Citizens Urged Pay Tax Before January 31st So Can Vote

Election Year For Most State and **County Offices**

With a political year at hand, and a big crop of candidates and issues to be decided upon, and with many veterans at home to exert a first-hand influence in elections, interest in voting during the next several months is expected to be high in the coun-

Tax Collector Fred Christopher estimates a probable 2,300 paid poll taxes this year of which 1317 had been receipted the first of this week.

Besides the usual run of "overs" and unders" there will be a considerable vote by returned veterans to increase the volume o voters this year.

Concerning questios of eligibility for voting in Dickens county, Sheriff Christopher states no certificates b yeither "overs" or "unders" are required in this county. Those who were 60 years of age or more on January 1, 1945, are not required to have an exemption to vote; reports to the contrary are directed to persons who reside in cities of 10,000 or more population. In some cases election judges may require affidavits.

World War 11 veterans will vote this year without paying any poll tax and may do so for a period of 18 months after their discharge. To prove his right to vote the only thing the veteran will have to do is to show hisdischarge in the precinct of his residence.

Poll taxes must be paid by January 31.

35 c. onion
36 c. green pepper 1/4 tsp. pepper 21/2 c. whole kernel 2½ c. canned tomatoes 1 c. rice cereal

Use link sausages or bulk sausage shaped into links; brown them in a heavy frying pan and drain well. Brown chopped onion and green pepper in meat drippings. Add flour and seasonings and mix well. Add corn and tomatoes and simmer until juice has partially evaporated (about one-half hour). Pour into casserole; arrange sausages on top in pinwheel shape. Sprinkle cereal over top. Bake at 400° F. about 15 minutes. Serves 6.




