POLIO DANGER — LET'S ALL AID IN THE CLEAN-UP CAMPAIGN JUNE 3 - 8

June 3 through June 8, has been designated by Mayor L. E. Lee, as Clean-Up Week in Spur.

It is the desire of the mayor as well as the other city officials that the people of Spur will try wholeheartedly to make Spur a cleaner and more attractive town, and to continue this clean-up drive until the town is clean on the backside as well as on the front side.

Everyone is asked not only to clean up their premises, but to assume the responsibility of co-operating with the other residents of your block, in an effort to clean up the entire block.

The city is appealing to your pride and your love for your home and family to help in this matter of cleaning up our town; and eliminating mosquitoes and flies, that are such a menace to the health of our people.

Mosquitoes breed in stagnant pools of water, culverts, water holes on vacant lots and dark places under your house and around the garage.

Tin cans, which catch and hold rainwater, are particularly a menace. It is wise to punch holes in the tin cans before placing them in containers to be disposed of later.

The fly breeds in filth in the barn yards, over-ground toilets, decayed matter of all kinds and takes it into your home, if you will let him, spread it over your food and make an intimate contact with every member of your family.

Garbage cans should be sprayed, both inside and out, with DDT, and on the ground around it.

Stressing the importance of clean-up as a health measure, since there are so many cases of infantile paralysis in the state.

It was once believed that "Polio" was transmitted by means of discharge from the nose and throat, although this may play a role in the spread of the disease, it is now believed that infantile paralysis is primarily another of the several intestinal infections.

Therefore, control measures must emphasize clean-up campaigns and improvements in sanitation.

Covered garbage cans are recommended. Rats and mice should be eliminated.

Let's all join in and really clean up the town. All home owners can help by cleaning their yards and alleys, if they cannot hire someone to do it.

The business men can clean the front and sides of their buildings and by all means clean the alleys and the gutters in front of your building.

All trash will be hauled off by the city if you will put it in containers or sacks, so that it may be lifted up and placed on trucks. Everyone should pitch in and really help, by seeing that your own property is clean. If a majority will do this, it will be a great help and everyone will be glad to see a cleaner town and a safer one in which to live.

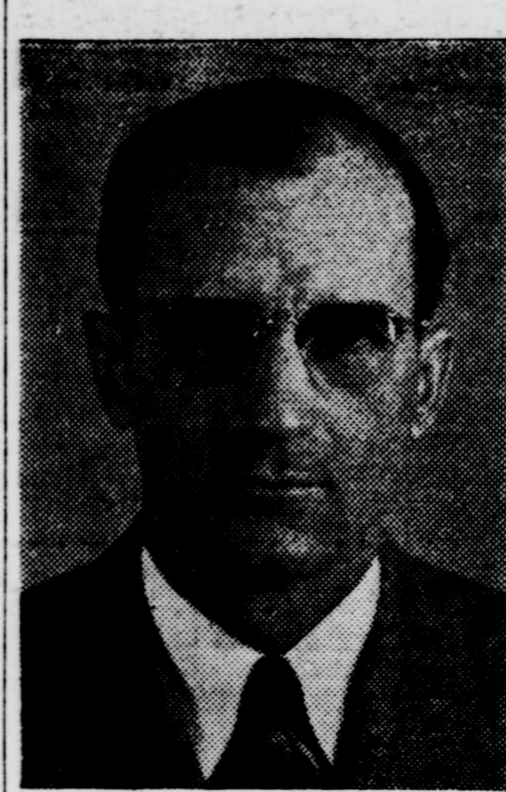

Spur Top Notchers In County Wide Base Ball

The Spur Baseball Club recently organized by a newcomer, has had a full opportunity to prove its mettle. The two first games of the season were played as a doubleheader on the home grounds. Spur at that time had just begun its playing season, winning the two games in order, 11 - 5 against Patton Springs, and 9 to 2 against Dickens. On their return, Spur defeated Patton Springs 29 to 5 and at Dickens, on Saturday afternoon, defeated that team 28 to 3 and we think favorable mention should go to all the players, but especially to the super pitching of Jo King, who held the Dickens boys to one hit, and that a fluke, being hit by a left hand hitter into short left field, just over third base, a position not usually covered under the general play of the great American sport. Jo King struck out 18 men, and when the bases became loaded by a hit batter, and two errors and fumbles, Jo tightened up, and struck out the two men to face him in order, there being one out before the bases were loaded. Slacks home run at Patton Springs, was the high light of the game in the slugging end of the feat. In the Dickens game Spur was out, Dave McAteer and Jake Commander, two heavy hitters, Jake Commander being the playing captain of the team. Showing that although playing under serious handicaps, they are in the game with all they have. The catching at Dickens of Slack, was superb work, since he is an outfielder and not accustomed to catching, but he turned in a good account of himself.

This serious question has presented itself. Many of the boys work during the week, and can only play evenings or on Sunday afternoon, and there are many who honestly believe it is not for the best to have Sunday Baseball. Few believe that the game of baseball is wrong within itself, but many who have been taught that it is wrong to play baseball on Sunday, feel that because of that teaching, it should be discouraged. Some of the ministers believe that it is not for the best interest of the boys themselves and that it tends to lead away from the attendance at church services. One of ministers believes and hopes that the contrary will be true, and that it will tend to lead the boys into Sunday School and Church services on Sunday mornings, and also on Sunday evenings.

There is only one way, certainly to know its influence, and that is by checking on the boys themselves. Perhaps if every boy, every boy, not one exception, but that every boy should be at Sunday school in one of the churches, register and become a class member, remain for the sermon, and then be in the services on Sunday evenings, thereby to prove to the mothers and fathers, teachers and ministers, that it has taught them that their first duty is to God, to attend services and discharge their duties in that obligation, then they have earned the right to improve their mental and physical faculties, having been obedient to the spiritual. Let every parent or guardian see to it that the boys are instructed that their duty is to attend Sunday school, every Sunday morning, and remain for the morning services, then have their liberty for the full afternoon again returning to their church services for the evening, and let it be understood that for their loyalty, fidelity and honor and integrity they will have won the privilege of the afternoon.

The man who has financed the boys up to this time a considerable outlay of cash believes that a thing that is wrong on Sunday is wrong any day. A thing that is right on Sunday is right every day. He is of the opinion that a Christian must be a Christian seven days a week. Yet, if in fact baseball will keep boys or girls from attendance at Sunday School and Church, then he will oppose it, but if, if it brings them to Sunday school and church, he will sponsor it.—Sports Reporter.

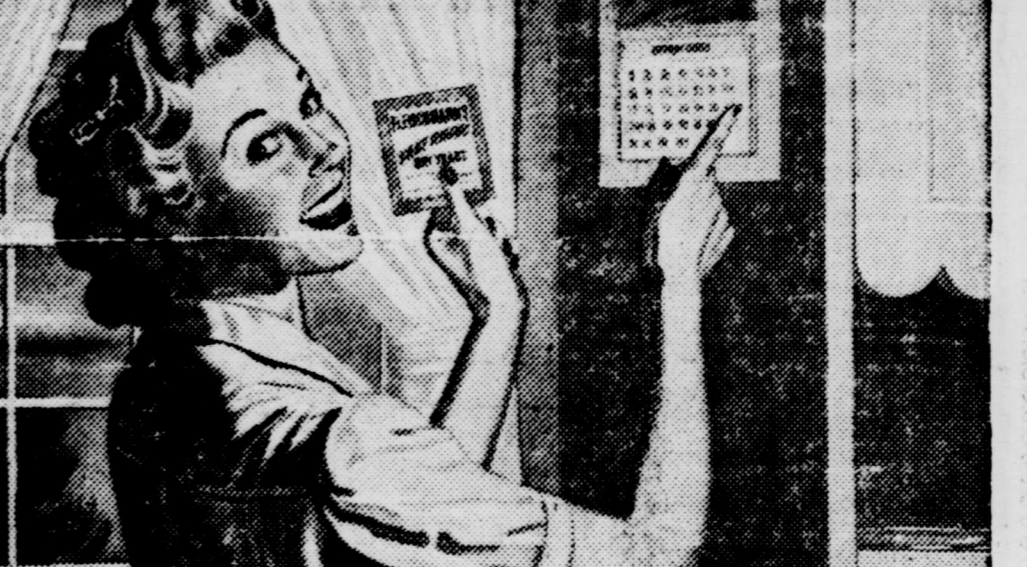

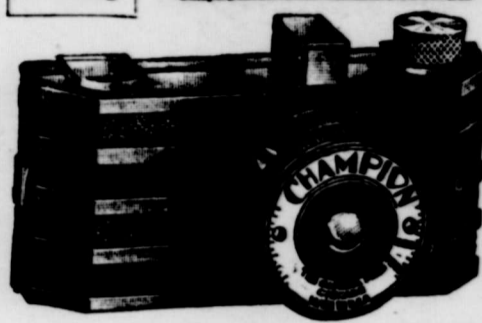

Guy goes on and tells many other things that happened during this short visit that are of much interest, but one particular thing which is characteristic to Representative Mahon, was the fact he called Guy early on Sunday morning and suggested they attend church together, this was immediately arranged, this association together with a long visit at the A P O was very much enjoyed Guy went on to state. So folks we just can't get away from our friends and acquaintances any more than we can get away from the all seeing eye "this is a small world after all".

We are proud to have Guy back in our town and at his same old window and also to have this report on our representative he is also at his post of duty regardless of the spot where he is standing, his foot prints are easily identified.

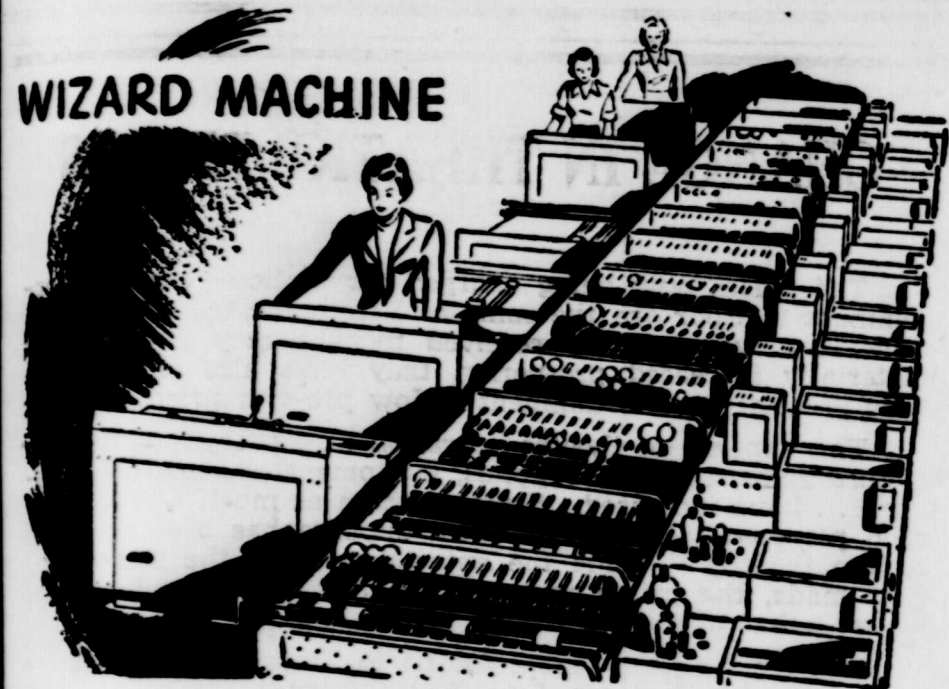

If Polio Strikes What Can We Do?

What can we do to prevent infantile paralysis? The answer is: Practically nothing!

Very little is known about the disease. We know the cause — a virus — but not the cure. We know that it is communicable. That many persons may harbor the virus without presenting any clinical symptoms of the disease.

Certain precautions, however, are recommended by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis. If Polio strikes, the Foundation urges, continue with normal activities. Schools, theatres and other places of congregation can remain open at the discretion of the health authorities, but unnecessary mingling with crowds should be avoided.

Extreme fatigue, sudden and prolonged chilling make the individual an easier victim. Swimming in polluted waters and removal of tonsils during epidemics should be avoided. Flies and other insects should be kept away from food. Sanitation is a "must".

The first symptom of poliomyelitis may be some minor discomfort: headache, unexplained fever, a cold, even an upset stomach. If any of these appear, a physician should be called immediately. Expert medical care may prevent crippling deformities.

Above all, the Foundation adds, don't worry about expense. Foundation chapters are pledged to see that no victim of infantile paralysis goes without care and treatment for lack of funds, regardless of age, race, creed or color.

When a case appears, be sure that the nearest Foundation chapter is notified.

SIDELIGHTS FROM WASHINGTON

By GEORGE MARON

This is Saturday afternoon. The president is scheduled to address a joint session of congress at four p.m. today.

The intolerable industrial strife and strikes of recent months are retarding production, producing inflation, and wrecking the economy of the nation.

A straightforward labor-management policy, which some of us have long advocated, would have avoided this tragic situation. Before Pearl Harbor, during the war, and since the war, the house of representatives has passed legislation designed to protect the public from disastrous strikes and labor-management trouble, and at the same time give labor and management a fair deal.

But the efforts of the house have been ineffective. Why? Because the U.S. senate has willfully failed and refused to take favorable action on what the house has done. In fairness it must be said that the Texas senators have not been parties to this inexcusable delay.

To be more specific: On June 7, 1940, the house passed a bill to revise the national labor relations act by a roll call vote of 258 to 129. It went to the senate committee on education and labor and died there. On December 3, 1931—four days before Pearl Harbor—the house again passed a bill for this purpose by a vote of 253 to 136. This bill also went to the senate committee on education and labor and died there. On February 7, 1946, the house again passed a bill which is commonly referred to as the Case bill. The bill passed the house by a vote of 258 to 155. It also went to the senate committee on education and labor and remained there until a few days ago. I am among those in the house who voted for each of these bills.

It is fervently hoped that those in the senate who have blocked appropriate legislation in the past will now, at long last, join in a program of action for the common good of our nation.

Three-Point Air Show At Lubbock June 23

The Lubbock Chapter of the National Aeronautics Association will sponsor a three-point air show at Lubbock municipal airport Sunday, June 23, beginning at 10:00 a. m.

The program will consist of a display of new models of private aircraft, a model airplane show and a flying exhibition by the Army Air Forces.

According to Virgil Musick, president of the Lubbock Chapter of the NAA, all private aircraft manufacturers have been requested to have at least one type plane of the 194 models here.

Rules for the model aircraft contest which features a \$25.00 prize will be announced later. The Army flying exhibition is scheduled for 2:00 p.m.

The Lubbock Chapter NAA is issuing invitations to all flyers in this section to fly into Lubbock that day for the show.

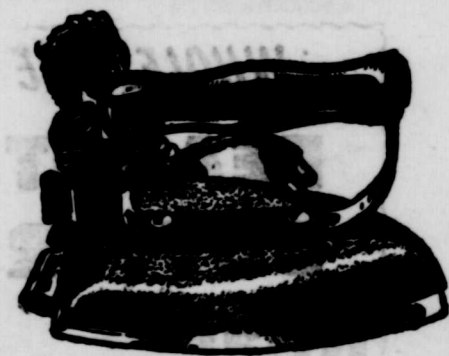

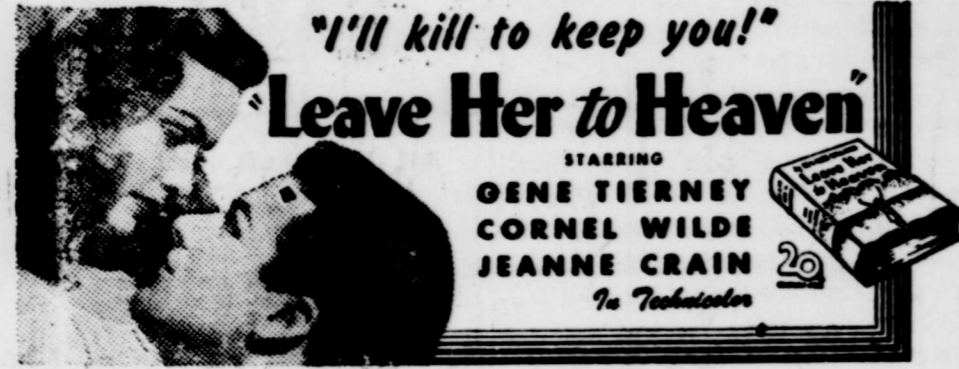

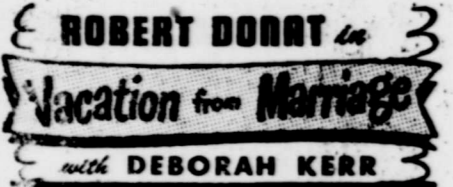
