Spur Swelters In 107 Degree Temperature Sunday

Temperatures were slightly lower Tuesday and Wednesday, as compared with recent days, however, the humidity made the weather most uncomfortable.

Spur sweltered in a temperature of 107 degrees Sunday, July 14, recorded at the Spur Experiment Station. Monday registered 105 degrees, dropping to 101 degrees on Tuesday.

Even though the temperature has been quite high, it still has not hit the record of 113 degrees recorded last year on June 27.

VFW Told Former POW's To Get Consideration

Former prisoners of war are assured special consideration of their compensation claims as the result of efforts in their behalf by the Veterans of Foreign Wars, Vice Commander Clinton Sonnemaker of Post 7212, Spur, stated this week.

This assurance was given by Gen. Omar N. Bradley, Administrator of Veteran Affairs, Vice Comdr. Sonnemaker said in response to a request from the V.F.W.

Many injustices to former prisoners of war were found by V.F.W. Rehabilitation officers, especially in those cases where veterans after their discharge from service, developed ailments and diseases as the result of their camp experiences.

"Before releasing these men, the Army fattened them up on high calorie diets so that they appeared healthy, but since that time reactions have occurred in many cases", V. Comdr. Sonnemaker declared.

"Now they are having difficulty in proving their disabilities are due to the starvation and bad treatment they suffered in prison."

The V.F.W. also protested because enlisted men have not been permitted to collect payment for food or other allowances for the time spent in prison. An appeal was made to the V.A. after the Army and Navy declined to give consideration to the claims of these men, according to V. Comdr. Sonnemaker.

"Those veterans who suffered starvation in the prisoner of war camps are entitled to the utmost in sympathetic consideration," Bradley declared in his answer to the V.F.W.

"I shall be very glad to issue any needed instructions to insure the proper and equitable adjudication of this group of cases."

At General Bradley's request, the V.F.W. Rehabilitation Service is collecting full facts for the V.A. in each case in which the claims of former prisoners of war become entangled in a mass of red tape. This work is now being done by Regional Field Directors, Department Service Officers and National Claims Officers of the V.F.W.

"The group of cases in question will receive careful consideration," the Veterans Administration promised.

Veterans Invited To Attend Sale of Surplus Vehicles

Charles A. McClure, Elbert W. Garner and George S. Link, Jr., of Spur are all veterans of World War II, have been invited by the War Assets Administration regional office in Fort Worth to attend a sale of surplus used motor vehicles to be held at the Childress Army Air Base, Tuesday, July 23rd.

McClure of the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company was certified last March, to purchase a 1/2 carryall; also Garner, Box 693, likewise was certified last March to purchase a 1/2 ton weapon carrier. Both McClure and Garner are named as principals and Link as an alternate to attend the sale at which 8 carryall trucks, 4 pickup trucks, 19 weapon carriers and a platform truck are being offered for sale exclusively to eligible certified veterans.

Letters of invitation have been sent to a list of other principals and alternates for each type of vehicle and inspection of the vehicles may be made daily between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. with the exception of Saturday and Sunday.

All used vehicles are offered veterans at fixed prices, dependent upon conditions, and all sales are on a cash basis. WAA officials stressed that no veteran should plan to attend the sale unless he had received a letter of invitation, since the oldest dated certificate holder who have been invited will be sold in strict chronological order of dated certification.

Reception Center for Migratory Labor

We are entering the final stages of construction of a reception center or labor camp in Dickens County in order to attract more labor to this area during harvest, according to Chas. Taylor, County Agent.

In spite of adverse weather conditions Dickens County has enough cotton left that additional labor will be needed at harvest time. Several counties built these camps last year and with more going up this year a group of business men and farmers of this county felt it necessary to do something here that labor might not just pass on by as they do in some areas where no accommodations are provided.

To date a camp site has been purchased on the cut off road east of the business section of Spur by a committee selected from a group of interested businessmen and farmers. The city of Spur has agreed to see that lights and water will be provided at the camp site. The next step of the places are to construct a shed type building, provide shower baths, toilet facilities and the like.

These reception centers afford migratory labor a stopping place until they can be placed on some farm. In addition the camp protects these laborers from adverse weather upon arrival, affords an opportunity for better health and sanitary conditions among the laborers and the community.

Placements on farms can be made at the camp site as we plan to have someone employed to take orders for pickers and route them to the areas where needed. This center will serve the entire county and may be used by all migratory labor as a gathering place prior to placement.

Service-Connection For Malaria-Chronic Tropical Diseases

It has been determined that hundreds of veterans who served in the South Pacific and other tropical regions during the recent war that many of them are affected with malaria or other tropical diseases.

Since these diseases are so prevalent among returned service men the Veterans Administration has released information concerning service-connection of these diseases. Follow is information quoted in parts.

In the case of veterans who had service in the tropics, service-connection for malaria or other tropical diseases may be granted where:

1. A record is available of the presence of the disease in service.
2. Such disease is shown by proper diagnosis made within one year from date of separation from active service without evidence of inception prior to or subsequent to service.
3. A record was made at time of discharge of a history of the disease in service, provided it is not shown to have had its inception prior to or subsequent to service; and provided a claim is filed within one year after date of discharge.

To warrant a rating on malaria in excess of 10 per cent, the veteran's statement must be supplemented by other evidence of the frequency of relapses or recurrent attacks. A statement from the veteran's physician, on his professional letterhead, showing date of examination and treatment, physical and clinical findings and diagnosis given, would be good evidence. If no physician was used, a statement from the druggist who dispensed the medicine, showing date and nature of drug sold and any facts that the druggist may have that would lead him to believe that the veteran was suffering from such disease, may be used as evidence. Lay evidence is acceptable to establish the frequency of malaria recurrences, if given within the first year after discharge.

It is suggested that every veteran who is not service-connected on malaria, but who feels that he should be service connected, file his claim, together with such evidence as he may have of the presence of the disease, with the American Legion Post or the County Service Officer in his vicinity within the first year after date of discharge.

Dan McRae Assumes Duties At Patton Springs School



Dan McRae, who has assumed his duties as superintendent of the Patton Springs consolidated schools, brings 19 years of experience in the profession to his new position.

Eleven of the years in teaching and administration were in schools in the Big Spring area. McRae taught in northern Glasscock county, then to Elbow in southern Howard county and for the past five years has served as superintendent for Forsan, one of the largest rural schools in Howard county.

He holds bachelor and masters of arts degrees from Austin College at Sherman and has done work toward his PhD degree.

During his administration at Forsan an industrial shop was inaugurated despite war difficulties, and a complete commercial department was installed. McRae active in community affairs, was president and treasurer of an organization which raised funds and erected an athletic plant for softball and football. The plant has facilities for night games.

Four members of his Forsan staff will be on the faculty at Patton Springs. They are Bessie James, commercial teacher, Camilla Hoisager, social science teacher, Iris Dunlap, English instructor, and Bess Corbell, first grade teacher.

During the last year McRae was at Forsan, the district was consolidated with the Chalk district, culminating a step that had been attempted half a dozen times.

The past few years they have not been able to do the things to our school that will make it a better place for our children to attend. Many improvement are necessary to give our teachers a better chance to better instruction. Our school yards needs are very noticeable the buildings need repair, equipment is needed in our classrooms.

Cecil Godfrey who was program chairman, introduced Oscar McGinty, who gave a most interesting report on Rotary International Convention at Atlantic City, which he attended recently.

Attending the National Convention with Mr. McGinty was, E. S. Lee accompanied by their Rotary Anns. Mr. McGinty gave a detail description of their trip up there and back and also of the convention proper. They arrived at the Convention Hall the first day, just an hour late. Due to the change of time, they had neglected to reset their watches.

Mr. McGinty spoke at two committee meetings and stated that the Spur Rotary club is not only nationally known, as it has been for sometime, but is now internationally known as the "Sack Lunch Club".

Support of the United Nations Organization was the theme of Rotary International Convention, when Rotarians met from 46 Nations. This being their first peace time convention in five years. A most inspiring talk was given at the convention by Rotary official from Czechoslovakia, who was a prisoner in a Nazi Concentration camp for four years. Dr. Chengting T. Wang, former Ambassador to the United States also appeared on the program. Among other famous personages on the program were, Harold Stassen, Miliza Korjus, Quentin Reynolds, Allen Jones, Phil Spitalny's "Hour of Charm" girls, and Albert Spaulding, Violinist.

900 delegates registered from foreign Nations and some 15,000 delegates from all parts of the country. The new president is Richard C. Hedke of Detroit, Mich. who succeed T. A. Warren of Wolverhampton, England. Warren was a visitor in Lubbock several months ago.

Clinton P. Anderson, secretary of Agriculture, told Rotarians that while all the essentials for achieving "Freedom from Want" is present in the world today, "fully two-thirds of the earth's population haven't the facilities or the technique for producing enough to eat or wear."

This was a most interesting convention all the way through and one that was most historical.

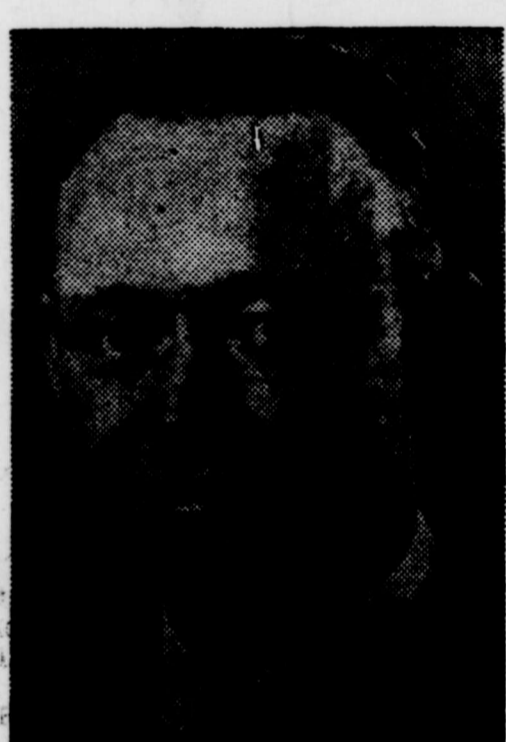

**Cleanliness And
Personal Hygiene
Important Issue**

In addition to the general instructions for community sanitation which are important in preventing poliomyelitis, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, today issued an urgent warning to every individual in Texas to practice strict personal hygiene to protect his own health and that of those about him.

"Of course, cleanliness and personal hygiene are ordinarily taken for granted," Dr. Cox said, "but at this time with the incidence of poliomyelitis having reached a total of 292 cases, I would like to re-emphasize some personal sanitary measures which may help in preventing the spread of this crippling and often fatal disease."

The State Health Officer stressed the importance of scrupulous cleanliness of the person. Frequent bathing and immaculately clean clothing are vitally necessary. Oral hygiene with thorough

brushing of the teeth and the use of a mild antiseptic are recommended. The nasal passage should be kept clean and dental defects corrected immediately.

Sanitation and thorough cleanliness in the home are instinctive with the average housewife, but at this time their importance to health must be re-emphasized. Home sanitation includes those taken-for-granted measures such as washing the dishes in hot water and rinsing them in hot clear water; keeping sinks, bathtubs, and fixtures scoured clean and rinsed with a mild antiseptic solution; sunning and airing bed clothes, ridding the home of flies, rats and roaches which, since poliomyelitis is believed to be a filth-borne disease, are suspected as being responsible for transmission.

"If good personal hygiene combined with good community sanitation and hygiene, it is hard for any disease to get a foothold," Dr. Cox said, "With such a dread disease as poliomyelitis prevalent in the state, no precaution should be overlooked and no bars should be let down for its entrance."

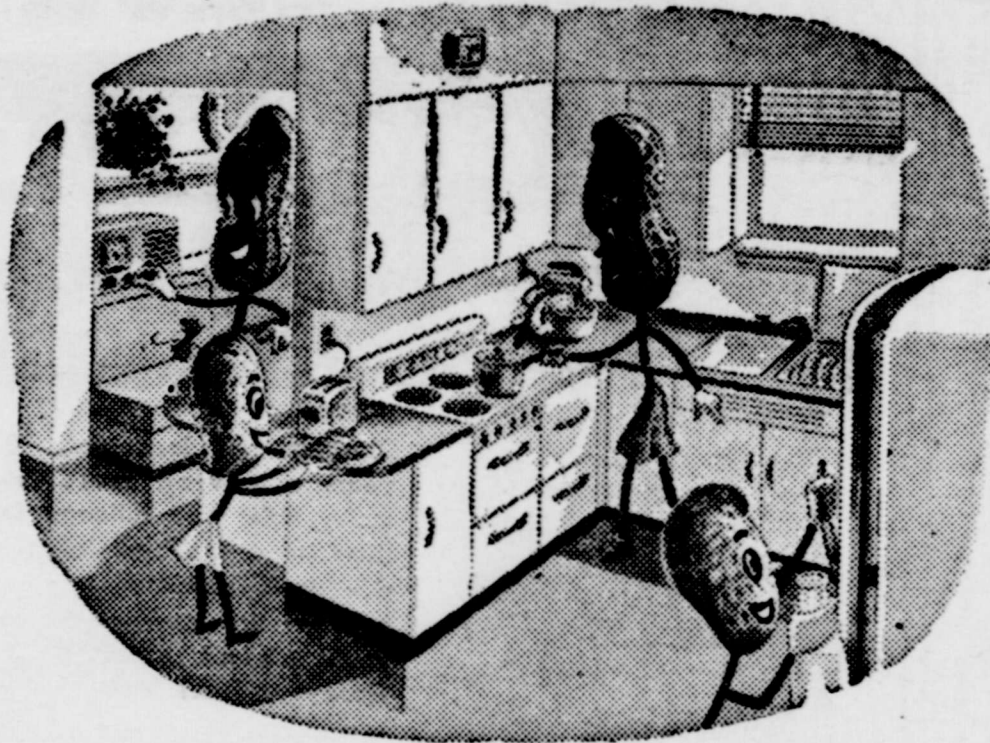

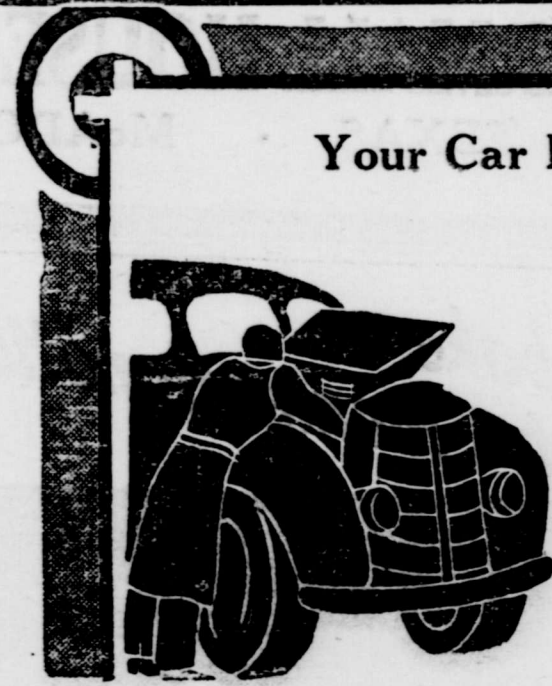

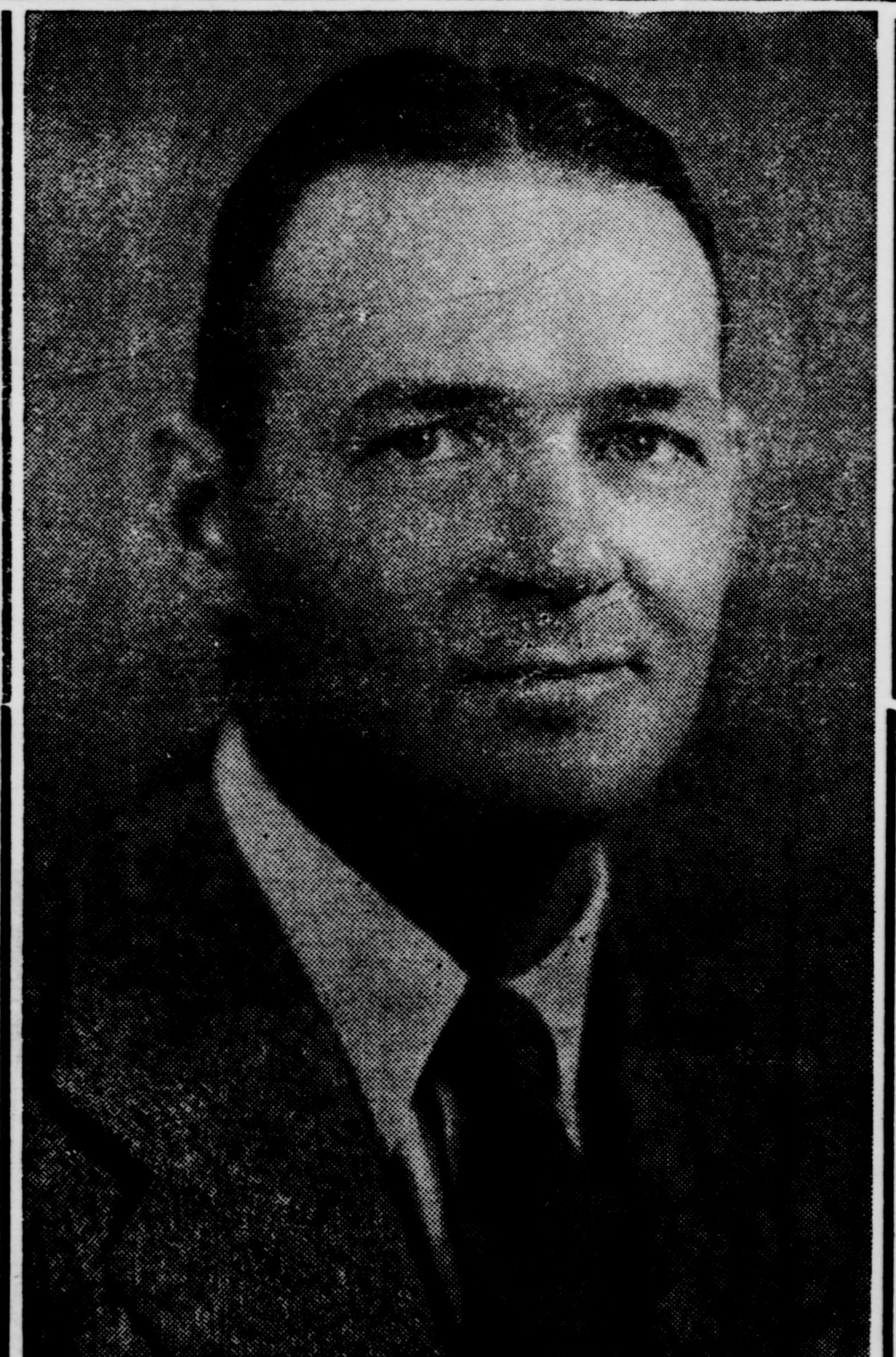

60 Different Skills Offered In V. A. Education Training

Approximately 8,000 Texas war veterans, training in peacetime skills in county-sponsored vocational schools, will be benefited by the contract between the Veterans Administration and the State Board for Vocational Education, to become effective July 1.

Under the contract terms, the administration of some 75 approved county vocational schools will be centered with the State Vocational Board, with the VA retaining supervision of veterans enrolled in the schools.

By this agreement more facilities for training veterans in agriculture, business, trade and industry will be provided. Centralization of administration control with the state is expected to raise and make uniform the standards of the county schools and to speed up VA tuition payments to schools.

The VA is to pay \$29 per veteran per month, all but \$4 of which is to be channeled to the particular school involved. The State Board will retain the \$4 to pay additional administrative costs imposed by the contract, but this cost is expected to decrease sharply when the program is a few months old.

By September 1 the VA predicts the number of county-sponsored vocational schools will increase to 100, eventually growing to 150 with an average enrollment of 100 veterans. It was emphasized by the Dallas branch directors of vocational rehabilitation and education that "schools will be set up when and where they're needed."

Veterans enrolled in agricultural training must devote at least 36 hours a week to their programs and a minimum of 200 hours per year in classroom instruction, the course of training taking three years to complete. Men in trade and industrial training must spend a minimum of 30½ hours a week in training. Classroom instruction is allotted 12½ hours weekly, and the veteran must spend not less than 18 hours weekly working on the job under supervision of the school coordinator. Veterans enrolled for business training in county vocational schools will also be trained by a plan calling for classroom instruction in addition to actual on-the-job activities.

The trainee-farmer will study in actual farming operations as well as in the classroom-farm management, farm shop, crops, soil, science, home gardens and orchards, food preservation, homestead beautification, agricultural and arithmetic and farm for-

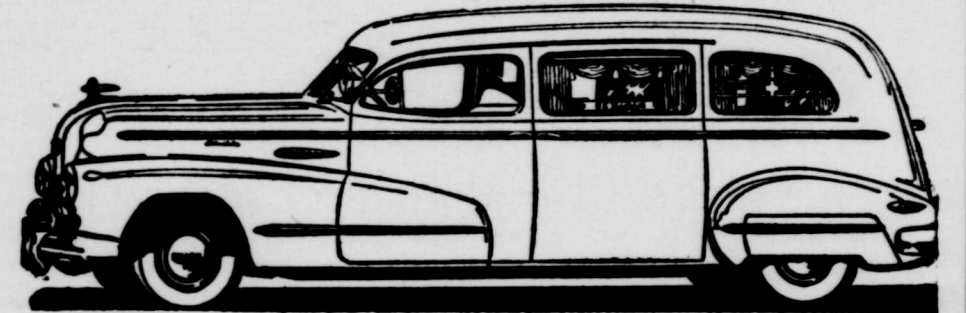

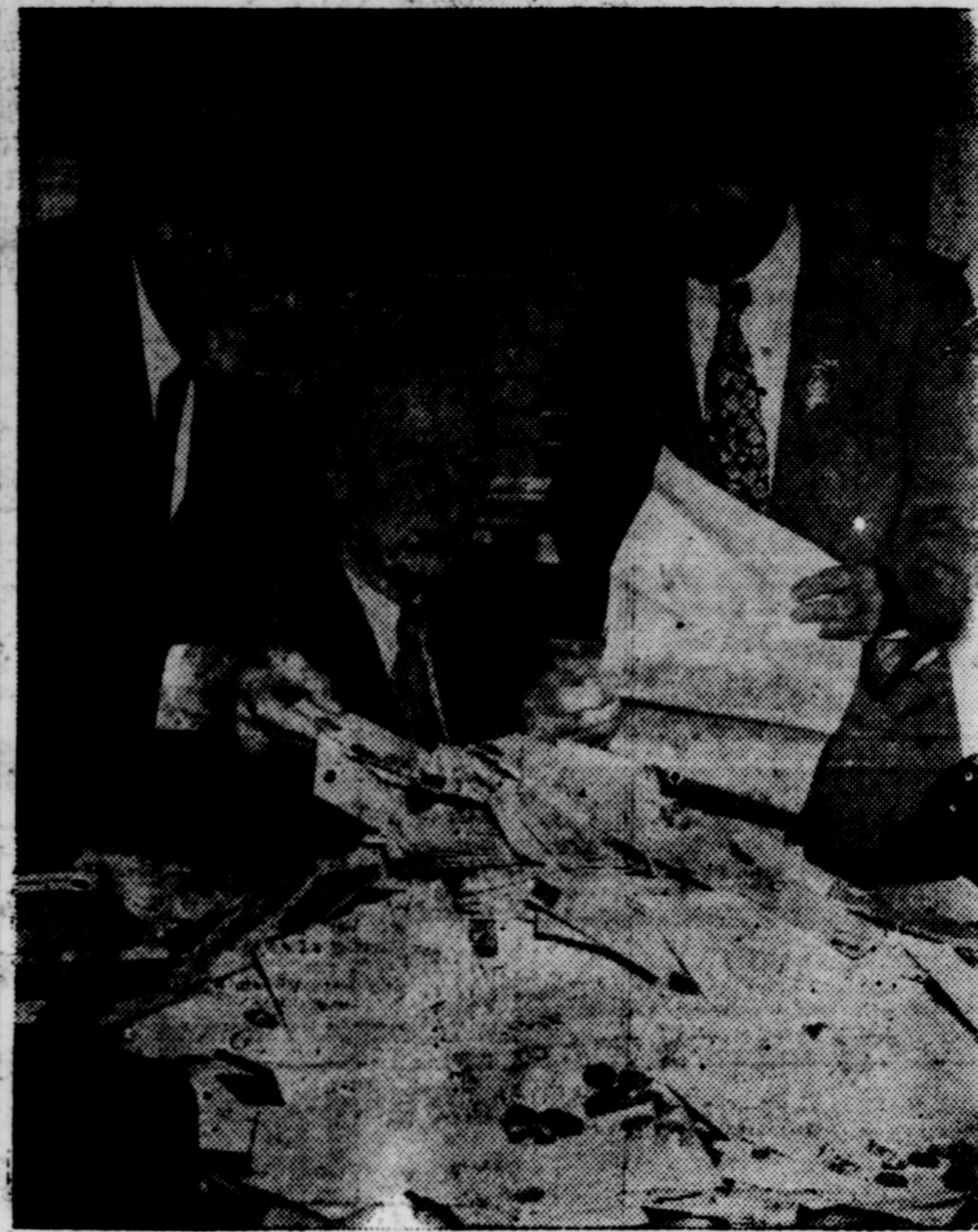

The May issue of Farm and Ranch has this to say about "Soils and Souls Sunday."

"Sunday, July 21, is set apart as Soils and Souls Sunday when pastors of most denominations are planning to devote a service to Stewardship of the Soils.
