Social Security Representative to Be In Spur June 13

John Palmer, manager of the Social Security Board in Lubbock will be in Spur at the U. S. Post Office at 9:00 a.m. on Thursday, June 13. He is in Spur one day each month for the purpose of answering any questions people may have on Social Security; discussing possible benefits and taking claims from persons who may be entitled to benefits and of taking applications for Social Security account number cards.

Most types of employment are covered under the old-age and of the Social Security Act. Workers in jobs in hotels, cafes, service stations, or in other commercial or industrial establishments are included by the system. Employment not covered by the old-age and survivors insurance system of the Social Security Act in general consist of farm labor; domestic service; government, city and state employment; work for an education, charitable, or a non-profit organization; certain types of professional work and services performed for a son, daughter, spouse or parent.

Generally speaking, covered employment is a job in a factory, shop, mine, mill, store office, garage, or bank.

Colonizing almost the whole civilized world with its tiny parachutists, our best known wild flowers, the lowly dandelion (*Taraxacum officinale*) stars, laws and waste places, interest children with its white gossamer balls of winged seeds and with its hollow stems, for bubble blowing and spiral curl making. The plant is an age old tonic and a medicine for dyspepsia and liver corn plant. Hecate entertained Theseus with salad of tender leaves, dented like lions teeth, they are eaten raw or cooked as greens. Lemon juice and black pepper add zest to dandelion sandwiches. Truck gardeners, cultivate dandelions for early spring greens, beekeepers for pollen and nectar. The flower heads are supported by upward growing green braces, in time the bright gold flower turns white and blows away.

Colonizing almost the whole civilized world with its tiny paracutis, our best known wild flowers, the lowly dandelion (*Taraxacum officinale*) stars, laws and waste places, interest children with its white gossamer balls of winged seeds and with its hollow stems, for bubble blowing and spiral curl making. The plant is an age old tonic and a medicine for dyspepsia and liver corn plant. Hecate entertained Theseus with salad of tender leaves, dented like lions teeth, they are eaten raw or cooked as greens. Lemon juice and black pepper add zest to dandelion sandwiches. Truck gardeners, cultivate dandelions for early spring greens, beekeepers for pollen and nectar. The flower heads are supported by upward growing green braces, in time the bright gold flower turns white and blows away.
