Juarez Revolts!

In a sweeping political move to end all political moves, Dalton Johnson and Austin Bell, late of Spur, have renounced their claims to citizenship with the City of Spur and have come out as candidates for Mayor of Juarez. Their platform at the early stage of this involved issue, was a far-reaching scheme to incorporate the Juarez district into a separate City of Juarez.

While such a revolutionary platform should be enough to launch a heated political fight the "Fighting Butcher", Austin Bell, is making things even tougher on Candidate Johnson by running on the "Free Coffee Ticket", whose adherents have long advocated local subsidy of coffee. Such a plan put into effect, would throw the burden of payment for coffee consumed outside of regular meal hours directly on the taxpayers. As the plan seems to be it is said to have considerable following, particularly among the purveyors of this popular beverage.

The current Mayor, Tom Cooper could not be reached for a statement but was rumored to be prepared to throw his considerable influence behind Candidate Bell.

Dalton Johnson roled up his sleeves with the statement that any move made by the local City Government that seemed designed to forestall the plans for a new City of Juarez would be met with strong action. "The City of Juarez," stated Johnson, "is an actual fact. All we need do is make it a political one. The line from Gilcrease's to the east is our main line of resistance and will be defended by force if necessary."

Johnson is running on the Conservative "Pay for Your own Coffee" ticket designed to keep the old tradition of buying (or mooching) a cuppa coffee alive and expects considerable support from the old line conservatives.

When asked what he thought of Johnson's chances, Mr. Bell gave a hint as to his strategy. Said Mr. Bell, "If I can't beat 'em, I always throw in with 'em."

And so the first round is open. It is thought that it should get better rapidly.

Terraces Pay \$12 Per Acre This Year

A good rain on terraced land on E. F. Shugart's farm east of Spur last September was worth \$12 per acre in returns from a wheat crop just harvested. This, according to County Agent Chas. Taylor, is how Mr. Shugart figures that rain was the deciding factor: With well established terraces that had been on the place some twenty years, he was able to hold all the water on the field until it had penetrated the soil. On nearby fields not terraced, the water quickly ran off and did not penetrate very deep into the soil. This spring Mr. Shugart noticed that for about seventy feet above each terrace the wheat was doing good, while the area immediately below the terrace where no water stood last September, the wheat was in very poor shape. Upon examining the soil in these areas with a post hole digger Mr. Shugart found sufficient moisture in the soil below 12 inches where the wheat was growing well, but failed to find much moisture in the other areas of the field where the wheat was making little growth.

At harvest which really was the final test, the seventy foot strip in front of the terraces was estimated to yield 15 bushels per acre, while the area below each terrace down to the better strips, the yield was estimated at 3 bushels per acre.

Mr. Shugart reports an average yield of 10 bushels on the entire 460 acres, and as he states the situation, "Those terraces made me 7 bushels of wheat on this farm this year as I don't believe I would have made over 3 had it not been terraced."

Mr. Shugart and his father, W. F. Shugart, built some of the first terraces in Dickens county, most of which are still on the land.

The recent rains afforded farmers of the Duck Creek Soil Conservation District a wonderful opportunity for storing a good underground supply of moisture. Cooperators with official rain gauges have reported from 3 to 5 inches of rain. Hackberry Draw ran water into Duckum Creek for the first time in over a year. The lakes on the plains tell a story of water conservation. Lakes surrounded with terraced and contoured fields have very little or no water in them while those that were surrounded with un-terraced fields were full.

Elmer Shugart is assured, as far as moisture is concerned, of another good crop on his farm in the East Luck Creek Conservation group. He has prepared his place to take care of outside water and has encouraged this water to come in on his field. Shugart did not wait for opportunity to answer on his door. He left it open and an estimated \$4,000 rain entered. The same thing occurred last

year and he harvested a bumper grain crop.

Jay Austin in the Hackberry group received more outside water than he bargained for but he still maintains that conversation means money to him, and he is going to repair the damage done to his terrace system.

Thanks to the conservation work done by R. E. Dickson, M. L. Rickels, J. C. Payne and others, very little water reached Nigger Lake as a result of this rain. In contrast, sand was observed blowing within three hours following this rain. This occurred within one-half mile of Duckum Creek on a farm that was being farmed with the slope.

Anything we can do to make the water walk instead of run off our farms and ranches will not only save our land for posterity but will mean dollars to us by increasing our yield and preventing our fields, roads and bridges from washing away.

The scholastic population of the county for last year was 1927 which shows the scholastic population to have decreased 46.

The largest decrease was in the Patton Springs school district which has 64 scholastics less than last year. The scholastic population for the Spur independent school district shows an increase of 87 scholastics over 1945 enumeration. McAdoo shows a decrease of 23 scholastics. Dickens shows a decrease of 12 scholastics. Dry Lake No. 7 has a decrease of 10 scholastics.

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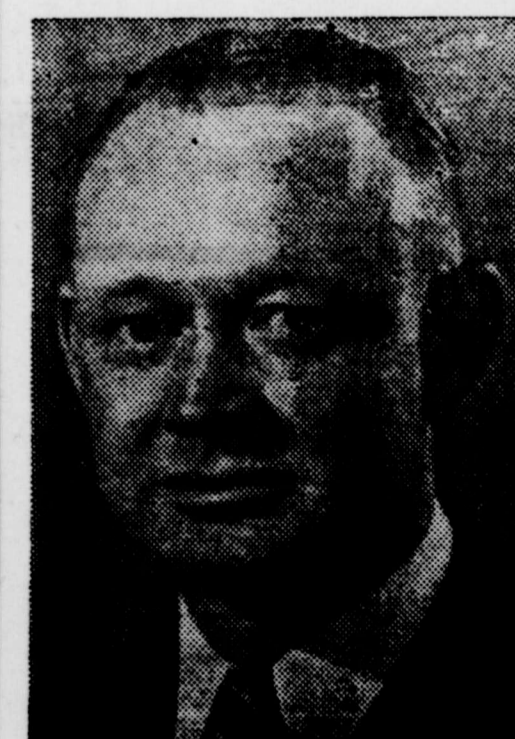

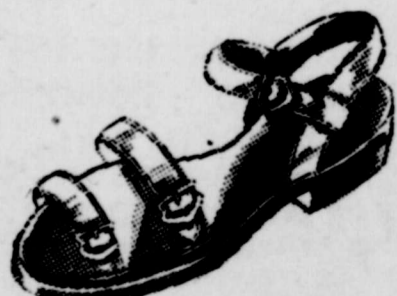

Eleven million of the \$200,000,000 the state now receives annually from taxes should "immediately be ear-marked for adequate farm-to-market roads," Jo Ed Winfree, Harris county legislator, said here today while in the Texas Spur office in behalf of his candidacy for lieutenant governor.

"Texas could well afford to spend \$120,000,000 for educational expansion, old-age and other assistance and farm-to-market roads," Mr. Winfree asserted. "I can not understand why this money is being hoarded while thousands of our good people are actually suffering."

Mr. Winfree said that \$50,000,000 should be made available for educational expansion, \$35,000,000 to help the old folks, needy children and blind persons, and \$35,000,000 for highway work throughout the state, of which amount one-third should be set aside for farm-to-market roads.

Mr. Winfree spoke in Wichita Falls Tuesday night in behalf of his candidacy for lieutenant governor and was on his way to Lubbock, where he spoke Wednesday night.

On Tour With The McGintys and Lees

Mimms, Mr. Mimms, an employee in the Department of Agriculture, is a nephew of Mr. Lee. During their visit in Washington, they did much the same that others do, visiting the Nation's Capitol. They saw Mt. New York City, next claimed the attention of this group. There they visited the Chase National Bank, Wall Street, and Rockefeller Center. They took a sight-seeing tour of the city, including the harbors and slums. They saw three stage plays, including one starring Alfred Lunt and Lynn Fontaine. This group did not miss the rides on the subway and the meals at an automat.

The drive up the Hudson from the city was another interesting experience. They made a Sunday afternoon tour of the Roosevelt Estate at Hyde Park, seeing the modern stone Library building that houses in addition to the library, the Roosevelt trophies, gifts, paintings and souvenirs. They visited the grave of the late president in the rose garden of the estate and were conducted through the historic Roosevelt mansion, in which the president was born and where he lived until death.

After a brief tour of the state Captiol grounds at Albany, they turned west toward Niagara Falls. Here they crossed into Canada and began their homeward trip. The drive for some time was by the lakeshore, it was cold. A great amount of manufacturing is carried on.

As announcer for the show, officials have again called upon E. O. (Red) Wedgeworth, Manager of the pampa Chamber of Commerce, who handled the job last year. His assistant will be C. R. (Cow Taylor).

Add Pinch Ordinary Table Salt to Each Drink of Water

If your work is such that it causes excessive perspiration, add a pinch of ordinary table salt to each drink of water you take to help prevent heat cramps. This is advised by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, to prevent a possible increase in the number of heat victims as Texas thermometer hits 95% and above.

Laborers, mechanics, farmers, and white collar workers whose work causes them to sweat profusely, are in danger of having their body salt contents become deficient with resulting heat cramps or heat 'tag. Salt is a prominent constituent of sweat; the body may lose as high as 40 to 50 grams of salt during hot days.

In industry, a method of preventing heat cramps is to tawe a tablet of pure salt or a mixture of salt and dextrose with each drink of water. Workmen whose duties require muscular exertion should be especially careful to add more than the usual amount of salt to what they eat and drink.

Salt deficiencies may be prevented by taking salt in various ways. Where prepared tablets are not available, table salt may be added to each drink of water. Milk is a source of salt and will help to make up for the deficiency caused by sweating.

Heat cramp is characterized by pains (cramps) in the abdominal region, headache, and in severe cases, by nausea and vomiting. The body temperature remains

Some Timely Advice To Vacationists

Some timely advice to vacationists concerning the proper sports during summer months precautions to be used in water was released from the State Health Department today by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health officer.

It was pointed out that in view of prevailing travel difficulties, vacation pleasures are apt to be limited to excursion and picnics at nearby lakes, rivers and ponds of unfamiliar depths and currents, and without the usual life-guard supervision associated with bathing beaches and commercial swimming pools.

"Swimming and water sports are beneficial to good health provided one's physical condition justifies this type of exercise," Dr. Cox asserted, nevertheless, they possess dangerous possibilities if the rules of safety, through are disregarded.

The State Health Officer outlined the following simple rules for bathing and swimming in safety: when swimming, be alert and careful of unknown depths and currents; at least one hour should elapse after a meal before entering the water; upon the first indication of fatigue, come ashore and call it a day. If you become chilled, leave the water immedi-

"Excursions, picnics, and swimming parties contribute much to a healthy, happy, normal life, which is always desirable," Dr. Cox said. "It is by no means advisable to eliminate these excursions from our summer program, but it is important that they prove beneficial and not disastrous."

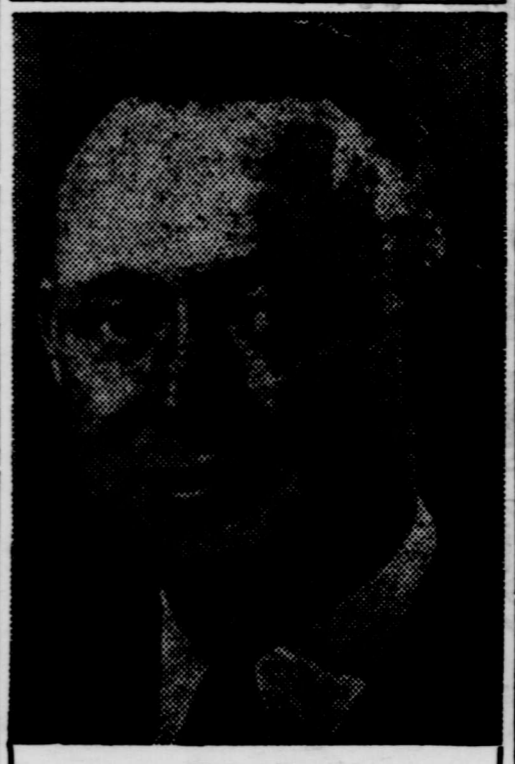

SIDELIGHTS FROM WASHINGTON

By GEORGE MAHON

(Held Over From Last Week)

This column is being written on Saturday afternoon, June 15th. There is much uncertainty as to just when congress will recess or adjourn. The best guess seems to be that congress will recess about July 15th for a period of three months. Such a recess would be very much in order, as congress has been in session all or a part of practically every month since the war began more than four years ago.

On Thursday of this week I was able to secure passage in the house of my bill involving appropriations and programs for all government owned corporations—40 in number. Under the bill the commodity credit corporation will have sufficient funds to carry on the support price and loan programs on cotton and wheat and other basic crops. Parity prices fixed by the department of agriculture, unfortunately, do not take into consideration all labor costs, but the approval of the commodity credit program will prevent the possibility of a collapse in the price of cotton, grain and other important crops for at least a two-year period. This is the most hopeful thing on the horizon for West Texas farmers. But on account of the continued drought, price guarantees for the present do not mean much.

On Friday, June 21st, we are scheduled to present to the house the bill making appropriations for the fiscal year beginning July 1st. This will be the biggest bill presented to congress this year. We are providing funds for pay and equipment for a modern army and occupation force which will average about 1,250,000 men during the year. The sum recommended will be 7 billion dollars—a huge sum—but we have proceeded on the basis that the American people believe in a strong national defense program and are willing to pay whatever may be necessary.

Under the law, all appropriation bills for the regular agencies of the government must be passed prior to July 1st of each year, and the month of June is always a very busy month in congress.

During the week we passed by unanimous vote the bill providing terminal leave pay for enlisted men of our armed forces. The bill has now gone to the senate, where favorable action is expected. The bill is of interest to all enlisted men and their families.

Following the veto by the president of the so-called Case bill, involving labor-industry disputes, a vote was taken in the house on the question of whether the house would override the veto. A two-thirds majority is required to override a presidential veto. The vote was 255 to 135 on the motion to override, which was 5 votes short of the necessary two-thirds. I voted to override the veto.

In the death of Senator John Bankhead of Alabama, the farmers of America have lost a true and powerful friend. The farmers of the nation did not always agree with Senator Bankhead, but they never questioned his loyalty to the cause of agriculture. In the post-war years our agricultural producers will be confronted with problems varied and difficult, and we will need the best possible leadership.

Prior to the death of the late senator, the state of Alabama has kept a Bankhead in congress for 60 consecutive years.
