Add Pinch Ordinary Table Salt to Each Drink of Water

If your work is such that it causes excessive perspiration, add a pinch of ordinary table salt to each drink of water you take to help prevent heat cramps. This is advised by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, to prevent a possible increase in the number of heat victims as Texas thermometer hits 95% and above.

Laborers, Imechanics, farmers, and white collar workers whose work causes them to sweat prof usely, are in danger of having their body salt contents become deficient with resulting heat cramps or heat 'fag. Salt is a prominent constituant of sweat: the body may lose as high as 40 to 50 grams of salt during hot days.

In industry, a method of preventing heat cramps is to tawe a tablet of pure salt or a mixture of salt and dextrose with each drink of water. Workmen whose duties require muscular exertion should be especially lcareful to add more than the usual amount of salt to what they eat and drink. Salt deficiences may be prevented by taking salt in various ways. Where prepared tablets are not available, table salt may be added to each drink of water. Milk is a source of salt and will help to make up for the deficiency aused by sweating.



present do not mean much.

On Friday, June 21st. we are scheduled to present to the house the bill making appropriations for the fiscal year beginning July 1st. This will be the biggest bill presented to congress this year. We are providing funds for pay and equipment for a modern army and occupation force which will average about 1,250,000 men during the year. The sum recommended will be 7 billion dollars





Under the law, all appropriation bills for the regular agencies of the government must be passed prior to July 1st of each year, and the month of June is always a very busy month in congress.

During the week we passed by unanimous vote the bill providing terminal leave pay for enlisted men of our armed forces. The bill has now gone to the senate, where favorable action is expected. The bill is of interest to all enlisted men and their families.

Following the veto by the president of the so-called Case bill, involving labor-industry disputes, a vote was taken in the house on the question of whether the house would override the veto. A twothirds majority is required to override a presidential veto. The vote was 255 to 135 on the motion to override, which was 5 votes short of the necessary two-thirds. voted to override the veto.



Texas Cowboy Reunion, Inc. The Levelland Rodeo July 3, 4, 5


Levelland has taken on a colorful air this week in preparation for the July 3. 4, and 5 annual rodeo, with early reports pointing to record atendance for an outstanding show.


