Pyorrhea Is Incurable Only In Advanced Stages, Cox States

Contrary to the popular belief that pyorrhea is incurable, this is only true in the most advanced cases. Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, advises those persons who even suspect the presence of pyorrhea to take time by the forelock and seek an early diagnosis from the dentist so proper treatment can be instituted while the disease is still curable.

Early detection and proper treatment of pyorrhea represent the formula for a successful cure. This means that the dentist must have an opportunity to discover the presence of the disease at the earliest possible moment since the symptoms are often so vague that the patient is unaware of its existence," Dr. Cox said. "Regular visits to the family dentist are therefore extremely important."

The treatment of pyorrhea is not an involved procedure. In the average early case one of the main therapeutic features is the proper hygienic care of teeth and gums as outlined by and reputable dentist. Carelessness regarding mouth hygiene is usually the basic cause for the condition.

The Family dentist can usually remove the cause of the trouble, Dr. Cox said, and when this has been done, intelligent routine home care of the mouth by the patient will effect a cure in the majority of early cases.

Concern regarding pyorrhea should not be based upon the misguided notion of its incurability, according to the State Health Officer, but rather that it be discovered when still in a curable stage.

Duck Creek Soil Conservation District News Notes

Hubert Karr, cooperater with the Duck Creek Soil Conservation District, reports that the fingerling channel cat he stocked his tank with last year are now keepers, ranging up to 13 inches long.

More pounds of meat can be produced per acre of land through fish production than beef production. The average size stock tank found in the District, with proper management, will normally produce all the fish that can be used by the farm family.

Among the questions frequently asked are, "should I fertilize my fish pond?" "How can I get rid of the weeds in my pond?" "Can one overfish a pond?" Unfertilized ponds yield 75 to 200 pounds of fish per surface acre of water; fertilized ponds yield 300 to 600 pounds. Commercial fertilizer (6-8-4 or 8-8-4 is best) added to the rate of about 100 pounds to the surface acre per month from April to November, usually increases production tremendously. Just scatter the fertilizer in the water around the shore. No pond that is choked with moss is a good fish pond. More pounds of fish per acre will be produced where ponds are free from moss and other weeds. Moss can be controlled through fertilization. Use the same kinds and amounts as recommended above. Instead of waiting until April to start fertilizing, begin monthly applications in January. Broadcast the fertilizer over the beds of moss.

It is just as important to harvest the fish crop produced as it is to sell the calf or pig crop. If the crop isn't harvested, the pond becomes overstocked and the results on the fish are the same as the results on calves when the pasture becomes overstocked. As soon as the fish reach legal size, which will be from 8 to 12 months the pond should be opened to fishing, and fished heavily all the time thereafter.
