Programs Organized To Save Cotton From Insects

County-wide campaigns to save cotton from insects which threaten severe damage in the next few weeks are being organized in many Texas cotton-growing counties, and offer one of the best opportunities for preventing the annual loss of one-seventh of the cotton crops to pests, says L. E. Ellwood, chairman, Texas Cotton Production Committee.

"Organized programs, such as those many County Agents have undertaken, add to the effectiveness of insect control on each individual farm and to the total value of control efforts", the Committee pointed out. "Prompt action is essential, however, as supplies of insecticides are limited and the danger from insects increase daily."

In 1945, cotton insects are estimated by authorities to have destroyed 538,000 bales of lint cotton and 219,000 tons of cottonseed, in Texas alone. In addition to financial loss to growers, this presents heavy losses of cottonseed oil, cottonseed feeds products and other scarce and needed products of the cotton plants.

The Committee urged that cotton farmers, ginners, businessmen and others in each cotton community cooperate with their County Agricultural Agent in county-wide measures against boll weevils and other pests.

Four Spur Future Farmers Receive State Degree At Sweetwater

Four members of the Spur FFA Chapter passed the state committee, June 5-6-7, 1946 which met in Sweetwater, Texas.

The members applying for the degree are, Morris Denson Elmo Beadle, Haden Moore and Graden Bass.

To obtain the Lone Star Farmers Degree, these boys had to meet certain high qualifications, as set up in the National Constitution of the Future Farmers of America. Some of these qualifications are; the applicant must have satisfactorily completed two years of instructions in vocational agriculture and have an outstanding program in operation, be familiar with the provisions of state and National constitutions; be able to lead a group discussion; show outstanding leadership scholarship and cooperation, must have participated in outstanding school and community activities and must have earned by his own efforts at least \$250.

The applicant's total assets in livestock, crop, cash on deposits, farming equipment as a result of their supervised farming program in vocational agriculture for the past three years are Elmo Beadle - \$633.75; Morris Denson - \$522.70; Haden Moore - \$1462.28; Graden Bass - \$850.23.

Their labor income from the supervised farming program for the past three years are as follows: Elmo Beadle - \$615.01; Morris Denson - \$615.01; Haden Moore - \$744.16; Graden Bass - \$711.80.

These boys have worked hard to earn this deserving award, for only 2% of the state membership can qualify.

Clouds Fulfill Their Promises, Spur Is At Last Wet

Spur is at last wet, it seems that there is water everywhere. Tuesday night Spur received 1.58 inches of rain, while Calgary reported 1.17 inches, Post 2 inches and the fall at Red Mud was reported to be 3 inches or more. The Barron Ranch reported 3 inches, with Cotton Wood creek up 20 feet and Docum and Duck creeks overflowing all surrounding farms.

The Spur fire department was called out to remove families from the lowlands Tuesday night about 10 o'clock. Estimates have not yet been made on loss of property, crops or stock.

Two bridges in the Highway community were washed out and Vernon Powell reports a complete loss on his crops.

Damages will probably run quite high when estimates are made.

A bill was passed by the senate February 20, 1945, for a statewide Memorial plan to be taken by every county.

This plan gives every home and every citizen an opportunity that should be considered a privilege, that of planting a tree or shrub in their front yard as a gesture of respect and appreciation to our men and women in the armed forces.

This will be a living honor, as well as a memorial plan; it applies to those who will return as well as those who must live only in memory.

On Sunday, June 2, a poll was taken at every church throughout the county to determine what tree or shrub would be Dickens county's "Living Memorial", or dedication to our armed forces.

From the following trees and shrubs submitted, honeysuckle, evergreen; Crepe Myrtle; Pyracantha, evergreen; Japonica; Vitec, Redbud Bridal Wreath; Pomegranate; Silver Leaf Maple; Lombardy Poplar; Paradise and Chinese Elm, the Honeysuckle was chosen as the Dickens county shrub as our "Living Memorial".

Dickens County Men Visit King Ranch At Kingsville, Texas

Chas. A. Taylor, County Agent, Robert A. Butler, Supervisor Performance and Fred Arrington, Acting Secretary, Dickens County A. A. A. visited the King Ranch at Kingsville, Texas last week along with delegates from 22 other West Texas Counties.

This tour was sponsored by the State AAA Office that representatives from West Texas might study the pasture improvement program in operations in that area.

This group had the opportunity to observe cattle grazing on native pastures that were less than 50% calf crop while cattle on pastures treated with 20% superphosphate were producing a 95% calf crop and was grazing a third more cattle.

Spur Swimming Pool Will Not Be Open This Year

"We regret to announce that due to water conditions, the Spur swimming pool will not be open this year," was the statement made this week by James Cowan, city manager.

Spur has three water wells and all three are now pumping to capacity. The city of Spur is now using 400,000 gallons of water daily, 30 per cent more than during the same period last year.

It was first announced that the pool would be open June 7, with Coach O. C. Warden as manager, an announcement to that effect was made in the May 30 issue of The Texas Spur, but with an inadequate supply of water, it was decided that the pool would remain closed this year.

John Palmer In Spur Regarding Social Security Thursday

Thursday, John Palmer, manager of the Social Security Board in Lubbock, was in Spur for the purpose of assisting persons who had questions regarding to Social Security, or who wished to file a claim for Social Security benefits, or who needed Social Security account number cards.

Mr. Palmer stated that the law provides the old-age and survivors insurance benefits must be given up for any month in which the worker earns more than \$14.99 in covered employment, but benefits can be stopped and resumed as often as the worker moves in or out of covered jobs.

To prevent confusion and misunderstanding, the following cautions are issued.

1. Increased benefits, once a claim is filed, can result only from additional work in covered employment. Generally this additional employment must be at pay equal to or more the past average monthly wages.
2. Benefits will be recalculated only upon request. Is important therefore, that the beneficiary get in touch with the local Social Security field office whenever he quits working, whenever his total pay begins to go down as a result of reduced working hours, lower pay rates, lost time or for any other reason.

Mrs. Francis presented the honoree with a hostess gift, with strings attached at the end of each string, another gift was hidden.





Do You Hoard Old Medicine? For Safety Sake, Destroy It

There are many persons who naturally hoard anything and everything including old cloths, boxes and other useless articles some of which constitute no greater danger than a possible fire hazard, but a very real danger is present when this tendency is applied to hoarding old medicine in any form.

Most medicine finds itself into the home through a doctors prescribing it for some specific illness. For the sake of safety, left-over medicines should be destroyed immediately when they have fulfilled their purpose and never be stored in the medicine cabinet for future unprescribed use in case of another illness, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"Self-medication with the use of left-over drugs which were of great benefit to some previous illness can sometimes turn a simple ailment into a very serious condition of actual poisoning," Dr. Cox said. "This is particularly true of the indiscriminate use of sulfa drugs which have been prescribed for some previous specific condition."

"It is wise to use medicine as indicated for the illness for which they are prescribed by your doctor, and when they are no longer needed, destroy the remaining medicine immediately," Dr. Cox said. "Even if you expect a return of the same condition at some future date, it would be better to obtain new medicine if the condition recurs than retain this old medicine in the cabinet and subject the members of your family to the danger of using it unwisely."
