MEALTIME This is the season of the year when winter furnishings look sort of drab. And the same applies to our tables. So plan to let the beef pot roast with its rich brown gravy and mashed potatoes give way to lamb casserole with its medley of small whole potatoes, new peas, carrots. Replace the heartier steamed puddings and their luxuriant sauces with refrigerator desserts or

well-chilled fruits and simple wafers.

LAMB TROTTERS: Mighty good eating is this dish of lamb shanks, one to a person for a hearty serving, simmered until tender in boiling water, the amount depending upon how much gravy is desired. For flavor, add an onion, celery tops, salt, pepper. Allowing just enough time for the vegetables to cook, add small whole carrots or carrot strips, scraped new potatoes. When nearly cooked, stir in 1 cup or more of fresh or frozen peas and a thin flour and water or cream thickening, turn into a casserole and serve with rice muffins, a green salad and not much else.

JUST TO BE DIFFERENT: Next time you plan on Fricassee Chicken, serve it with this Fried Mush. Stir 1 cup cornmeal slowly into 4 cups boiling water. Add 1 small can deviled ham, and cook until thickened. stirring all the time. Turn into greased loaf pans to chill. To serve, slice and dip in cornmeal. Brown each side in bacon or ham drippings. Add a salad of mixed greens, with ice-cold coffee gelatin or Bavarian cream to finish off, and there is A Meal!



We are being asked to appropriate the money for an army which will number one and onehalf million men on July 1, 1946, For District Attorney. 110th and shrink to one million by June 30, 1947. The huge sum of seven and one-fourth billion dollars is being requested for this one-year period. This is a vast sum of money, but it is quite a come- For Sheriff, Tax Assessor and down from the peak annual appropriation for the army of 72 billion dollars in 1944. The money requested for next year, the first post-war year, is one-third of the sum which was appropriated for the year just prior to the outbreak of the war.

In our democracy the army makes available for publication many facts which no other nation would think of publishing. The Russians, and even the British, do not make public detailed figures about their military strength.

On July 1st we will have 402,-000 men in the Pacific area, 338,-000 in Europe, and 737.000 in continental United States. The army proposes that by June 30, 1947, the numbers will be reduced to 273,000, 161,000 and 547,000 respectively. These figures do not take into account the men we have in Alaska. Newfoundland, and North Atlantic and the Caribbean areas.



#### Age Limit For Navy **Newcomers Will Be** 17 to 35

The organized naval reserve is now setting up its recruiting program, Captain Arthur A. Ageton, USN, director of naval reserve for the Eighth Nava! district, anmounced.

While navy recruiting activities now in operation will be of some assistance in reserve manpower procurement, most men will be enlisted through agencies directed by local battalion and division officers appointed by the commandant. Eighth Naval district, Captain Ageton said.

Until the termination of selecave service or a change in present legislation ,only ex-navy men will be eligible for membership in naval reserve activities. However, young men may, before induction. participate in weekly drills of the organized units on a volunteer, non-member basis.

Maintenance of large ships, patrol craft, and other vessels for use in training, organized reservists will require a number of "shipkeepers" for routine up-keep during idle periods. Captain Ageson stated that men for these duties will be drawn from the ranks of fleet reservists until July 1. 1946, and after that date from members of reserve divisions who request such duty on a full-time active duty basis.

Age limits for navy newcomers will be 17 to 35. Ex-navy men may enter if they are between the ages of 17 and 35 plus the number of years they have served on active duty with the navy. Maximum age limit for all personnel below the rank of commander is 501/2 years.

Men shipping into the organized reserve will retain their rates held at time of discharge and will be promoted similarly to men on active duty.

#### **Olin Culberson Asks Reelection**

Olin Culberson, chairman of the Texas railroad commission, today formally announced his candidacy for a second term as railroad commissioner basing his candidacy on his record of economical administration, his hard fight to conserve the Texas natural gas supply and his consistent drive for the removal of the freight rate discrimination against Texas farmers, fruit and vegetable growers, ranchers and other producers.

> "But the fight to make of the Texas railroad commission what Jim Hogg conceived it should be when he battled the 'special interests' to create the commission has just started. Governor Hogg saw it as guardian of the people's rights and the public wealth. Olin Culberson sees the commission's duty in that same light today. The economic structure of our state is founded largely on our great oil industry and our natural resurces must not be squandered now but must be conserved for the welfare of future generations as well as for the benefit of the present. Chairman Culberson, nearing 60 and a veteran of World War I, was born in Coryell county. As a young man he worked in the Katy railroad yard at Hillsboro as a switchman. He served Hill county both as county clerk and then as county judge before moving to Edna, Jackson county, in 1928 and engaging in the mercantile business and farming. Olin Culberson is a member of the Presbyterian church, Lions club, American Legion and is secretary of the Texas Volunteer Firemen with organizations in 515 towns, which membership is composed almost in its entirety of veterans of World War I or World War II.
