O. C. Arthur Chosen Chairman County Good Roads Com.

O. C. Arthur, prominent Dickens County good roads advocate, has been chosen chairman of the Dickens County Good Road Amendment Campaign Committee, it was announced today by Charles E. Simons, executive vice-president of the Texas Good Road Association.

Appearing on the ballot in the November 5th General Election as Amendment Number three, the Good Roads Constitutional Amendment guarantees the availability of motor vehicle registration fees Haskell, Coach Sam Hawkes and gasoline taxes exclusively for road purposes, with the exception of one-fourth of the gas tax which will continue to be collected to the Available Free school

"His deep interest in better and more improved highways and farm-to-market roads was the head the Dickens County Campaign," Simons said.

Simons also pointed out that the Texas Safety Asociation, Texas Farm Bureau Federation, State 155 Board of Education and thirty other state organizations have adopted resolutions strongly en-

dorsing the amendment. "With so many outstanding organizations backing the amendment," Simons continued, "we feel that every citizen in Dickens County should be fully informed of the provisions of the measure and the benefits they will derive from it. For this reason, we have selected Arthur to head the Dickens county committee and direct a vigorous educational campaign to point out the merits of this amendment."

Chief purpose of this proposal, it was emphasized by the Good Roads Association executive vicepresident, is to assure the nltimate construction of rural mail and school bus routes, and all weather farm-to-market roads. Also, it will insure improvement, maintenance and policing of all roads and urban traffic-ways.

Spur Rotary Club **Receives Letters** Of Appreciation

In December of 1944, the president of the Spur Rotary club re-L. D. Ratliff who was in charge ceived a letter concerning the of the program for the evening building of a greenhouse at the made appologizes because the McCloskey General Hospital at Waco. The club saw fit to contribute to this project as did some one hundred and fifteen other Texas Rotary Clubs.

The Spur Club has received a series of letters noting the progress of this campagn, and on April 1, 1945 the campaign was closed. A total of \$9,953.50 was contributed by Texas Rotarians for this project.

This greenhouse is one of the finest in the country. It is concrete and steel, being 120 feet long and 40 feet wide. It consists of three 40 foot sections which can be seperately regulated for heat, humidity and moisture for different types of flowers. There is a work room adjoining it which is constructed of hollow tile. Also it has its own water system utilizing rain water when possible.

It was possible to build this structure at such low cost due to the fact that prisoner of war labor was used. In making expenditure of the contributed money, advantage was taken of all discounts. Also credit was received for early payment which was returned and the balance now in this fund is \$1253.23 which will be used to further improve the efficency of this project.

Before the war ended, this green furnished house fresh flowers from Texas Rotarians to all patients in the institution, men coming in on convoys, decorations for weddings held on the post and parties for the men. Last Christmas a poinsettia was raised for every ward and room in the hospital. This added greatly to their holiday season, as they were delivered the week before

Christmas. Recently the army gave up this institution and turned it over to Veterans Administration. During the change-over, the army maintained the greenhouse to be sure

the plants would not be lost. This week the Spur Rotary club received a letter from Robert D. Moreton, past president of the Temple Rotary club expressing appreciation in the cooperation the Spur club gave. Also General Bethea, Commanding Officer of McCloskey General Hospital, expressed his appreciation for the greenhouse and said, "We have found that a greenhouse is the backbone of landscaping. Without our greenhouse we would not have the beautiful grounds which now form a part of this institution. Certainly nothing is more important than giving sick patients beautiful surroundings in which to convalesce. Believe m,e they have been appreciated."

Further quoting his letter in part, General Betha said, "I do not believe that the Rotary clubs could have done anything else which would have given so much pleasure to our patients."

Pyorrhea Is Incurable North Dickens County Stages, Cox States

Contrary to the popular belief that pyorrhea is incurable, this is only true in the most advanced cases. Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, advises those persons who even suspect the presence of pyorrhea to take time by the forelock and seek an early diagnosis from the dentist so proper treatment can be instituted while the disease is still

.. Early detection and proper treatment of pyorrhea represent the formula for a successful cure. This means that the dentist must have an opportunity to discover the presence of the disease at the earliest possible moment since the symptons are often so vague that the patient is unaware of its existence," Dr. Cox said. . 'Regular visits to the family dentist are therefore extremely important."

The treatment of pyorrhea is not an involved procedure. In the average early case one of the main therepeutic features is the proper hygenic care of teeth and gums as outlined by and reputable dentist. Carelessness regarding mouth hygiene is usually the basic cause for the conditon.

The Family dentist can usually remove the cause of the trouble, Dr. Cox said, and when this has been done, intelligent routine home care of the mouth by the patient will effect a cure in the majority of early cases.

Concern regarding pyorrhea should not be based upon the misguided notion of its incurability, according to the State Health Officer, but rather that it be discovered when still in a curable

A REPORT on telephone progress in Texas

The first postwar year was the busiest year we've ever known, filled with work to give telephone service to those who are waiting and to improve service for everyone.
