The Famine Emergency Committee has asked Americans to cooperate during the present food emergency to conserve bread so that starving people in other lands may be fed. We offer in the following suggestions ways to save precious bread.

TO KEEP YOUR BREAD FRESH -Open the wrapper at one end of the loaf only. Remove the heel, take out only the slices needed, replace the heel, and fold over waxed paper. TO FRESHEN DRY BREAD -If your bread becomes slightly dry, sprinkle the wrapper around bread in a paper sack and sprinkle. Place in a moderate oven (350° F.) for about 10 minutes or until bread is heated through. Serve immedi-

ately for a homemade-bread flavor.

WHEN YOU BUY BREAD-Buy the size loaf that fits your family . . . small loaves for small families, large loaves for large families. Plan to have no bread left over from one shopping trip to the next. If you must buy bread for several days' use, get two small loaves rather than one large loaf.

MELBA TOAST—Use leftover sliced bread. Place on a baking sheet in a single layer and dry out in slow oven (250° F.) about 11/2 hours or until a tempting tawny brown. Store in an airtight container and use as needed. Use in place of bread for breakfast, lunch, dinner or as a snack.
