be carefu not to cover too




