

Cost is to be 60c per front foot where the curbing and gutter is already down on grade level, and where curbing and gutter is to be put down this will cost \$1 per foot making a 50 foot lot cost the owner \$30 for paving and \$50 for curbing and gutter. This may be paid in cash or in five annual

The first street signed up will be the first to get paving, and property owners are urged to see their neighbors and get them to attend to this at once and thus the paving program can get under way. A total of about 200 blocks should be paved during this ef-

Materials and equipment are assured the city to begin the program, and the only thing holding up the starting is failure of some property owners to sign up. Most of the Avenues running north and and property owners should see the city manager about their own street. The city will pave any street where the property owners sign up for it.


