Dickens School Opens With Full Staff 500 Attend Opening Exercises

The Dickens school opened Monday morning, September 9, with a brief assembly program, which was directed informally for approximately 500 pupils and patrons.

Supt. Jack Wester made an urgent appeal for pride in the school and co-operation, to make it secure and efficient. He declared that the small school of the country stands as surety for the preservation of fundamentals and that the leaders of tomorrow are today enrolling in the American school called small.

After the program the remainder of the morning was taken in enrolling the pupils.

Roaring Spgs. Shows Gratitude To Spur Fire Department

Last week the Spur Fire Department received a check for \$25.00 from the Roaring Springs School Board, in appreciation for their splendid help in fighting the blaze when the Roaring Springs grade school burned in the early part of May.

The Spur Fire Department, to be commended on their fast run of 31 miles in 27 minutes, prevented spread of the flames to the nearby High school structure, however the fire had made such headway before discovery of the flames that not much could be done to save the grade school building.

The loss, estimated to be \$45,000, was partially covered by insurance.

Forms Available For Legless Veterans Cars

Forms are now available for veterans who suffered the loss or use of a leg in World War II to make application for automobiles at government expense, R. A. Conner of Spur, American Legion Service officer announced this week.

Forms have been supplied to all contact offices in this district and trained contact representatives are available to assist veterans in making their requests. The veteran is requested to take his completed form to the dealer and negotiate for purchase of a car up to a maximum of \$1,600.

After the firm has been completed, it is mailed to the regional VA office having custody of his compensation file, where an entry is made of the veteran's disability. The form will then be returned to the applicant, who will take it with his driver's license to the local licensing agency. If his license satisfies requirements of the state motor vehicle law, that fact will be entered on his application form in addition to other necessary information, such as special driving attachments required by state law.

Conner pointed out that the total purchase price can not exceed \$1,600 including special attachments and tax. The veteran cannot buy a more expensive car and pay the difference between the purchase price and the VA \$1,600 limitation, he said.

Quail Season To Be Closed In Motley Co.

Ranchers and members of the Motley county Game Management Association met recently and voted 41-1 in favor of closing the Quail season in Motley county.

This action will be referred to the executive committee of the group who will refer the matter to the State Legislature.

Only a special session of the legislature can make the proposal effective this year, as the Quail season begins on December 1 and closes January 16. Otherwise the season will not be closed until 1947.

Proponents of the closing of the season were land owners who reported that the shortage of Quail was greater this year than it had ever been, but not all land owners held this opinion.

At the meeting recently, A. S. Jackson, biologist for the state game commission of Austin, told the group that Motley county had the best game organization in the state and that several other counties were basing their game units on the one in Motley county. I am sure in love.

Joe M. Rose Cautions Farmers

Mr. Joe M. Rose, Chairman of the County A. C. A. Committee, wishes to caution Dickens County farmers about securing prior approval if they expect to earn payment this fall for leaving sorghum stalks on land as protection against wind erosion.

According to Mr. Rose, this payment cannot be earned on land which has already earned a payment for contour farming, but on other land, this practice will qualify provided a ten-inch growth of stalks is left on the land, and not grazed, until March 1 next year. Prior approval should be secured at once, if payment is to be earned.

Billy Ray is now doing . . .
Hickam Field . . . Cpl. Billy
Barrett, "The Kid From Texas,"
rides the inter-island run. What's
the inter-island run? Its the
bronco-bustin' irregular Pacific
Division trip schedule between
this field and the 'Big Island.'

Barrett's "open range" of to-
day differs from that of his home
in Spur, Texas. A crew chief
and flight engineer, Barrett now
rides the "47s" where once a

buddies became known as "the
Bread-Winners."

"Its nice to be on the Hilo run,"

Duck Creek Soil Conservation District News Notes

RILEY WOOTEN, Chm. WILL WRIGHT OSCAR MCGINTY, Sec. TOM MURDOCH CHAS. WITT

J. D. Patterson, cooperator of the Duck Creek Soil Conservation District, inoculated and planted 140 acres of Austrian winter peas last November for grazing purposes. He said, "I turned 100 head of yearlings on them about the first of December, and by the last of the month they had eaten them down. I took the yearlings off for about three weeks and then turned them back, hoping the peas would carry them for a while longer. About two weeks later I inspected the field and found the peas about half-knee high, so I put another 100 head on them. The 140 acres of peas carried the 200 head in good condition until I sold them on the 20th day of April. I have ordered 10,000 pounds of the peas this year and will plant 350 acres of them."

Several hundred acres of Balboa rye is being planted by numerous cooperators on land ranging from shinnery blow sand to sandy loam. The local supply of seed has been exhausted; however, the supervisors of the district will attempt to obtain more rye seed if they are requested to do so. Requests for this seed should be made at the Soil Conservation Service office in Spur.

Lawton Harvey reports that the 15 acres of rye he had last year made excellent pasture for hogs, and that when soaked, the grain made good hog feed.

- I. Advantages of Growing Alfalfa:**
1. Yields an abundance of quality hay with high protein content.
 2. Excellent for erosion control.
 3. Improves the soil.
 4. Requires very little cultivation.
 5. Furnishes excellent temporary grazing.

II. How to Prepare Seedbed:

1. Plow deep with moldboard or breaking plow in the spring or early summer.
2. Summer fallow with as many shallow cultivations as necessary to keep weeds down.
3. Have seedbed smooth and as firm as possible at planting time.

III. How to Plant:

1. Inoculate seed with commercial inoculant.
2. Plant in September or October for best results.
3. Sow broadcast on a firm, moist seedbed.
4. Sow 12 to 15 pounds per acre.
5. Sow half of the seed north and south, and the other half east and west for more even distribution.
6. Cover seed 1/2 to 3/4 inch deep by harrowing lightly.

Alfalfa seed, grown by Horace Woods, can be obtained from a local feed store in Spur.

School Days October 9-10 At South Plains Fair At Lubbock

Lubbock, Texas, Sept. 11.—Fair officials have set aside two big days of the six-day 39th Annual Panhandle South Plains Fair for the students of the South Plains. Schools Days are October 9 and 10. Students from schools south of a line drawn along the southern border of Lubbock county and from Lubbock county will attend the Fair free on Wednesday, October 9. Those from north of the line will be admitted free, the next day. Lubbock city pupils will be guests of the Fair on Tuesday, Lubbock Day.

All students will be required to pay a government tax of 5 cents if under 12 years of age and 10 cents if over 12 as they enter the Fair Grounds. This is required by federal law.

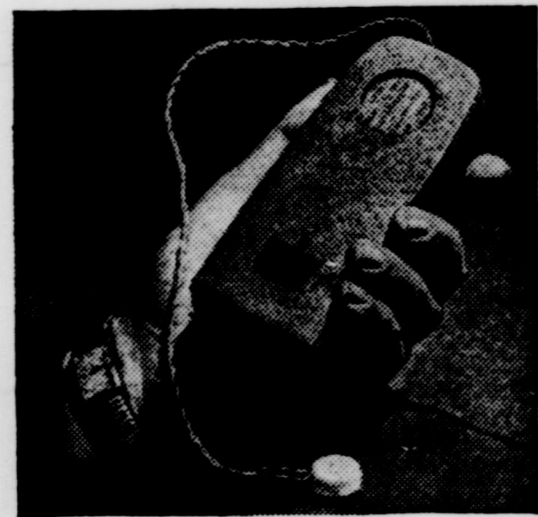

**\$3,000,000 Insurance
Business Moved To
Dallas From N. Y.**

"G. I." insurance records of West Texas veterans are now located in the Dallas Veterans administration branch office, Dallas, Texas, VA Public Relations Office at Lubbock announced today.

The three billion dollar insurance business began moving into Dallas from New York in truck convoys.

Involved was the transfer of government insurance records for more than 1,200,000 ex-GI's from the Eastern city to the Dallas branch office of the Veteran Administration.

Transfer of the records means that all veterans living in Texas, Louisiana and Mississippi, will now be given insurance service by the Dallas VA office instead of New York.

A few days will be required to organize the mass of files into operating sections following which the Dallas insurance service will be activated. D. C. Pray, insurance director, said.

Effective immediately, all correspondence from Texas, Louisiana and Mississippi veterans concerning GI insurance should be sent to Dallas instead of New York or Washington, Pray added.

VA's new address for insurance business in the tri-state area is: Insurance Service; Veterans Administration; Branch Office No. 10; 1114 Commerce Street, Dallas Texas.

Trucks loaded with thousands of cases and bundles of correspondence began leaving New York several days ago, Pray revealed. The move to Dallas will be completed by next Monday.

"This decentralization of insurance is part of General Bradley's order to break VA's activity down to 13 branch offices in the United States and speed service to veterans," Pray said.

The VA insurance director stated that a large volume of unanswered mail and unposted premium payments are being 'inherited' by the Dallas office from New York.

"This back-log will have to be processed by the Dallas office along with current business," Pray said. "But we knew it was coming and we have been prepared for it."

Pray and Assistant Insurance Director L. H. Graves, Jr., have assembled and trained a staff of more than 700 insurance workers in the Dallas VA office.

"We realize we have a tremendous task ahead of us," Pray said, "but we are confident we can whip it and give veterans the insurance service they deserve."

"Once on a current basis, VA's Dallas Branch Insurance Service will operate exactly the same as the home office of a life insurance company and will give service to veterans equal to that offered by any commercial company."

Pray estimated that 600,000 National Service Life Insurance accounts in the Dallas Branch Area are active or semi-active at the present time.

"This is no way indicative of the huge insurance business that will be conducted in Dallas," he added. "We expect thousands of veterans who have let their insurance lapse, to renew it under liberalized amendments recently enacted by Congress."

Complete information on GI insurance, he said, is available to veterans through VA contact men.

Pray urged the veterans who will now start sending their insurance premiums to Dallas, pay by personal checks or money orders payable to the Treasurer of the United States.

All remittances should be properly identified with the senders name, address, serial number and policy number and marked for the attention of the collections unit.

All claims for waiver of premiums because of disability should be marked for the attention of the Disability Insurance Claims Division.

Veterans residing in Texas, Louisiana and Mississippi, are being advised of the decentralization of insurance to Dallas by post card notice.

The New York office is mailing September premiums notices, giving the Dallas branch as the return address.





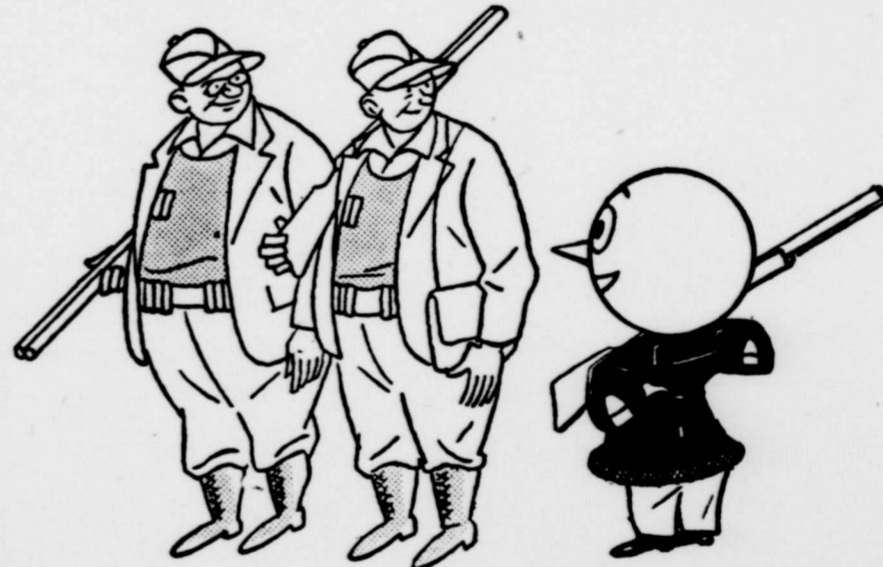

Behind the Scenes In American Business

By John Craddock

New York—Earnings reports for the first six months of the year are flooding the mails to the millions of men and women who own American business. Many of these reports make sad reading. The figures reflect the economic consequences of the strikes earlier in the year. It is the heavy industries which disclose the deepest red in their figures. Both the electrical equipment and the motor car industries operated at substantial losses through the first half of this year. So, apparently, did the railroad. The first 35 Class 1 roads to report showed a net deficit for the period of \$20 million against earnings of \$217 million last year. Though the steel industry kept in the black, due chiefly to tax adjustments, its earnings, too, were off sharply. So substantial were the losses in the heavy industries that, on the average, they more than offset gains registered by some of the consumers goods divisions. Meanwhile, Bureau of Labor Statistics figures reveal a 44.5 per cent gain in workers wages and only 10.5 per cent gain in workers output since 1939.

This was a common practice when industry in wartime pushed for quality and production, but in the postwar period the role of the expert "expediter" is becoming unique, except in the growing writing and shaving instrument industry.
