May Be Next Big Improvement Project Undertaken by City

City Manager Is Hopeful Water Can Be Much Improved

A project being planned for the future by the City of Spur, according to James H. Cowan. City Manager, may make possible a water supply here which will be seventy-five percent less hard, and chemically superior, to that now obtainable.

Mr. Cowan, avoiding technical terms as much as possible, explained that all water in this

If practical use of this knowledge, along with other considerations including costs, can be worked out to the advantage of the community, a campaign for "better water for Spur" will be considered as the next big project of the city when the paving vrogram and other matters now before them are taken care of.

"I am very hopeful that the quality of the water in Spur can be improved at a cost not prohibitive," Mr. Cowan said, "but it is a project which we cannot go into fully until probably next

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

Livestock Markets Visited By Local Rancher Last Week

Fred C. Haile, rancher and stock farmer of Spur, spent last week in Dallas and Fort Worth where he attended the Fat Stock Show and livestock markets.

Mr. Haile said that everything coming in to the markets there, the Field of Training-Rev. F. M. as well as livestock markets in Wiley. Lubbock, is underweight stuff. Only small calves and hogs from the Field of Evangelism-Rev. H. 75 to 150 pounds, a few sheep B. Fields. and lambs, are being marketed at this time. None of the livestock has been fed out, which points to the current shortage of feed. Since combine maize, which is raised in large quantities in this area, is selling at \$3.00 per hundred, stockmen are not feeding out their stock, and are selling, at low prices, underweight stock,

Mr. Haile remarked. Mr. Haile has nine registered sows on his Foundation Farm which are beginning to farrow this week. He expects above 90 pigs to be farrowed. He plans to keep his herd, having around 45 acres in alfalfa which will provide pasturage the year round.



BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Commissioners of the City of Spur, Texas:

Section 1. All dogs within the corporate limits of the City of Spur shall be vaccinated for rabies. A vaccination is considered under the terms of this ordinance to be effective for a period of one year only.


